WATER INSPECTOR FOR COW CREEK DISTRICT PLANNED

(News-Review Douglas County Special) GLENDALE, May 18.—The hearing for the adjudication of water rights on Cow creek in the Glendale district after being postponed April 26 was continued here today at the new city hall before Rhea Luper, state irrigation engineer.

This case involves two phases of contest, one with G. W. Turner as defendant, and the principal stockholders in the Cow Creek Irrigation company's ditch interference, and the other phase in which C. O. Garrett and son and Sether Brothers, the principal stockholders in the Cow Creek Irrigation company, are contesting G. W. Turner in an effort to secure an adjudication of water rights on the basis of acreage.

Much of the testimony is technical, and numerous witnesses have been called by both sides in support of their contentions. A compromise arrangement was arrived at late this afternoon, whereby Rhea Luper, state irrigation engineer, will appoint a representative to supervise the actual distribution of water from the Cow Creek Irrigation company's ditch during the coming irrigation season. A ruling on the matter of adjudication of water rights based on acreage will probably be made later.

James T. Chinnock of Grants Pass is representing Mr. Turner and Percy Capper of Salem is representing the Cow Creek Irrigation company.
