WILL DEDICATE NEW CAMAS VALLEY CHURCH SUNDAY

All-Day Program Arranged to Celebrate Completion of New Edifice by Methodists.

The new Methodist church building recently constructed at Camas Valley is to be dedicated Sunday at an all-day service. The community has been fifteen years without a Methodist church building, following the destruction of the former building by fire. Plans were made in 1928 for a new church building and the work has now been completed. Wilford Brown, W. G. Reetz, Wm. M. Porter, Ruth Lawson, Guy Lawson and L. D. Roberts, being the members of the building committee.

The new edifice is an attractive structure, erected by T. Rodley and W. T. Bergh, and is well adapted for all church needs.

A fine dedicatory program has been arranged for presentation Sunday. An orchestra will play at 10 o'clock followed by congregational singing and special devotional and musical numbers. Frank Grubbe of Wilbur, it to sing at both the morning and afternoon programs. Bishop Titus Lowe will be present and will speak in the morning and afternoon. There will be a basket dinner at noon and the dedicatory sermon will be presented during the afternoon program at 2 o'clock. OLDEST NATIVE OF OREGON DIES; KIN TO DOUGLAS FOLK

(Associated Press Local Wire) PORTLAND, May 24.—Funeral services were held here today for David A. Carter, 87, said to be the oldest white native of the Oregon territory. He died Wednesday, Mr. Carter was born March 19, 1842, on the old Methodist mission farm at Wheatland, not far distant from Salem. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. David Carter, members of the party which Rev. Jason Lee brought to Oregon in 1840.

The father was first in charge of the mission at The Dalles, and a year later took charge of the mission farm. Mr. Carter was born the spring Dr. John McLoughlin founded Oregon City.

During the last few years Mr. Carter resided in Portland.

Surviving are two brothers, J. K. Carter, Portland, and S. N. Carter, Roseburg; a son, Frank L. Carter, Sheridan; two daughters, Mrs. M. C. Miller, Portland, and Mrs. Rena McHugh, Reedsport.

Services will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking Co. chapel Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock with Rev. Hald in charge of the service. Interment will be made at the Masonic cemetery.

MRS. M. BRUTON, RIVERSIDE, PASSES AT AGE 54 YEARS

Mrs. Minnie Bell Bruton, wife of Anthony Bruton, passed away yesterday afternoon at the Mercy hospital after a long illness. Mrs. Bruton was 54 years of age and had resided here 9 years, coming from Tulsa, Colorado. She leaves her husband and a daughter, Mrs. G. G. Benfield of Clatskanie, Kansas and two sons, Glade and Roy, of Roseburg.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23.—Medium extra eggs declined one cent to 25 cents today. Other egg grades and all butter grades remained at Wednesday's figures.

Poultry and dressed meats were steady.

The prospects of unlimited lamb chops for breakfast loomed today with the bottom fallen out of the auction market. Stockyards had cut something like a full dollar off the price with the wholesale meat merchants following suit for the dressed products.

Yearling lambs went from 25 and 25 cents to 15 and 20, and spring lambs dropped from 30 and 32 cents to 25 and 28 cents.

The lamb supply has kept up but demand appears to have fallen off to a marked extent.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24.—A drop of one cent to 41 in firsts in butter and an advance of half a cent to 26 in medium firsts eggs were the only price changes today.

Butter receipts were reported unusually large and there was a consequent easier tone in the market.

Storage of both eggs and butter is progressing well.

Large receipts of poultry may mean a slight price decline before the week is over.

The demand and the limited supply of strawberries tend to keep the price firm.

Country dressed meats and pork were steady. The lamb demand was still weak and easier in price, as reported Thursday.
