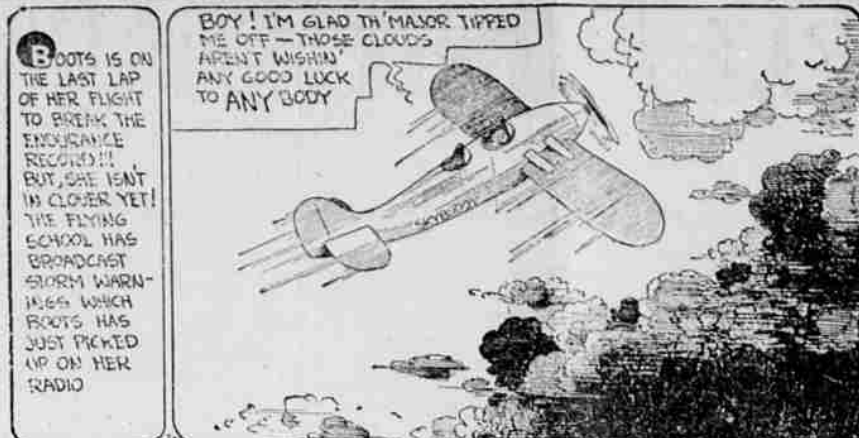
Move to California—

UNLAWFUL TO SET FIRE WITHOUT PERMIT

During the period between May 15 and October 1, designated as the closed season, it is unlawful for anyone to set on fire any forest land, grass, grain or stubble, either his own or the property of another, without first securing a permit from the forest or a warden and complying with the terms thereof.

Burning permits may be secured from the fire warden in your locality or from the office of the Douglas County Fire Patrol Ass'n., Roseburg, Ore.
