(News-Review Douglas County Special) OAK GROVE, May 21.—Charles Lewis Hamilton passed away at his home May 19 after an illness of four years. He was born in Mason, Mo., in 1857 and was the son of Samuel and Sarah Hamilton. At the age of 21 he crossed the prairie and settled at Coffey, Wash.

January 11, 1879 he was married to Adeline Vulliamy later moving to Ketchikan, Idaho, and from there to Oakland, Ore., where they lived until his death. They were eight children born to the union. Left to mourn his loss are his widow and seven children, Leone Parks, Leland, Ithier, Eugene, Elmer, Pauline, Wash, Jessie Edna, Spokane, Della Miller, Pullman, Wash., Carver Hamilton, Oakland; Ruth Ellison, Roseburg; Hazel Goodman, Coquille, Florence Hamilton passed away June 14, 1913. One sister, Mrs. J. S. Hoyle resided at Coquille, Idaho. They were eight grandchildren and six great grandchildren. He was a member of the Christian church at Oakland.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at two o'clock at the Christian church at Oakland. Rev. H. H. Hicks, pastor of the church, conducting the services. Interment was made in the I. O. O. CANTON FACING BATTLE; FOREIGN ZONE IS GUARDED

(Associated Press Lead Wire) CANTON, China, May 21.—British sailors landing from gunboats in the harbor today in Shantung province immediately began construction of defenses in various parts of the English concession. Gates and bridges were closed and guards posted. The British consulate warned subjects not to leave Shantung and asked they assemble at Canton-shan railway compound. Three British and two French gunboats and two Japanese destroyers were anchored in the harbor outside the concession. The U. S. S. Tulsa was enroute from Hong Kong. In the native city the utmost tension prevailed with attacking Kwangsi troops known to be not far away, although there was no definite word as to their position. Sacking of the city, the largest of southern China, was feared in the event of capture by the Red Kwangsi elements which was believed imminent.

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HOOPER IS ASKED TO ALLOW U. S. CONVICTS TO HELP IN STRENGTHENING WEAK LEVEES.

(Associated Press Lead Wire) RISING streams and rivers now threatening many sections of the Mississippi valley sent emergency crews scurrying to scenes of impending danger today but disaster appeared to have been averted save in one instance. As is the habit of the floods, yesterday's only reported break occurred at a point where danger was least expected. While engineers were directing forces at three places near Kennett, Mo., the St. Francis bounded through another weakened bit of levee and overflowed some 50,000 acres. Today a break in 1927 sent the flood of that spring across some of the Delta's richest lands and towns, levee board and government engineers were supervising forces which grew hourly in numbers.

ENVY OVER GIRL CAUSES MURDER BY SCHOOLBOY

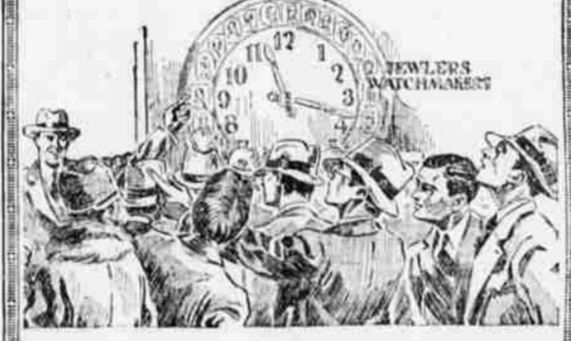

PIUS TO BE FIRST POPE SINCE 1870 TO QUIT VATICAN

(Associated Press Lead Wire) ROME, May 21.—Pio XII today said Pope Pius would make his first official exit from the Vatican on May 30, the feast of Corpus Christi, to participate in a procession and mass at St. Peter's. The pope said the decision was reached last night and preparations were discussed early today by Vatican officials. He will go afoot as far as the second line of steps of St. Peter's, and the raising the golden canopy with the host over his head will bless the throng assembled in the square. The pontiff desires this exit, the first any pope has made from the vatican since 1870, to be made afoot and for purely religious motives. There is to be no pomp such as once accompanied the papal exits theretofore. Picnic at Ilayid Park.
