E. B. Lemon, Registrar at State College, Speaker at Commencement Exercises.

Seniors Making Plans to Continue Education by Attending Colleges and Universities.

GLENDALE, May 27.—The commencement exercises of the Glendale high school were held last Friday evening at the high school auditorium. The senior class colors of green and gold were in the stage background with flowers and greenery, together with the many lovely baskets and bouquets of flowers presented by personal friends of the graduates all combined to make a beautiful stage setting.

A splendid program was given. E. B. Lemon, registrar at the Oregon State college at Corvallis, was the principal speaker of the evening and his topic was "What Is Education?" Mr. Lemon has the happy faculty of being interesting as well as instructive and has a dynamic personality that holds the attention of his audience, both young and old. In his talk he emphasized the value of young people early in life deciding on their plans for their future, since time is such a precious element in life. "The acquiring of the mastery in some particular field of endeavor should be the objective of every young man or woman," was one of the points stressed by Mr. Lemon. Quoting Prof. David Starr Jordan, he told the graduates in conclusion, "The world steps aside for the man who knows where he is going."

The address of welcome was made by the class salutatorian, Miss Verna Kafer, who also thanked the citizens of Glendale, the school board and the school faculty, on behalf of the senior class, for the many advantages, privileges, courtesies and kindly help given them as students through their school days here.

The class valedictorian, Miss Mary Stevenson, had for her theme "Power of Personality," which she delivered in a very clear and able manner.

Miss Louise Boice, class historian, read a brief history of the class of '29 from the time the class commenced its high school career as freshmen back in September of 1929, up to the present time.

The class prophecy given by J. Renfrew Stevenson, presumed to be excerpts from a Glendale paper dated May, 1954, evoked considerable mirth from the audience.

A medal to be given the member of the senior class who rated highest in his class during the school year in loyalty, achievement and scholarship, was awarded by Prof. H. J. Swann to J. Renfrew Stevenson. In addition to receiving this medal he will be further honored by having his name engraved on a plaque that is an enlarged replica of the medal and which will hang on the wall of the high school study room.

Miss Mary Stevenson as president of the Glendale high school "Torch" honor society, read the names of the high school students who had during the past school year made an average standing of 90 per cent or better in their studies and they are as follows: Freshmen—Victor Coram, Iva Hill, Modene McCullum, Laura Bess and Melvin Trout; sophomores—Doreen Boice, Cecil Hill, Florence Coram, Herbert Selvidge, Margaret Stevenson and Lester Windsor; juniors—Irene Eakin, Edna Frost, Francis Nelson, Muriel Pollock and Katherine Strong; seniors—Edward I. Wm. B. Lesh, chairman of the board of education, made a few remarks and then presented diplomas to the following graduates of the high school: Mary Stephenson, Edward I. Damewood, Verna Kafer, Lucius Hurd, Jr., Louise Boice, Joseph Wirkkala, J. Renfrew Stevenson and Kenneth W. Brown. The following pupils having completed the 8th grade were also given diplomas attesting to their completion of the grammar grades: Bernice Martin, Opal Mosby, Lela Smith, Margaret Wirkkala, Hazel Belcher, Merlin Morey, Dan Lesh, George Jackson, Leslie Pote, Donald Snyder, Harry Humphreys, Walter Norman and Burton Smith.

A number of musical selections were included on the program for the evening. A violin solo, "Yankee Re-frain," was splendidly rendered by Miss Mildred Scott. Miss Louise Lesh and Miss Doreen Boice sang a beautiful duet, "Singing in the Rain." A small piano quintet composed of Edward Lawson, Bob Jackson, Dan Lesh, George Jackson and Tom Brown, sang two numbers which were very well received by the audience. Mrs. H. G. Paige played as a piano solo that lovely number, "Kamini Ostraw," in her usual capable and brilliant manner. Mrs. Paige also served as piano accompanist to all the other musical numbers given during the evening.

The invocation was to have been given by Rev. Charles C. Hulet, but through unforeseen circumstances he was unable to attend, so Prof. H. J. Swann substituted.

More Schooling Planned
The recent graduates from the Glendale high school all aspire to more schooling. Quite unlike so many young people upon graduation from high school, all of this year's class know what they want to do and they freely expressed their hopes and desires to the News-Review correspondent.

Lucius Hurd, Jr., eats and sleeps aeroplanes and his intention is to go to Portland and take a full course at the Rankin Flying school. Verna Kafer intends to work as a waitress this summer and next fall to enter a business college, probably at Portland, to fit herself for a business career. Edward I. Damewood intends to attend the Oregon State college at Corvallis for more schooling, as soon as he can see his way clear to do so. He will remain at home and work this summer. Kenneth W. Brown's parents now reside at Ashland and this makes things convenient for Kenneth as he will probably enroll at the Ashland school next fall.

Miss Helen Gaffney hopes to either enter the University of Washington or the Hall School of Commerce at Seattle next fall—just which he has not decided at this time. J. Renfrew Stevenson intends to work here this summer and if possible will go to Corvallis to attend Oregon State college next fall.

Bagley will attend summer school at the Oregon State college and he and his wife will spend the summer at Corvallis. Miss Mildred Scott will spend her vacation with her folks at Monmouth. Miss Helen Gaffney's home is at Oregon City, where she will spend the summer. Miss Ida Frank has her home at Stayton but she intends to spend most of the summer visiting in California.

Mrs. Alma Archambeau, Miss Florence Johnson and Mrs. Myrtle Wunch expect to enjoy their vacation right at home in Glendale.

All of this year's high school and grade teachers have been re-engaged for next year by the board of education, with two exceptions. Prof. H. J. Swann is taking up another position and will not return here. W. Ray Parker, now principal of schools at Butte Falls, Oregon, has been elected as principal here for the coming year. Miss Helen Rostvold desired to take up other work so did not renew her contract here. Her place on the high school faculty staff will be taken by Miss Helen Gregg of Corvallis.

Miss Maxine Stearns of Roseburg made a visit to Oakland during the week end.

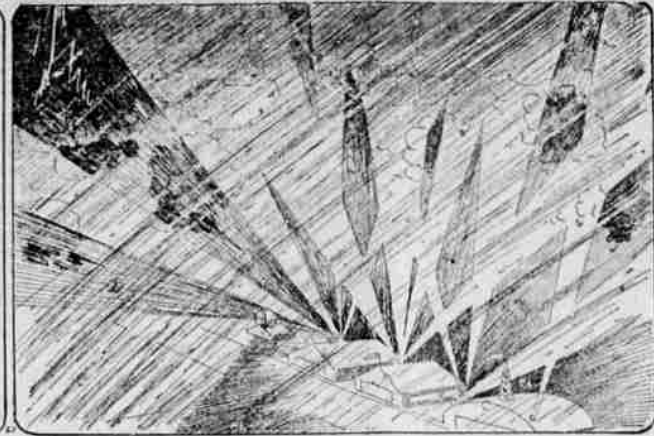

CALIFORNIA ON GUARD AGAINST FLORIDA PEST

LOS ANGELES, May 25.—Rigid measures of fruit inspection on the state boundary will prevent a California invasion of the Mediterranean fruit fly, it is believed, of the California Fruit growers' exchange said here today upon return from a survey

of the situation in Florida. Wogium suggested a fruit fly inspection service be organized in the state as a preventive measure. Due to the arid climate of the state, which keeps down the growth of wild plants, Wogium believed should the fly invade California it could be easily stamped out since there would be little vegetation to harbor the pest.

He pointed out that this was the chief obstacle confronting the authorities in Florida.

BONEBRAKE MADE

CANADA HAS NEW
EXPLOSIVE BETTER
THAN ONE IN USE

KINGSTON, Ont., May 26.—(Canadian Press)—According to information received here from Ottawa, "amotol" is the name of the new substance said to have been experimented with recently as a high explosive at the Petawawa military camp. It is said that amotol is a recent production of British chemical engineers and is already being used in some of the new guns with which armory divisions of the British army have recently been armed.

The guns themselves are of a secret mechanism, while experts all over the empire, it is stated, declare the composition is also "secret and confidential."

Experiments are being carried out by the military authorities of all the dominions of the British empire with amotol, and it is stated here that provided the cost of manufacture is no greater than that of cordite, the new explosive will eventually be adopted as the charge of the quick-firing guns.

One of the features of the new explosive, it is said, is that there is no charred residue of the envelope containing the charge as there is in the case of cordite. In cartridges of quick-firing guns, charged with cordite, the charge is contained in a cotton envelope and on opening the breech, immediately after firing the remains of this envelope still remain in the empty cylinder, charred and smouldering, but when amotol is used the whole content of the cartridge case is immediately consumed.
