OREGON BANKERS HEAR SPEECHES ON TAXES AND LOANS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SALEM, Ore., May 16.—Ira C. Powell, president of the First National bank of Salem, was elected chairman of group 2 of the Oregon bankers' association at its annual meeting held here Wednesday. Other officers elected were: Vice chairman, J. C. Irvine of Leona; secretary, Joseph H. Albert of Salem (re-elected); treasurer, W. L. Hill of Mill City. The elected officers with C. J. Eddy of Woodburn and J. F. Gault of Corvallis are the executive committee.

C. C. Chapman of Portland, who addressed the group of about 50 bankers attending the meeting, predicted failure of the present attempt at referendum of the excise tax act. He warned the state tax commission to use discretion in administration of the act to avoid a series of lawsuits.

Encroachment of subterfuge building materials is largely responsible for the slump in the lumber industry in recent years, according to Sinclair A. Wilson of Linnton, who addressed the bankers on that industry. Other things blamed were poor advertising, propaganda of ultra-conservationists, failure to develop refinement of the industry at the right time, and price cutting. Possible solutions mentioned were development of new pulp woods, rayon, products of destructive distillation, unit mills, secondary mills in the woods and improvement in logging methods.

Sidney J. Graham of Portland, defending chain banking, and R. M. Alton of Portland, defending the unit system, engaged in an interesting debate. Graham declared the chain banks are able to accommodate the public better because they command able management, economy, security and fluidity of capital. Alton declared that fluidity of capital is already provided by the federal reserve law. He declared that loans are made on a basis of capital, capability and character, all of which can be better judged by the unit bank official than by some chain banker in a far-away city.

BEACON IN HONOR OF LINDBERGH TO OUTSHINE OLD SOL

CHICAGO, May 15.—The world's most powerful aerial beacon, brighter than the sun, according to its inventor, will be installed atop the new 37-story Palmolive building. Final authorization for the light was sought of the city council today.

The beacon will have a two-billion candle-power light and will be visible as far as 500 miles away. Elmer Sperry, its inventor, has promised. Sperry has offered to donate the beacon in honor of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh and it will be named in honor of that flier.

Sperry said the light, which is being constructed in his factory at Brookline, N. Y., will cost \$100,000. At noon on the brightest day in Chicago the sun's rays have been computed at 600-candle power per square millimeter on the earth's surface. The beacon will register 1,000 candle power per square millimeter, Perry said.

ASSAULT STORY PROVEN FALSE

John Maske, of Portland, a toy balloon salesman, reported at the sheriff's office late yesterday evening with a story that he had been dragged and robbed by a transient that he had picked up on the road. He told the officers that he picked up a man near Eugene, giving a

complete description, and stated that as he neared Sutherlin he was slugged as he reached over to turn on his car lights. He said that he returned to consciousness a short time later and found that he had been robbed of \$22. The officers became suspicious regarding his statements and succeeded in getting him to make several contradictory statements after which he finally admitted that the story was false and that he was endeavoring to secure aid to get to Klamath Falls. He was permitted to wire to friends in Portland and succeeded in getting enough money to get him to his destination, and was released from custody upon his agreement to leave town immediately. He admitted that he has previously served a term of one year for auto theft.
