J. O. Arthur is here from state to move his family to that state. They are well known here and a host of friends regret their departure. Mr. Arthur has been away several months.

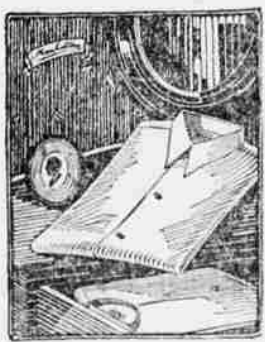
Powers Expected—

DETROIT WINS 21 INNING GAME FROM WHITE SOX, 6 TO 5

Athletics Keep Up Winning Streak as Yankees Drop Another Game; Cubs Top National.

(Associated Press Special Wire)
With hardly anything but the same outcome at stake, the Tigers and the White Sox punched and jabbed at each other for twenty-one innings at Comiskey park yesterday, thereby removing the spotlight from the efforts of the Athletics to win the field. The Tigers won the marathon by 6 to 5, and did regain a virtual tie with the Yankees, but both clubs stood five games behind the flying Mackle-fives behind the flying Mackle-fives. Ted Lyons went the route against Detroit, and George Thibault pitched twenty of the twenty-one innings. The veteran Detroit right-hander gave way to a pinch runner in the twenty-first inning but recovered credit for the victory, his eighth in succession this season. Left Stoner finished for him.

The game was three rounds short of the American league record and five below the memorable draw played by the Braves and the Robins on May 1, 1920. Only four contests ever went longer than the Detroit-White Sox battle, however—the two record clashes and a pair of 22-inning games in the National league.

Mackmen Going Strong
The Athletics are rapidly growing into as great a menace to the peace of seven American league clubs as the Yankees were for three seasons. The flying Mackle-fives made it nine in a row yesterday by cutting the Senators, 19 to 3, at Shille park. Fox, Simmons and Cochrane went on a home run of the lot for the senators.

The Red Sox helped the Mackle-fives by whitewashing the Yankees, 5 to 0, at the Fenway. Danny MacFayden gave the champions just four hits and never was in danger.

The Browns kept pace with the Athletics by trouncing the Indians, 5 to 0, at Cleveland. Sammy Gray gave seven scattered hits.

Cubs Lead in Lead.
The battle for the leadership of the National league swung back to the favor of the Cubs yesterday, despite two home runs by Jim Bottomley. The result was three runs for the Cubs and a 5 to 4 decision which returned them to the lead by half a game.

The Giants extended their winning streak to three consecutive games by judiciously bunching their hits against the Braves at the Polo grounds. The clan McGraw won rather handily by 7 to 3.

The Robins chased the Phillies by 3 to 2 at Ebbets field in the remaining National league contest. The Cincinnati-Pittsburgh game was postponed because of rain.

Study Reveals the Life of U. S. Buildings
Average Ranges From 33 Years for Wooden Structure to 55 Years for Steel.

CHICAGO, May 25.—A two-year study of American buildings, sponsored by the National Association of Real Estate Boards, has disclosed that the average life of a wooden one-family dwelling in the United States is only 33 1/3 years.

One-family houses of other construction, such as steel, concrete or masonry, says the special committee report, last for 50 years. The average drops down for houses built "in roya" in from 30 to 45 years, depending on the materials used in construction. Two, three and four family houses appear to last even less time.

The average for houses in general is about 40 years.

The lowest life-span for any buildings included in the survey is attributed to theatres constructed of wood. Their average existence is approximately 20 years.

Theatres of all types of construction show a general average life less than that recorded for any other buildings.

The committee attributes this fact chiefly to the fickleness of the public in changing its taste for amusement with great frequency.
