PORTLAND, Ore., May 27.—The most outstanding feature of the local produce market today was the big decline in the price of cantaloupes. The price was slashed almost in half by a leading produce company, crates dropping to \$4.50 and \$6.50 wholesale. Retail prices may soon be at 15 cents each, or perhaps as low as two for 25 cents.

Strawberries were more plentiful, but the demand over the week-end kept the price firm. More Oregon berries were coming on the market. A few warm days were expected to bring a cut in price.

New potatoes were a half cent higher at 61 and 7.

Oregon lettuce was plentiful and cheap at \$1.25 to \$1.50 a crate.

No changes were made in egg or butter.

Poultry and dressed meats were also unchanged.

## ONE SPOUSE TOO MANY; MINISTER SENT TO PRISON

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 26.—D. J. Good, alias D. J. Goodrich, was taken to Salem Saturday to start a four-year term in state prison. He was given the maximum sentence here when he entered a plea of guilty to a charge of bigamy.

Good, a former Ohio minister, came to Klamath Falls eight months ago under the name of Goodrich, and married a prominent and wealthy widow here. When local officers discovered that Good had a wife living in Ohio, and that he had never obtained a divorce from her, they went to arrest him only to find that he had left for Spokane.

He was arrested there and returned to face the charge.

Good broke down before the court and sobbed for leniency. His pleas were seconded by the Rev. L. W. Bennett, of the Methodist church here, who was one of the complaining witnesses.
