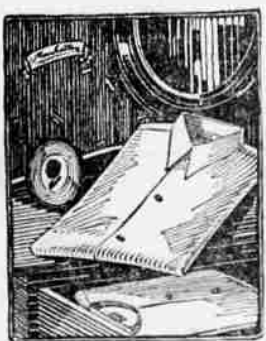
Returns to Los Angeles—

MULTNOMAH JUDGE PETITIONS FILED

SALEM, Ore., May 24.—Completed petitions for referendum of the 1929 legislative act creating two new circuit judgeships in Multnomah county were filed with the secretary of state today by William F. Woodward of Portland, who started the referendum.

Secretary Hoss is informed that Pike Davis of Portland, who opposes the referendum, will appeal from the ballot title of the referendum bill as prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle. It is understood the complaint has been prepared, but it has not yet been served on the state department. The ground for the appeal is said to be an allegation that the ballot title does not correctly state the purpose of the act, and the complaint will propose a substitute ballot title.

PRESBYTERIANS FAVOR MERGER WITH 4 OTHERS

as are now accumulated by less worthy enterprises.

Seminary Discard
The presbytery assembly will see the closing of the long standing controversy over the Princeton Theological seminary.

Represented as having grown from personalities, the internal strife in the church's oldest and largest seminary has extended to the institution's two governing boards.

While the controversy will be submitted to the general assembly in search of settlement, some Presbyterian churchmen believe civil courts eventually will untangle it.

The difference between the board of directors and the board of trustees also has been explained, as one of doctrine and administration, with a clash of authority in which the seminary's president figures.

Two years ago a committee headed by Dr. William O. Thompson, Columbus, Ohio, president emeritus of Ohio State university, recommended reorganization of the seminary government. This proposal has been arranged again for presentation to the general assembly.

Sweeping Changes Due
Indications are that the assembly will suggest sweeping changes in the directorate, faculty and board of trustees.

Dr. J. Ross Stevenson, president of the seminary, classed as leader of the moderate-conservative group, is presented as believing the seminary should be responsive to opinion of the whole church. His opponents assert the seminary stands for an ultra-conservative view.

Churchmen declare the dispute has had an "unwholesome effect on students," and some claim attendance has decreased because of it.

With Dr. Stevenson as "moderate conservatives" are: Faculty member, Dr. Charles Erdman; directors, Robert E. Speer, New York, secretary board of foreign missions; Dr. Lewis S. Mudge and W. Beatty Jennings, both of Philadelphia, and Dr. John Finney, M. D., Baltimore.

"Ultra-conservatives" are: Faculty members, Dr. J. Gresham Machen, Dr. Robert Dick Wilson, directors, Dr. W. L. McEwan, Dr.

Maliland Alexander, Dr. Clarence McCartney, all of Pittsburgh, and Dr. John B. Laird, Philadelphia.

New Moderator Named
ST. PAUL, Minn., May 23.—Dr. Clelland B. McAfee of Chicago was elected moderator of the 141st general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States of America here today.

He defeated Dr. Robert Tuck Wilson of the faculty of Princeton theological seminary, Princeton, N. J.

Election of Dr. McAfee, a professor of the Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Chicago, formerly of the McCormick Seminary, occurred 27 years after he came to St. Paul for his honeymoon.

Dr. McAfee was nominated by Dr. Josiah Sibley of Pasadena, Cal., the nomination was seconded by Frank J. Loesch, Chicago attorney who was recently appointed to President Hoover's crime commission.

Dr. Clelland B. McAfee, the new moderator, is an uncle of Mrs. W. M. Campbell, wife of the superintendent of the Roseburg schools. He will be one of the speakers at the Oregon synod, which meets in

Albany the third week in July, and nominates Rev. R. W. Achon, pastor of the Presbyterian church in this city. Arrangements have also been made to have Dr. McAfee speak at the local church on July 21.

Scotch Church to Merge
EDINBURGH, Scotland, May 24.—The Church of Scotland and the United Free Church of Scotland and their respective assemblies today agreed by overwhelming majorities to unite.

The formal act of union will take place in October.

Today's vote made final an affirmative decision on the momentous question for these great Presbyterian churches, negotiations regarding which have been in progress for the past twenty years.

In the Church of Scotland assembly, the report from the lower church courts was unanimously favorable to union, but in the United Free church a considerable minority stood out against it.

At today's meeting of the Church of Scotland assembly, the Duke and Duchess of York were present in the throne gallery.

RIALTO BUILDING, SEATTLE, GUTTED BY \$400,000 FIRE

SEATTLE, May 24.—Damage estimated at \$400,000 was caused today by a fire which swept through the Rialto building in the heart of the business section. The blaze was the most spectacular in downtown Seattle for several years. The Rialto building, a two-story structure, extends along Second avenue from Madison to Spring street.

All available fire apparatus in the downtown district was called out to battle the flames which were brought under control at 9 a. m., three hours after the fire started. Thousands of persons were delayed in reaching work because traffic and street car lines were blocked.
