

MONOGRAPH TELLS TEN DAYS' BATTLE OF BELLEAU WOOD

One of Major Engagements
of World War Ready in
Print for Reunion
of 2nd Division.

Tribute in German Report
Embodied; Record Will
Become Text for
War Studies.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—When 2000 former members of the second division meet in Boston, May 30 to June 1, eleventh anniversary of the beginning of the Belleau wood engagement, their celebrated historical committee will announce the completion of the Belleau wood monograph.

They may read the history that they made in ten, high-spirited attacks in Belleau wood, June 1, to July 18, 1918.

It comes from the pen of John W. Thompson, Jr., author-illustrator, captain of the United States marines, and is part of the gigantic second division historical section project in which German original army records were checked with those of the American army to insure accuracy. Captain Thompson spent three months in Ger-

many. Every statement of his monograph is supported by reference. Maps of his own sketching will aid the second division "regiment" in their reminiscence over the Belleau battleground. And Captain Thompson's clear-cut word pictures will bring back the scenes.

German Praise
A verbatim translation of German military expert's first impressions of Americans in action, June 1, 1918.
"Gangs of men—ten to twenty strong. Brave conduct. Alcohol. Some of the wounded carried on despite their injuries. Our men have thrown grenades into those clumps of men; enemy didn't pay any attention to them. Not a bit of knowledge of tactical principles. Shot while they walk with their rifles under their arms. Carry no grenades but use knives, pistols, riflebutts and bayonets. Big, husky fellows. Everyone of them. (Rowdies). Absolutely no military bearing."

The thick of battle:
"Small, desperate groups rushed more than half way across the open without between the woods and the Lucy Toray road; their bodies were salvaged weeks afterward."

Again:
"The day's fighting had been of the closest and most savage description. The woods were so thick that all action was local and individual. The Germans had posted snipers and machine gunners in trees, and every path and clearing was commanded from masked positions."

The Belleau wood monograph is third in a series of five which will comprise a complete war history of the second division. After being proof-read for accuracy by 100 commanders, the entire history will be shrouded down to text size for use in military schools.

SHRINERS TO SEE GREAT PAGEANT AT LOS ANGELES MEET

Million Dollar Show Will
Be Staged for Benefit
of Visiting Host
of 100,000.

Serious Side of Conclave
to Deal Largely With
More Hospitals for
Needy Children.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., May 28.—A \$1,000,000 motion picture electrical pageant, the most colorful display in the history of the Shrine meetings, is the highlight of the 55th annual conclave, which opens here June 4.

Parading before 30,000 spectators in Los Angeles Coliseum, 40 illuminated floats, forming a line two miles long, will be interspersed by music, riding in brilliantly lighted automobiles.

In addition to seven major events scheduled as the entertainment features, five performances of a circus and several parades will be held in the huge stadium.

Expect 100,000 to Attend

The absolute lack of hotel accommodations will force many of the 100,000 delegates and their families to live in special trains which will bear them here.

Although the formal opening of the three-day convention will not take place until June 4, a special pre-convention trip to Catalina Island is planned for June 3. A march of 40 Shrine bands and thousands of Shriner boys in colorful regalia to the Coliseum will take place the first day. The parade is in honor of Leo P. Youngworth, who will be elected imperial potentate at the meeting.

Following the afternoon festivities, a real Hawaiian banquet will be served to the delegates and their wives at the Biltmore hotel. Many special dishes, peculiar to the Hawaiian Islands, will be prepared by a native chef.

Plan Spanish Fiesta
The second day some 6000 Shriner will travel by special train to Santa Susanna, where they will participate in a Spanish fiesta and barbecue. The roasting of whole steers and the preparing of 40 Spanish dishes is to be one unusual feature.

Thousands of marchers will carry illuminated novelties in the Oriental parade to be given that night. At the close of the brilliant spectacles two formal balls will open at the Biltmore and Ambassador hotels.

High jinks and unusual features have been promised for the closing day, which will be featured by the election of officers for the coming year. In the evening, the electrical motion picture pageant, the outstanding feature of the convention, will be held. Election of the imperial officer, grand marshal, lowest ranking officer, the only one which will occasion any considerable attention at the meeting, since all other officers move up one grade.

One of the most important moves by the Shriner during the coming year will be advancement of the crippled children movement, according to Imperial Potentate-elect Youngworth.

New Head Telle Aims
"During the last seven years we have erected 15 hospitals in which we have cared for more than 30,000 children of all races and creeds," he said. "During the coming year we plan to erect three more."

"They will be situated in western New York, Kentucky and Pittsburgh. Other than that, I have definite plans. I hope to increase and direct in a definite way the basic ideas of the Shrine, which are the promotion of friendship, happiness and the doing of charitable deeds in a big way."

Youngworth is a practicing attorney of the firm of Youngworth, McLean & Hartman in Los Angeles. He is married and has three children.

As a post-convention feature, approximately 600 Shriner will board the liner Malolo on a four-day trip to the Hawaiian Islands. The pilgrimage is to the Aloha Temple in honor of Youngworth.

FLAXSEED TARIFF GOES TO 63 CTS. PER BUSHEL

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The house ways and means committee today decided to recommend an amendment to the tariff bill to increase the duty on flaxseed to 63 cents a bushel. The measure now proposed a 50-cent rate as against a present duty of 40 cents.

The president recently raised this rate to 55 cents under the tariff bill.

A rate of \$10 a ton on broom corn also would apply to rice fiber and rice straw.
