NEW CHRISTIAN CHURCH AT GLIDE TO BE DEDICATED

All-Day Program Arranged
to Mark Completion
of the Fine Church
Edifice.

GLIDE, May 28.—The dedicatory
services for the fine new Christian
church building at Glide will be
held Sunday, June 2nd. There
will be an all-day meeting with a
basket dinner in the basement
banquet hall of the new building
at noon. Rev. Stanley Bond of
Eugene will conduct preaching
services at 11 o'clock in the morn-
ing and at 8 o'clock in the eve-
ning. The dedicatory sermon will
be delivered by Rev. W. H. Baird
of Roseburg at 2 o'clock in the af-
ternoon. Mrs. Stanley Bond, whose
wonderful solos have delighted
Glide audiences on several occa-
sions, will sing at each of the
meetings.

Each of the Christian churches
of the county will have delegations
at the ceremonies and it is ex-
pected that the Eugene Bible uni-
versity will also be represented.
Sunday school will convene at
the regular time—9:50 a. m. Mrs.
Paul Caswell will render a spe-
cial vocal solo and the church or-
chestra will provide special music
for the opening.

The building, construction of
which was begun early in January
of this year, is modern through-
out and was carefully planned to
care of the needs of the Sunday
school and Young Peoples' meet-
ings as well as church services.
The auditorium has a seating ca-
pacity of 200 in addition to which
there are three class rooms, a
choir loft, rest rooms and a bat-
hroom. The interior is plastered
and finished in light oak panel-
ing.

architects and deserve a great deal
of credit for a workman-like job.

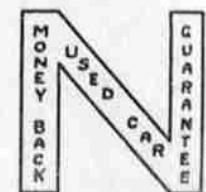

REVISED TARIFF SCHEDULE PUT UP TO CONGRESS

speets to President Hoover. It
meets his request for a reorganiza-
tion of the tariff commission by
providing authority for him to ter-
minate the terms of office of the
present six commissioners at his
will by the simple process of send-
ing the names of their successors
to the senate for its advice and
consent.

The recreated commission would
be composed of seven members, in-
stead of six, and the president
would be permitted to ignore po-
litical affiliations in making his
appointments. Under existing law,
not more than three commission-
ers may be of the same political
party.

Salaries of the commissioners
would be raised from \$7,500 to
\$12,000 and their terms would be
for seven years instead of twelve
as at present.

Latitude Allowed
To speed up the commission's
work in determining justification
for rate changes, the bill proposes
that it may consider differences
in conditions of competition be-
tween domestic and foreign arti-
cles in the principal markets of
the United States, instead of dif-
ferences in cost of production as
provided in the present law. Ex-
perience has proved that foreign
production costs virtually are un-
obtainable.

The president, in exercising his
power under the flexible clause,
which authorizes him to raise or
lower rates as much as 50 per
cent, would be allowed, if he de-
emed it necessary, to base rates on
the American selling price or to
reclassify articles in order to ef-
fect rate changes.

In addition, the executive would
be authorized to investigate meth-
ods for basing import duties on
some form of domestic valuation
instead of foreign valuation as at
present, and report to congress.
