A NEW SAWMILL FOR ROSEBURG

ANNOUNCEMENT was made Saturday that a large tract of timber near Roseburg had been purchased by men who will build a mill here within the next few months. The building of this mill will mark the beginning of a new era in the industrial development of Roseburg. If one lumber manufacturing enterprise is successful here others are sure to follow. There is no fundamental reason why this enterprise should not be highly successful.

It is not true that the development of the timber resources of this district is held back because of unfavorable freight rates. This idea is apt to be advanced in any discussion of the subject of Douglas county timber, but the fact is that lumber may be shipped from Roseburg to the principal markets of the United States on the same rate tariffs that apply to Portland, Silverton, Eugene, Wendling and other Oregon shipping points for Douglas fir lumber. The rate on Douglas fir carload shipments from any point on the Southern Pacific lines between and including Portland and Roseburg, to San Francisco is 28 1/2 cents per hundred weight. The rate from the same points to Chicago is 72 cents. Both Chicago and San Francisco are centers for the Douglas fir trade, the common point rate applies to nearby cities also. Glendale and points south enjoy a lower rate to California points but not on far eastern shipments. Mills here are not, of course, in a position to ship by water. This is something of a disadvantage, but of little importance except for export shipping. Points sixty miles and more from San Francisco bay can be reached by rail direct as against shipping by water to the bay and reshipping on cars to destination.

No, there is no fundamental reason why Roseburg some day, not too far distant, will not be a lumber manufacturing center of considerable importance. The lumber production of the state of Washington, for years the greatest of lumber producing states, is on the decline. On one railroad in Washington, less than a hundred miles in length, are located 15 mills all capable of cutting 100 thousand feet of lumber per day or more. All but two of these mills are closed down because their timber supply is gone. Douglas county is known to have some sixty billion feet of standing timber, no doubt the largest undeveloped tract of timber in this country. It will be needed soon.

THE BIRD OF THE WEEK

THE ORIOLE

The oriole belongs to the black bird family and is by far the most beautiful specimen of this family. An oriole is a bird of the golden headed variety, and is found only in limited areas—the hooded in southern California and the Audubon in southern Texas and the golden in Florida, but the Baltimore oriole and the orchard oriole cover the whole region from Canada in the north to Mexico. They breed over all this wide region and get south to spend the winter in the tropics. The Baltimore oriole, the most aristocratic variation, is sometimes called "The Bird" because of its flaming color. It is the most striking of all the starling or blackbird family, and is a most valuable bird in the decoration of ornamental trees, and should always be protected. The oriole's song is the Pacific coast is really the same bird as the Baltimore oriole of the east, with the same post-building chat, activities and general behavior.

NEW SEPARATING MACHINE BOON TO FLAX INDUSTRY

TORONTO, Ont., May 19.—A machine which its sponsors claim may revolutionize the flax and hemp growing industry in Canada as the introduction of the cotton gin revolutionized the cotton production in the United States, was demonstrated to Dr. J. H. Grisdeale, Canadian deputy minister of agriculture here yesterday.
The machine, invented by John V. Selig of Chicago, but controlled by a Canadian company, separates the fiber of the flax or hemp from the wood more quickly and more economically it is claimed, than the hand method now employed. The fiber, Dr. Grisdeale said, was at least equal to that produced by the hand method.
