## GLENDALE MINER IS FOUND DEAD IN HIS LONELY CABIN

 GLENDALE, May 16.—(The News-Review) A miner and prospector aged about 65, was found dead in his cabin on upper Quines creek this morning by R. W. Gilpatrick, a neighbor. He had evidently been dead for about a week.  
 Very little is known here about Baer. He has lived for years in seclusion in a remote cabin on upper Quines creek about 15 miles from this city, where he eked out a meager living from a small placer claim he had there. Several years ago he lost his cabin and all his possessions to Mrs. Neighbors, rebuilt his cabin and here since helped him from time to time in various ways, as it was known among his neighbors that he was having a hard time to get along financially.  
 Colonel H. C. Stearns of Roseburg, was notified and is expected to arrive here this afternoon to take charge of the body.

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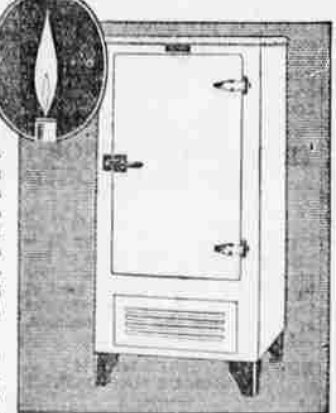
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
