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HOME UNITY MEANS
PRESTIGE ABROAD,
MUSSOLINI SAYSItalian Premier Declares
Facism Will Produce
More Respect and
More Fear.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
ROME, May 23.—A united Italy, with its masses joined in support of the governing regime, was envisaged by Premier Mussolini in a speech reviewing Italy's foreign policy before the chamber of deputies late last night. The chamber, after listening to 11 Duce's remarks, adopted the which for the foreign office of which he is titular head.

"When a country is weak and disordered it can have no great foreign policy," the Italian dictator said. "The Italian people must be unified, the masses made compact, to be heard abroad. We may say with all assurance now that Italy is being heard and respected; we may add that through the fascist regime Italy tomorrow will be still more respected and still more feared."

Bouquets at Self
He declared that Italian prestige in the world had been greatly increased during his premiership and he pointed to the increasing diffusion of the Italian language in the Americas as a sure index of his contentment. He referred also to the Italian diplomatic and consular services, asserting that all foreign office functionaries knew how best to represent a victorious fascist Italy.

The conference on reparations at Paris was considered briefly, the premier remarking that the experts were near an agreement and that despite several reports to the contrary Italian interests had been safeguarded. He declared that plans announced by him seven years ago would be applied.

The Jugoslav situation demanded calm and sang froid, he said, remarking that when the pact of friendship of 1924 was not renewed recently one might have thought a crisis was at hand.

"As a matter of fact," he said, "the treaty was dead before it became forfeited. It would not have been sincere to renew a pact of friendship which never existed. We are under no illusions, but at the same time we hope that those leading Jugoslavia will strive toward a sincere friendship with Italy."

**CATHOLIC COIN BACKS
ALABAMA WOMEN FOES,
TOM HEFLIN ASSERTS**

WASHINGTON, May 22.—A charge that Catholic interests were financing the Alabama women's league for white supremacy headed by Mrs. Mabel Jones West of Birmingham, was made in the senate today by Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama.

The senator called the organization "bogus" and said the statement recently issued by it was first conceived by Roman Catholic influence. The statement he referred to said Heflin did not represent the views of the people of Alabama.

The real purpose of the organization, Heflin said, was to permit attacks by some candidates who considered to run against the senator when he comes up for re-election next year.

"Mrs. West had to get an organization in order to get money from the Catholic church," Heflin declared. "How much will she receive for her services to Rome?"

AUTO SPEED KINGS
GETTING READY FOR
500-MILE CLASSIC

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 23.—Automobiles entered in the annual 500-mile race to be held here May 30, underwent their final tearing down and rebuilding today in preparation for the qualifying trials which will begin Saturday.

The cars must be driven at a minimum average speed of 90 miles an hour for ten miles. The thirty-three fastest of the 45 entered will be eligible to compete for the \$100,000 prize money. The drivers have expressed the opinion that the slowest car to qualify will average better than 100 miles an hour.

The withdrawal of Cliff Durant, millionaire sportsman, was announced last night. Durant, who is 35 years old, said he no longer left "the reckless abandon" necessary for success on the speedway and was ready to admit that "fast riding is a youngster's game."

Peter Kreis, who has had several years' experience in big league racing, will replace Durant behind the wheel of a car which Tommy Milon, former racing champion, but now retired, has been building for the last year.

**CANTONESE ROUT
HOSTILE FORCES**

CANTON, China, May 23.—A statement by the Cantonese military authorities today predicted their complete victory within a week over the Kwangsi troops after the surrender yesterday of 25,000 Kwangsi soldiers at Lupao, 25 miles northwest of Canton.

For the time being, this ended the Kwangsi military menace to Canton, which had dwelt in the shadow of pillage for weeks.

Out of an army of 14,000 the Cantonese stated that 5,000 men had surrendered, 3,000 were casualties and the remaining 6,000 were retreating before hot pursuit of a Cantonese army northwest of Lupao.

Three months of unsettled conditions are prophesied by some observers.

PROTESTS SENATE
BAN ON NEWS MEN

Suffers Unjustly Because
of Erroneous Report
of Rival of Vote
on Lenroot.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The following letter was sent to Vice-President Curtis today by the chief of the Washington bureau of the Associated Press:

"Dear Mr. President:

"As a result of an announcement yesterday by the president of the senate, the Associated Press finds itself deprived through no fault of its own of the privilege of access to the senate floor—a privilege which has been accorded it continuously for many years and which it never has abused.

"Naturally the newspapers making up the Associated Press have received this announcement with surprise and regret. Many of them have inquired by telephone why the Associated Press should be penalized because of an incident in which it had no part whatever. Under the circumstances I know I voice the sentiment of the Associated Press of the entire country in making formal protest, and asking that this protest be made a part of the senate record.

"I am sure that most senators already know that the information regarding a secret senate session recently published by the United Press could have been obtained by us, but that no effort was made to compile it for publication. We refrained from such publication because we had reason to believe that the information available was likely, in the nature of the case, to be inaccurate, and we felt that under no circumstances should we publish a roll call which would misrepresent the position of any senator. It now has appeared that this surmise was correct.

"I invite attention to the fact that accuracy was the compelling consideration, and that the Washington bureau of the Associated Press never has and does not now subscribe to any theory that publication of secret proceedings, if the publication is accurate, is in any wise beyond the legitimate function of a free press.

"What action the senate may see fit to take against a press agency which describes senate proceedings inaccurately is, of course, a matter between the senate and

CARKIN'S RIGHT TO
OREGON TAX BOARD
SEAT QUESTIONED

Newspaper at Capital Sees
Possibility of Court
Action to Quash
Appointment.

Journal Asserts Naming of
Ex-Legislator Clashes
With Opinion of
Van Winkle.

SALEM, Ore., May 23.—The Capital Journal says today that there is possibility of an injunction suit against the state board of control to quash the appointment of John H. Carkin of Medford as a member of the state tax commission provided by an act of the 1929 legislature.

The appointment of Carkin, announced Wednesday by the state board, the Journal will say, "is plainly contrary to advice contained in an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle, written several weeks ago in reply to an inquiry by Governor Patterson when Carkin's appointment was first under consideration. Carkin's membership on the board, unless substantiated by an opinion of the supreme court, will mean that every act of the commission will be in danger of attack in the courts on grounds of illegality. Van Winkle's opinion is based on a decision of the Oregon supreme court in the case of state ex rel. Smith vs. Kozier, which involved the status of the supreme court itself, the question at issue being whether the court of seven justices constituted seven officers or only one. The court held that it was only one officer."

SOVIET OFFICIALS
AND EDUCATOR DIE
FOR REVOLT PLOT

MOSCOW, May 23.—Three high Soviet officials and a professor at the Leningrad mining institute have been executed by order of the state political administration for "counter-revolutionary" activity in an official communique announced today.

The three men were sentenced to death yesterday and 150 communists were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.

The communique stated that "the state political department has discovered counter-revolutionary organizations in the railway, transport, gold and platinum industries, which were seeking to overthrow the Soviet power by acts of pernicious sabotage and disorganization with the aid of foreign complicity."

Van Winkle Quoted
Van Winkle began his opinion to the governor by saying: "I have for consideration your letter requesting my opinion whether or not a member of the thirty-fifth legislative assembly is qualified for appointment as a member of the state tax commission, as provided by house bill No. 199 of said assembly, which is chapter 466, General Laws of Oregon, 1929."

"The attorney general ended, after citing authority, by: "My opinion therefore is that your question should be answered in the negative."

Citing the supreme court opinion in the Smith vs. Kozier case as authority, Van Winkle held that it was only one officer."

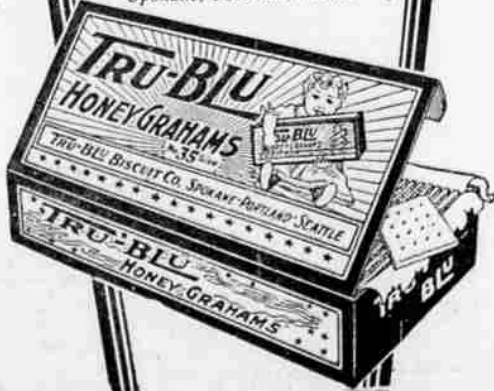
