COUNTY JUNIOR BASEBALL TEAM CHOSEN SATURDAY

Eighteen Boys Make Up
Squad That Will Enter
District Meet at
Medford.

Double Header Played at
Local Field Saturday
Replete With Thrills
and Good Plays.

The Junior baseball league finals were played in Roseburg Saturday afternoon at Finlay field and attracted a great deal of attention. Roseburg, Myrtle Creek, Glendale, Sutherlin, Oakland and Riddle teams participated, and from among this group of players a squad of 18 was selected to make up the Umpqua valley team that will go to Medford for the district series, which is to be played in the near future.

In the first game a team from Myrtle Creek beat Roseburg 14 to 3 and in the second game a combination team from Oakland and Sutherlin was defeated 13 to 2 by Glendale and Riddle. Both games, despite the one-sided scores, were replete with thrills, and the boys pulled off some sensational plays that would have been exciting even in the big leagues.

Eighteen boys were chosen to make up the Douglas county team. The team will probably consist of Adamson, Myrtle Creek, catcher; Bert Avery, Sutherlin, first base; Yocum of Myrtle Creek, second base; Weaver, Myrtle Creek, shortstop; Entler, Roseburg, third base; Hattenhutter, Myrtle Creek, right field; Winner, Myrtle Creek, center field; Durland, Roseburg, left field; Romantini, Glendale, Smith, Sutherlin, pitchers. Substitutes will be Mellor, Riddle, catcher; Max Miller, Myrtle Creek, second base; Eskine, Myrtle Creek, right field; Goff, Sutherlin, utility; Walker, Riddle, utility; Houshield, Myrtle

Creek, Dyer, Myrtle Creek; Tynan, Roseburg, pitchers.

Junior baseball is sponsored by the American Legion, and the county activities are under the direction of Umpqua Post. The plan was instituted three years ago and has grown to great proportions. The major leagues have appropriated \$50,000 to aid in this project, as it is believed to be one of the greatest plans ever presented to develop baseball material and to stimulate interest in the game. The American Legion is chiefly interested because the league offers an opportunity to train boys athletically and to instill the principles of sportsmanship and fair play in the younger generation, and it is recognized that these factors are essential in promoting good citizenship.

The local team will play at Medford for the southern Oregon district honors, and from among the best players at Medford a team will be chosen to go to Portland. The state team will then be selected and will participate in a zone contest from which the best players will be selected to enter the national contest at Chicago.

Myrtle Creek high school won a sensational baseball game from Gold Hill last week, defeating the Gold Hill boys 10 to 9. The score was tied in the sixth inning and remained a tie until the 8th frame, when Myrtle Creek pashed over the winning run and then shut out Gold Hill for the rest of the contest. In holding their lead Myrtle Creek pulled some hair raising plays, an outfielder racing under what looked like a sure double, while the shortstop speared a Texas leaguer with a one-handed catch that saved the game for the Myrtle Creek team.

The Myrtle Creek boys have not been defeated this season and have been playing regular major league ball. They are to face Roseburg on Finlay field Friday afternoon in what promises to be a whirlwind game.

Roseburg was beaten by Myrtle Creek earlier in the season, but since that time the local boys have been greatly strengthened by practice and good coaching. Myrtle Creek, on the other hand, has also improved and has the confidence of a season without defeat.

change, and for a time practically no transactions save those in the rails appeared on the ticker tape. Effect on Stocks NEW YORK, May 20.—A frenzied outburst of buying of the railroad shares, which carried several issues up \$4 to \$22.50 a share following the publication of the U. S. supreme court's decision in the St. Louis and O'Fallon case, was followed this afternoon by a sweeping reaction, which carried the rail shares \$2 to \$13 below their early high levels and sent a wide assortment of industrials crashing \$5 to \$16 a share below last week's final quotations.

Chesapeake and Ohio went to 22 1/2 as a block of 7,000 shares changed hands. It closed Saturday at 19 1/2, Norfolk and Western rose 1 1/2 points to 20 1/2, a record price. New York Central 1 1/2, and Union Pacific 9. Rock Island, St. Louis and San Francisco, Delaware and Hudson, Atchafalpa and Erie, all rose from 5 to 6 points. Railroads from the day's low levels in the industrials ran from one to three points. The market closed strong with the sales approximating 3,500,000 shares.

Canneries Excluded

WASHINGTON, May 20.—The government finally succeeded in the supreme court today in its efforts to give effect to the consent decree entered in 1920 aimed to confine the packers exclusively to the meat packing industry. The court ordered the California cooperative canneries removed from the controversy. When the canneries were permitted to intervene in 1924 the decree was suspended, and has not since been in effect. By removing the canneries from the case the government will

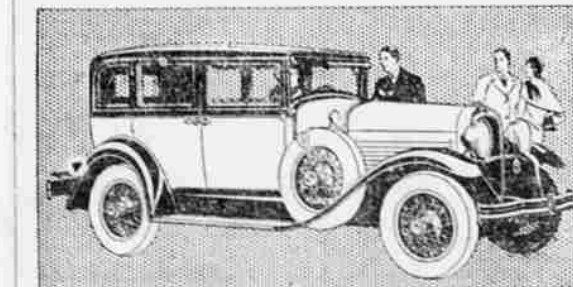

BREAK IN LEVEE THREATENS BIG MISSOURI AREA

Crops Are Ruined KENNETT, Mo., May 20.—An army of workmen lost a hard fight with flood waters of the St. Francis river when the levee crumbled about seven miles northwest of Kennett last midnight. The break was expected to inundate approximately 45,000 acres of farm land and cover highway 84 to a depth of several feet. No towns were endangered.

Between 700 and 800 men had been working desperately along a stretch of levee 14 miles long to prevent a crevasse. While about 300 men were working at Millhouse levee, considered the weakest point, there was a rumbling sound and a roar as flood waters swept away the dirt barrier and poured into fertile farms, ruining all crops in its path.

The sound of the rushing waters was heard for miles and farmers were awakened in time to make preparations to leave their homes. The crevasse had widened to 200 feet today.

Possibly fifty families will be homeless by night as a result of the break. They will be cared for by the Red Cross.

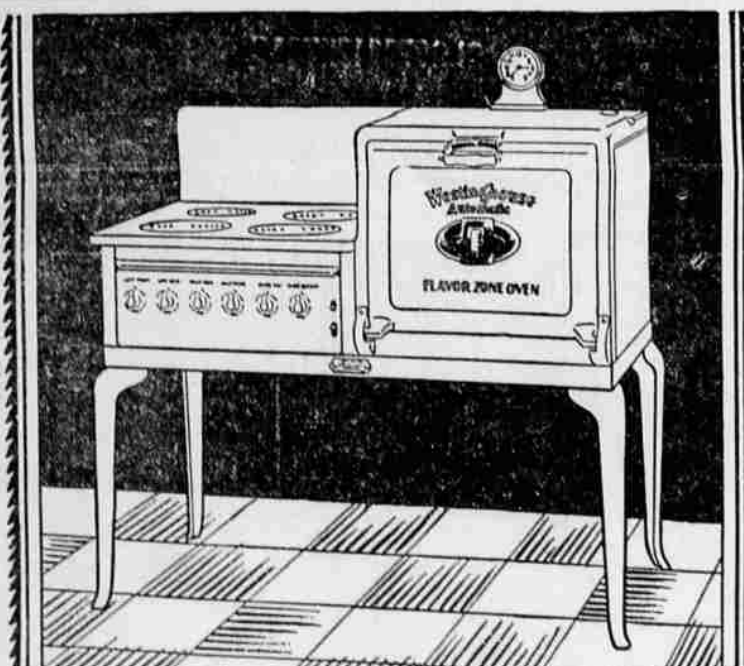
