GLENDAL PLANS FOR BIG BOOSTER MEETING IN JUNE

GLENDAL, May 25.—A special booster meeting and banquet to be held about June 20th, although no definite date was set, for the purpose of stimulating local interest in the chamber's projects, and for interesting and acquainting the people of Cow Creek in the chamber, was decided on by the Glendale Chamber of Commerce at a meeting held in the city hall last Monday evening. The Chamber of Commerce plans on having as its guests that evening all residents of this district who may be interested in the endeavors of the chamber to further the common welfare of the southern end of Douglas county. It is hoped to have several good speakers here for the occasion.

Secretary Glenn L. Wardrip was instructed to extend an invitation to Professor Irving Vining of Ashland, Oregon, ex-president of the State Chamber of Commerce, to attend and favor with an address. The officers of the local chamber intend to present and discuss a number of proposed objectives of the organization at this special booster meeting.

At the meeting held last Monday night it was also decided to have representatives of the chamber confer with the city council regarding arrangements for the permanent lighting of the Glendale arch located at the west end of Sether avenue.

SETHER BROTHERS WILL MAKE TESTS WITH BLUE GRASS

(News-Review Douglas County Special.)
GLENDAL, May 25.—Oliver G. Sether, who is associated with the Sether Bros. ranch just east of this city, drove to Medford last Saturday to visit with friends and spent Sunday viewing part of the Rogue River valley near Jacksonville and also a portion of the Applegate valley. He says conditions look favorable for good crops this year in those localities. The outlook for a large crop of alfalfa, especially encouraging, despite the rumors early this spring of heavy frost damage. He also visited the well known Handley ranch near Jacksonville and was especially interested in their crop of bulbous bluegrass being raised for seed purposes.

This bulbous bluegrass appears to have originated in the Rogue River valley as efforts to trace its origin elsewhere have failed so far. This grass gets its name—bulbous bluegrass—from its peculiar seed which is in the form of small bulbs instead of the small hard seed kernels common to most grasses. This grass is nutritious and rich in food values and is an excellent winter feed for all kinds of stock as it commences growth with the early fall rains, stands cold weather well, and reaches maturity in early spring after having attained a growth of from 12 to 18 inches. During the summer the grass dries and lays dormant. The grass plants are shallow rooted and grow in clumps, forming a sort of mat over the ground and this feature is made use of to smother and choke out noxious grasses and weeds such as bronzo grass, squirrel grass, etc., that over-run fields and pastures in some localities. Alfalfa growers with fields full of various weeds and grass pests have been trying out this bulbous bluegrass and find it a big help in cleaning up their alfalfa fields. The bulbous bluegrass, when sown in new burns seems to do especially well. It will grow readily on most of the hills in this section and should make a most excellent winter forage for cattle ranging these hills.

Sether Bros. have sown a small patch of ground with this new grass in order to try it out. Several other Cow Creek ranchers are also getting small amounts of this grass seed and are planning to try it and if it does what is claimed for it, and comes up to expectations of the growers, a few years hence will see the stockmen here sowing more and more of their grazing acreage with this bulbous bluegrass and will see the ranchers clearing more and more to help rid their fields from various noxious grasses and weeds growing.

WILL PUT WALKS ON COW CREEK BRIDGE
