SAWMILL TO BE ERECTED IN ROSEBURG

the company by Mr. Cronson at an exceedingly low figure. Because of his desire to see a payroll industry established in Roseburg, Mr. Cronson gave a long term lease on the land at such a price that it practically constitutes a gift during the time that the mill is in operation.

Will Give Payroll
The mill will have a daily capacity of 20,000 board feet, and will furnish employment for 50 or 60 men in the mill and in the woods.

The estimated payroll is around \$100,000 per year. The total investment is in the neighborhood of \$225,000.

The timber secured is located between 10 and 12 miles east of Roseburg in the Lane mountain and Whitsett butte district, which affords a downhill haul all the way into Roseburg. The logs will be brought in by trucks and will be dumped in an artificial pond, which is to be constructed on the property acquired in North Roseburg.

The work of moving the timber, according to Mr. Giles, is to be started within the next month, and operations will begin here within sixty or ninety days.

as his gasoline tank exploded and the plane burst into flames but he was able to make the leap.

Salter's Explanation
At a district office, Lieutenant Salter gave this explanation of the accident:

"I was with the 95th pursuit squadron, carrying out an attack on Norton field. There were seven ships in my formation. Suddenly we saw a dozen red planes beneath us and hopped on them for the attack.

"Without warning one of the red ships crashed into the under carriage of my ship. I was thrown against the dash by the impact, and quickly recovered control of my ship. Then I discovered that my gas tank had been punctured and that the ship was alive. I made my getaway as quickly as possible and jumped.

The 95th pursuit squadron was a part of the blue army, staging a theoretical attack on the area held by the red detaching army with headquarters at Norton field, here. The blue headquarters are at Wright field, Dayton.

ALLEN O'MARA IS KILLED IN PLANE CRASH YESTERDAY

Allen O'Mara, who was killed yesterday near Walla Walla when his plane crashed 2000 feet was formerly a Roseburg man. His father, John O'Mara, a sister, Mrs. P. E. Rome and a brother, Roy, resided at Sutherlin. The body will be shipped to this city and is expected to arrive today.

Mr. O'Mara was born at Salem, Oregon, and went to Walla Walla in 1920 after making Douglas county his home for many years. He was completing his training as a pilot at the time of the accident.

Mr. O'Mara is survived by his father, John O'Mara, a sister, Mrs. E. L. Rome and brother, Roy, of Sutherlin, two sisters, Mrs. Frank O'Mara of Tillamook, Mrs. Harold Sutherlin of Marshfield; P. H. O'Mara of San Diego, J. V. O'Mara of Glendale.

Funeral arrangements will be in charge of the Roseburg Undertaking company and interment will be made at Fair Oaks cemetery at Sutherlin. Announcement of the service will be made later.
