THE TARIFF BILL

PRESIDENT HOOVER'S recommendation to congress was for limited tariff revision with the particular object in view of fixing schedules that would benefit agriculture. But the Hawley bill revises all but one of the schedules of the Fordney-McCumber bill, making more than 100 changes, nearly all of which are increases. A chief fault being found with the measure is that while it increases tariff protection for agriculture, it also advances the rate on many other products which the farmer, in common with other people, must buy, this in part nullifying the effect.

It will never be possible to devise a protective tariff bill that will satisfy all industries and all producers. It is natural for those engaged in any industry to want the maximum of protective benefits for that industry.

The duties provided in the bill are intended to adjust the difference in competitive conditions at home and abroad, based upon our experience under the existing tariff law.

The scope of the purpose thus defined is broader than that recommended by the president, a fact that is made the basis of criticism in some quarters. But congress is not yet finished with the tariff bill. It is likely there will be changes, and some of them may be important.

If you happen to be running a business of any sort that enjoys tourist trade watch carefully that all are treated alike and fair. In another county there is a restaurant whose proprietor scans carefully each patron as he is about to pay his bill.
