

HIGH SCHOOL WILL GRADUATE 73 THIS YEAR

Senior Class Largest, With But One Exception, Ever Completing Work Here.

Baccalaureate Services Will Be Held Sunday, May 26, With Rev. Edwards Speaker.

Members of the graduating class of the senior high school are busily preparing for the final exercises that will mark the end of their high school activities.

Next week will be the last of the regular school term until fall, the week of the 27th being devoted to final examinations.

The senior class this year is, with one exception the largest ever graduated from Roseburg high school, there being 73 pupils who will receive diplomas. The largest class, 82, was graduated in 1926.

The graduation exercises start Sunday, May 26, with the baccalaureate service. The churches of the city, following their usual custom, will unite for that meeting, at which Dr. Charles Edwards, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, will deliver the address. The combined glee clubs of the senior high school will furnish the music.

Class day will be observed Wednesday, May 29, and a very interesting program is being arranged for that event. Miss Helen Carey and Miss Kate Buchanan, class advisors, assisting the students in making the plans for this event.

Commencement exercises will be held Friday, May 31, with Burt Brown, Barker, vice-president of the University of Oregon, as the speaker. An interesting musical program will be given in connection with this event.

TACOMA, Wash., May 16.—Rev. Frank Lindblad of Seattle will be unlinked and stripped of all ministerial rights and privileges when his case is presented before a meeting of the western states leaders of the assemblies of God in San Francisco next week.

The Rev. Frank Gray, northwest district superintendent of the denomination, declared here today.

Lindblad resigned his Seattle pastorate after confessing the truth of charges made by a young matron of the congregation on what she believed to be her death bed.

Rev. Gray said today that he had just returned from Spokane, where he placed Lindblad's case before the northwest district board. He attended the Seattle meeting at which Lindblad made his confession and tendered his resignation.

Richfield Beacon and Service Station to Be Erected on Highway North of Roseburg Soon



Above is an architect's drawing of the new Richfield beacon tower, a sharp contrast to the low, rambling Spanish stations built for the project in California, was decided upon as a tribute to the more rugged beauty of mountain, mesa and sea of the colorful Pacific Northwest. These stations will rise at the base of 125-foot Richfield Neon lighted beacon towers at the following points: Blaine, Stanwood, Seattle, Tacoma, Centralia and Longview, all in Washington; Crown Point, Salem, Portland, Eugene, Roseburg and Grants Pass, in Oregon. JEWS PLAN RETRIAL OF CHRIST

Fixing of Blame for Crucifixion Is Purpose of Movement Launched at Denver by Group of Men, Who Hope to Better Future Spiritual Welfare of Race.

DENVER, May 17.—Retrial of a heresy case 2,000 years old—that of Jesus of Nazareth before the Sanhedrin of Jerusalem—is planned by prominent Denver Jews to "commemorate" the blood accusations hurled at the Jews ever since the crucifixion.

Seventy-one Jewish laymen, scholars and rabbis would occupy the judicial bench, and the entire Christian world would be called as witnesses. The new trial is proposed, also, to "better the future spiritual welfare of Jews the world over."

The movement is part of that aimed at the reestablishment of the Jewish nation, a vision which appeared to Jewry with General Allenby's bare-headed entrance into Jerusalem in 1917.

The immediate sponsor of the retrial is Solomon Shwayder, Denver manufacturer. Under tentative plans it would require from four to seven years and would codify all existing ideas about the life and death of the Nazarene Carpenter. Shwayder said it was backed by the "rank and file" of the Jewish people, as opposed to the rabbinical cult which succeeded the priestly cult after the destruction of Jerusalem in the summer of the year 70, A. D., by Roman soldiers.

Shwayder, who visited Jerusalem last year after 10 years of conferences with prominent Jewish laymen throughout the United States, contends that the Sanhedrin, Jewish religious cult, was immediately responsible for the death of Jesus.

The Jewish people, other than the Sadducees and Pharisees (regarded by scholars as the "liberals" and "conservatives," respectively, of Jewish religious-political life of the time), did not want the Great Teacher to die, he believes.

In keeping, therefore, with the attempt to purge the Jewish people of the accusation, he proposes another "Great Sanhedrin," self-perpetuating once it is established, to sit on the question, receiving testimony from all walks of religious life in the world.

The venture is possible for the first time in almost 2,000 years, Shwayder said, because Jerusalem is once again a free city. In the hands of the Jews, the plans overlaid, the society in charge of the world would select a representative to proceed to Jerusalem and confer with the brethren there. From the Holy City, then, would issue a call to all Israel throughout the world for the assembly of the "Great Sanhedrin."

KENTUCKY'S 55TH DERBY SCHEDULED FOR TOMORROW

Purse Around \$50,000 Will Go to Winner of Great Turf Classic at Louisville.

Blue Larkspur Favored to Come Under Wire First; Earl Sande to Ride His Own Entry.

LOUISVILLE, May 17.—Fifty-four times a gallant band of three-year-olds has come pelting down the stretch of Churchill Downs, challenging the great horses of the past, building reputations for great horses of the future.

Fifty-four times the Kentucky derby has been run and Saturday afternoon, May 18, will be run

again the most famous classic of America.

Almost to the day, it will commemorate the afternoon brave-hearted little Aristides swept down the course, setting the pace for a stablemate which never showed up, and going on to win from a field of 15 starters. That was May 17, 1875.

The distance was a mile and a half, and for 11 years breeders debated the wisdom of so long a test for tender colts. In 1886, a quarter-mile was lopped off, the distance holding, as now, a mile and a quarter.

Conditions for Entry

Horses are nominated for the derby upon the basis of their showing as two-year-olds. Owners post \$25 subscription fee with \$500 added to start. In addition, \$50,000 is put up by the association, of which the winner draws \$40,000. Reigh Count, winning last year, earned \$65,375.

Colts and geldings carry an impost of 126 pounds. Fillies are given a five-pound allowance. And in spite of the allowance, the derby is too much for a filly. Only once in 64 years has a filly won the derby, Regret slipping the field in 1915.

Only twice has the field exceeded 20 starters, 23 being the absolute top.

No colt overshadows the field as Reigh Count, owned by Mrs. John

Heritz of Chicago, topped the entry of last year. Blue Larkspur, a Bradley colt out of Black Serrano-Blossom Time, leads the list, with Clyde Van Dusen, owned by H. P. Gardner, a second choice.

Sande to Ride Again

Earl Sande, only jockey to win the derby twice in recent years, will ride his own entry this year. The colt, christened Hermitage, may be run as Sande's Choice, a petition having been submitted for this change.

Old Rosebud, winner in 1914, holds the record for the mile and a quarter course with 2:03 2-5. This mark has never been challenged, but as the gallant old son of Uncle was carrying only 114 pounds as against the present impost of 126 for colts and 121 for fillies, the time of 2:03 4-5 is regarded as the record.
