PLANE CRASHES SUNDAY TAKE 7 LIVES; 8 HURT

from the fuselage while King was pulling out of a voluntary nose dive and the ship crashed 1,000 feet.

A Calgary Aero club plane crashed at Calgary, Alberta, killing N. A. Stevens, and D. E. McCallum. A wing broke when the plane was

making a loop and the machine fell from a height of 2,500 feet.

Louis Scott, 19, mechanic, was fatally injured, and O. G. Corben, pilot, was slightly hurt in a crash near Pawtucket, Okla. In an attempt to land after engine trouble had developed, the plane struck high tension wires and fell into a ditch.

Four persons were injured, two seriously in a crash of a plane in an attempted take off at Roosevelt Field, N. Y. The aviators hurt were Dorothy Gussell, 25, Baltimore, Md., and Mrs. Lucas, 30, La Platte, New York. Six thousand Sunday visitors at the Lambert-Field St. Louis flying field in St. Louis saw a plane piloted by Oscar Hetzner, 21-year-old transport pilot, crash from 150 feet. The pilot and his passenger, Will Langedorf, 21, were slightly injured.

British Flyers Lost SYDNEY, N. S. W., May 20.—The sisters of the Timor sea, or the wild uninhabited shores of northwestern Australia, away cloak the whereabouts of 40 English aviators, Flight Lieutenant J. Mair and Flying Officer H. Owen.

Anxiety was felt for the flyers, who left Bima, Sumatra, Dutch East Indies, Saturday for Port Darwin. They passed Kompan, on the island of Timor, at 11:45 a. m., the same day but failed to arrive at Port Darwin and were not reported afterward.

A searching plane flew 400 miles along the coast but saw no sign of them. Belief was that in the event of a forced landing in an isolated region the men had food for several days. From Bima to Port Darwin is approximately 1,000 miles.

Plane Lands in Tree MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 20.—Like some huge fabled bird, an airplane perched in a tree-top here today, one hundred feet above the ground.

The ship, piloted by Dr. Earl Low of Coquille, and carrying William Richardson, crashed into the top of the fir tree near Coquille late yesterday. Dr. Low said the controls stuck and the plane went into a dive. The doctor was unhurt. Richardson received a minor cut on his face when his goggles broke.

When motorists who had seen the crash reached the scene, the aviators had crawled down the tree.

Dr. Low said he believed the plane could be lowered successfully and repaired.

Markets (Associated Press Special Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—Butter, eggs, poultry and fresh meat prices held steady over the week-end with buyers about equal to the supply.

New potatoes were cheaper. California has begun to send in large supplies. They wholesale at 5 cents a pound.

Despite the advance in the season, strawberries were holding firm. Oregon berries were not arriving in sufficient quantities to influence the price of the importations.

Florida grapefruit, the most desirable kind, will disappear entirely from the trade in the near future. Eleven states, including Oregon, are quarantined against Florida on account of the Mediterranean fly. This embargo went into effect on May 16. Any grapefruit now on the market was in transit on that date. How much was still rolling or how much was held in stock was problematical.
