FATHER FACING GRAVE CHARGES FROM CHILDREN

charged his father with unpeppable immoralities involving his sisters and declared that, considering the "day of the land" at the ranch, Franklin could not have taken the wife and son to the railroad station. Nor did Irene ever have a letter from her mother, the boy said.

Murder Proof Lacking
While Johnson declared he believed the children's story, word was received from Sheriff Robert Hill and W. E. Maeson, Porterville police chief, that the same accusations had been made to members of the Franklin family shortly after Mrs. Franklin disappeared from the ranch but that an investigation had failed to reveal evidence of foul play. Hill and Maeson are to question the children and their father here again today.

The two Tulare county officers said that when they searched about the Sears ranch, on which the family lived, they found remains of dead cattle but no trace of the missing mother and son.

W. A. Sears, Porterville real estate agent and owner of the ranch is quoted as saying that Franklin told him he had received a letter from Mrs. Franklin and that she was running a rooming house in Portland. Shortly after this, Sears said, Franklin and his daughters and son left the ranch.

LINDY AND ANNE WEDDING VERY SIMPLE AFFAIR

her fiancé a few moments before the ceremony.

Colonel Lindbergh wore a blue business suit of the sort that has been his favorite garb in flights about the country.

Each guest was given a piece of the wedding cake.

Whole Affair Simple
Dr. Brown describing the wedding said:

"There were no special decorations. The very simplest wedding ceremony was used at the request of the family. It was a very unusual and very brief ritual, designed to use a minimum of words and time."

"There was no best man and there were no bridal attendants. Ambassador Morrow gave his daughter away."

"The bride was very charming and very lovely. She wore a white veil and a white dress. Colonel Lindbergh wore a plain business suit."

"Miss Morrow was quite composed during the entire ceremony. Colonel Lindbergh was entirely at ease. He hasn't any nerves."

"He was so far from being a nervous bridegroom that there was no fumbling of the ring and I didn't even see it."

Dr. Brown explained that he omits the word "obey" from the marriage service unless requested to use it. He said the other omissions were at the suggestion of Colonel Lindbergh.

Honeymoon in Air
Possibility that the couple were planning a flying honeymoon was seen in orders received at Roosevelt field from Colonel Lindbergh that his blue Falcon plane be conditioned and ready for flight.

At the field the only information obtainable was that a heavy oil line had been repaired and the plane found in perfect condition after a test flight.

After the wedding it was learned that the marriage license was obtained by Colonel Lindbergh May 20, the second anniversary of the start of his historic flight to Le Bourget field, Paris. John A. Manson, registrar of the Englewood board of health, who issued the license, was pledged to secrecy.

Romance Born in Mexico
Colonel Lindbergh is 27 years old and his bride is 22. Their romance began when Lindbergh was received at the American embassy in

Mexico City on his goodwill tour December 14, 1927. At that time Miss Morrow was a senior at Smith college, where she had made something of a name for herself as a poet with contributions to college publications.

The spotlight which was focused upon the young flyer soon disclosed a girl in the picture, but for a time it was believed that it was Miss Elizabeth Morrow to whom he was paying court.

Colonel Lindbergh and Miss Anne, however, were seen in each other's company with increasing frequency until all doubt was set at rest last February 12, when Ambassador Morrow announced the engagement in Mexico City. At that time Colonel Lindbergh was in Cuba on a good will tour.

Colonel Lindbergh flew from San Diego, Cal., an obscure air mail pilot in the spring of 1927 and then from Long Island flew the Atlantic to fame. Since then his every move has been followed with keen public interest and he became known as the "good will ambassador" of the air by his flights to Mexico and Central America. He now is associated with several airplane enterprises in the capacity of technical adviser and has been especially interested in the development of international air mail routes. He also is connected with the government air service in an advisory capacity.

ALLEGED CHECK ARTIST BE HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Officers have so far been able to gain little information regarding Walter Stewart, who was recently arrested on a bad check charge. He was found in custody of an automobile which officers thought had been stolen, but so far they have been unable to prove that such was the case. Stewart was arraigned on a charge of passing worthless checks and waived examination, being ordered held for the grand jury with bail fixed at \$1,000.

RULES BOARD OF SENATE FAVORS OPEN ROLL CALL

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Publication hereafter of all roll calls taken in executive sessions of the senate in the consideration of nominations was recommended to the senate today by its rules committee.

The committee also recommended that in the future, only a majority vote, instead of the two-thirds vote now required, be necessary for the consideration of a nomination in open session.

The committee, however, rejected the motion of Senator La Follette, republican, Wisconsin, to restore the privilege of the senate floor to representatives of the press associations.
