INQUEST SHEDS NO NEW LIGHT ON HESS CASE

ends with his father, but on school days stayed at the Hess home. He and his father, Mrs. Hess said, had had trouble earlier in the day, because the boy had accidentally caused damage to one of the trees at the home, but Mr. Wright came over to see the boy before Mr. and Mrs. Hess left home, and left Albert with his father after giving him his meal.

Returned Together
Mrs. Hess remained with her husband until he completed his work and then they returned home, arriving about 11 o'clock. Mrs. Hess said that she retired immediately, but that Mr. Hess started to study his Sabbath school lesson until she called to him and urged him to come to bed.

"We were awakened," Mrs. Hess declared, "by a terrible noise as the glass of our bedroom window was shattered. We both jumped out of bed and I ran in the kitchen. A terrible voice outside said 'turn on your light.' George hesitated and the man outside said again, 'turn on that light, quit fumbling around in there, you know where it is.' I told my husband to go ahead and turn on the light and he said 'all right' and he turned the bedroom light on, and then came out into the kitchen."

Saw Face at Window
Mrs. Hess said that when the light was turned on she could see a face at the window. Her impression, she said, was of a middle-aged man, his face covered with a thin mask, wearing a blue shirt and an old, broken gray cap. She could see the sides of his face, she said, and it appeared that he had about a week's growth of stubble beard on his face.

"As we stood in the kitchen," Mrs. Hess continued, "I kept trying to think what we should do. We had no gun in the house, and I was afraid to go upstairs because I knew we would be trapped. I moved over to the kitchen door and the man outside said 'keep away from that door lady. Don't try to leave the house or you'll have a bullet in you before morning.'"

"I thought that our only escape would be to run to Carpenters (the next door neighbors) and so I told my husband we had better run. He opened the door and I went out first. We ran around the house. I was a short distance ahead of him. I think I turned down a row of logberry vines and just then I heard a shot and my husband groaned and fell. I ran on over to Carpenters to get help."

Only Heard One Shot
Mrs. Hess said that she heard only one shot, and that she did not hear the shot that broke the glass in their bedroom. "This shot through the window," she said, "and the bullet was fired from the outside cutting through the lace curtain and lodging in the kitchen wall. The window shade was untouched. Mrs. Hess was certain that the shade was up at the time the glass was broken, but it was down when the officers arrived on the scene. Mrs. Hess also declared that they left the bedroom light on and that there was no light in the kitchen. When the officers arrived the bedroom was dark but the kitchen light was on, causing them to assume that the murderer was in the house after Hess was killed, although nothing appeared to have been touched. It is thought possible that he did not see the woman escape and went into the house seeking her."

Mrs. Hess said that her husband had had no trouble, giving the jury the names of people he had employed to assist in handling the fruit from their small orchard, showing that they were neighbors with whom they were on very friendly terms. She was unable to describe any motive for the crime. She also stated that she would not be able to recognize the killer if she should see him again, and that there was nothing about his voice that was distinctive. "Terrible" was her only description of the voice.

Witness Composed

Mrs. Hess broke down occasionally during the examination, her testimony being interrupted by sobs of weeping. On the whole, however, she maintained composure and expressed a willingness to continue on the stand as long as she might be of assistance to

clearing up the mystery.

Dr. E. H. Stewart, who performed the autopsy, informed the jury that the bullet which caused the death of Mr. Hess, struck the right side of the chest, ranging to the left and slightly downward, penetrating both cavities of the heart. There was a slight bruise on the head; the physician stated, caused apparently as the man fell forward on his face. The bullet recovered was of .32 caliber, he said.

W. J. Carpenter, who resides adjoining the Hess home, testified that he and his wife were awakened shortly after 1 o'clock in the morning by Mrs. Hess, who said that her husband had been shot. Mr. Carpenter was unable to reach central over his own telephone and so went to the Osborne home next door and called Sheriff Jackson. He went with the officer to the Hess home, and described the position of the body when they found it.

Sheriff Jackson told of his search of the house and the discovery of the body. He also told of finding the pistol in an apple orchard across the county road, a distance of 50 yards from the Hess home, and testified regarding the shattered window from which small pieces of glass were scattered about the house with the larger pieces on the ground outside.

The coroner's jury was composed of Al Kent, J. P. Cassidy, D. H. Shambrook, J. P. Jones, H. C. Darby and Grant Wilcox.

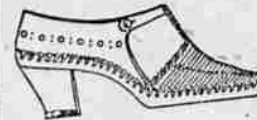
