back discovered he had attempted to make good his threat. He was taken to a hospital. An eminent Paris physician was summoned to remove the bullet.

Prince de Sagan acquired his title recently when his father renounced it. He has a younger sister and three half brothers, sons of his mother by her first marriage to Count Boni De Castellane, a cousin of the Duke De Talleyrand.

Sweetheart Is Loyal

The prince's sweetheart is the 21-year-old daughter of an architect of southern France. She came to Paris with her family at Whit-sunday at the same time De Sagan came home for his vacation, both wishing to be married immediately.

Her family was told of the shooting immediately every day since she has visited the young man at his hospital.

It was said today the Duke De Talleyrand had been most surprised at the depth of his son's emotion but had counseled delay because of French tradition and a conviction of danger in hasty marriages. His mother, after the son's fearful entreaties, even suggested he might have their permission when he had reached 20, just a few months since, but he was adamant.

At the hospital it was said there was hardly any hope for the young prince. His deep emotion and mental depression has cut down his resistance seriously.

force the prohibition laws of the country.

The Post quotes Mr. Carter as saying:

"I can do no more; the rest is up to President Hoover. Post though I am I have given thousands of dollars to support the prohibition cause of this country and I resent this importation of liquor by foreigners into the United States. I look at this question in a different way from most people, and it was in that spirit I sent my letter to the British ambassador."

Henry Ford's View.

WASHINGTON, May 25—Henry Ford wants to see the prohibition law enforced rather than modified.

That was the burden—as far as he let it be known afterward, at any rate—of his luncheon conversation with President Hoover yesterday at the White House.

"Prohibition is here to stay," he told newspaper men as he emerged from the White House.

"Prohibition must be enforced. There can be no turning back. I do not believe the people of the country want modification."
