Wise young people! Who wants to be famous on his honeymoon? Who wants to be greeted by admiring crowds and lionized and banqueted and made much of on such an occasion?

Lindy and Anne have added still further to their reputation for good sense.

THE New York stock market is nervous again, stocks falling sharply on the latest flurry.

The stock market will remain nervous as long as securities are selling at prices that are unjustified by their earning power. It will be better for the country when the level of stock prices gets back to something like a normal basis.

THOSE who own good securities, bought at prices based upon their earning power, and paid for—not bought on margin—have no cause for worry.

This country is fundamentally sound. It has tremendous capacity for the production of wealth. New methods, based upon scientific research, are cutting costs and increasing quality. An average earning power never before approached in the world's history is resulting in an astonishing consuming power. Wealth will go on increasing, and basic, justified values will go on increasing.

But the speculators must face a setback sooner or later. Values, in the long run, must be based upon earning power.

REV. Harry H. Clark, of Seattle, who is suing "Ma" Kennedy for breach of promise, admits in court that he owns but 30 cents in the world. But his affections, he claims, have been damaged to the extent of \$50,000.

So it appears, after all, that a lot of tender and easily bruised affections may prove to be a considerable asset.

FOURTEEN tracts of Oregon & California grant lands, located in eight counties in Western Oregon, are sold at the United States land office in Roseburg for \$81,561.65.

That is a small transaction, as timber sales go, but it is further proof that Oregon timber is a desired commodity. There will be other timber sales, private as well as public, and every sale will turn new money loose in Oregon.

MUCH wealth in Oregon is represented by timber. Generally speaking, we are anxious to see this timber wealth developed. Development of our natural resources means more payrolls and more prosperity.

But let us not overlook the important fact that replacement of our timber wealth means as much to us in the long run as development of it. Other timbered areas have seen a recession of prosperity when the timber was cut off.

Oregon does not want that to happen. The way to keep it from happening is by replacement of our timber supply through reforestation.

A NEW world's record for altitude for two-seated airplanes weighing less than 881 pounds was established yesterday at St. Louis when Barney Zimmeric, of Marshall, Missouri, reached a height of 24,690 feet.

That, as the veriest tyro at figures can determine for himself, is a height of almost five miles.

It is perhaps worth adding there that the height reached at St. Louis yesterday is not so important as the fact that another aviation record has been broken.

With every new record that is established, something is learned that was not known before, and as we learn new things we can go on to new peaks of achievement.

MISHAPS HALT ATLANTIC RACE OF TWO PLANES

American and French Craft Only Slightly Damaged and New Effort Is Due Tomorrow.

Fahy, Endurance Aviator, Threatens Record Made by Jensen—Crash Kills Mechanic.

OLD ORCHARD, Me., May 29.—A friendly airplane race across the Atlantic was begun on this sandy beach today, but it ended, at least for the moment and possibly for the day, almost before it got started.

The American monoplane Green Flash didn't even get off the beach, one wheel dropping into soft sand on the takeoff and whirling the ship in a wracking ground loop that spilled gasoline and necessitated thorough investigation for possible damage due to strain.

The French monoplane Yellow Bird got into the air but a seam in one of the wing tanks opened and it returned after a 20 minute struggle to gain altitude.

How soon the planes could be prepared for a second attempt was not immediately known, but it was generally felt that the takeoff had been delayed at least for several hours and many felt that in order to get a full day of daylight flying at the beginning of the flight the aviators would postpone their next start until tomorrow.

The American plane was manned by Roger W. Williams and Lewis A. Vance, the French one by Rene LeFevre, Jean Assolant and Armand Lott.

Fahy Menaces Record METROPOLITAN AIRPORT, Los Angeles, May 29.—With each hour bringing added confidence to his watchers, Herbert J. Fahy piloted his Lockheed-Vega monoplane past the twenty-seventh hour of his flight at 7:43:05 a. m. today in his attempt to set a new solo endurance record. The present record of Martin Jensen is 35:33:21.

Crash Kills Mechanic PORTLAND, May 29.—Paul Wiley, 35, died in a hospital here today from injuries suffered last night when an unlicensed airplane crashed to earth on the Swan Island airport here. R. V. Sauters, who was at the controls of the plane, received a broken jaw and face lacerations when the ship fell from an altitude of 400 feet.

Witnesses said the plane went in to a spin as Sauters was half way through a turn. The plane was an old one and had been remodeled but was not licensed.

MINER DISCUSSES DEATH THEN DIES IN 1100-FT. DROP

GLOBE, Ariz., May 29.—Injured and helpless in the arms of a fellow worker, Arthur Oates, a Cornishman, discussed the possibility of life or death for five minutes Tuesday and then plunged 1100 feet to the bottom of the Old Dominion mine shaft. He was dead when picked up.

Oates, who was shaft repair boss, had been repairing timbers at the 700-foot level with Charles Reed, a workman. Oates' head was struck by a timber. As he fell from the side of the shaft, Reed caught him and held his body for five minutes. During that time the men conversed, Oates explaining that he already was injured seriously, and urging his companion not to endanger his own life. Reed hung onto him, however, until his strength failed, and Oates slipped away.

5-YEAR TERM FOR ILLEGAL SURGERY

LOS ANGELES, May 29.—Dr. Arthur O. Berg, chiropractor, has been sentenced by Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy to serve from five years to life in San Quentin penitentiary for second degree murder. Dr. Berg was convicted of performing an illegal operation upon George Walden, 15, which caused her death, a year ago.

A previous conviction and sentence of Dr. Berg had been set aside by the appellate court. Defense counsel filed oral notice of appeal from the second sentence.

GALLAGHER, ONCE NOTED COMEDIAN, DIES IN POVERTY

NEW YORK, May 29.—Edward Gallagher, of the once-famous vaudeville team of Gallagher and Shean, is dead.

The man who rose to fame and fortune in 1920 on the popular song, "Mister Gallagher and Mister Shean," died penniless and paralyzed at a Queens sanitarium yesterday.

Except for his former wife, Helen Gallagher, he was virtually deserted during his last months. She hurried to his bedside daily after her work as a hostess at a night club and was said to have paid all the expenses of his illness. His second wife, Anna Luther, an actress, whom he married at the height of his success and from whom he was separated two months later, was believed on the west coast.

After the success of the "Gallagher and Shean" song the team joined the Ziegfeld Follies, but in 1925, when Florenz Ziegfeld refused to pay them \$1,500 a week, the famous team soon dropped from public notice. Shean, who is said to have saved his money, left his old partner, and Gallagher in 1926 entered a hospital for mental diseases. He emerged to make his brief attempt to come back and then last February re-entered the sanitarium where he died.

"TORSO" MURDER VICTIM IS KNOWN; MYSTERY CLEARING

LOS ANGELES, Calif., May 29.—Identification of the Los Angeles river "torso" murder victim as Mrs. Laura B. Sutton, of this city, has been accepted by the sheriff's office. One of the final bits of evidence upon which the conclusive identification was made was the pierced ear lobe effected many years ago for earrings.

Disclosure of the pierced ear was made by an X-ray photograph after relatives and friends had asserted Mrs. Sutton had worn earrings. The X-ray showed that, because of the outer skin having healed over the piercings, a previous microscopic examination had failed to disclose their presence.

Captain William Bright of the sheriff's office stated that the eight-week-old mystery now was nearing a solution. He added that several persons probably would be taken into technical custody within 24 hours for further questioning in the case.

The torso of the slain woman was found in the Los Angeles river bed April 4. The severed head was not found until a month later, while the arms and legs have not been located. Mrs. Sutton, who had named her sister, Mrs. Ida Kleppe, as co-respondent when she divorced her husband, Eugene, was reported by her brother, Emerson De Groff, to have disappeared March 28.

Willard Andrews, her lawyer, who is the last person known to have seen Mrs. Sutton alive, told the investigators she visited his office on that date to inquire about alimony her divorced husband owed. As she left, Andrews said, she remarked that she intended to visit her sister and ex-husband to "have it out with them." Both the latter have denied that Mrs. Sutton came to visit them.

GERMAN WAR VET EAGER BUYER OF LEGION POPPIES

"Buy a poppy and help the disabled buddies!" High on a scaffold painting the new court house at Roseburg Chris Voss wielded a big paint brush in a capable manner. Three stories below the auxiliary poppy vendor waved the red poppies.

Off came the paint-covered gloves and through the window crawled Chris.

"Vat, poppy girl," he called. "Down the stairs and out through the front entrance came Chris with two dimes in his hand, eager to buy two poppies to help the boys.

Chris knows the horrors of war and the aftermath. For five long years he fought under the flag of the autocratic Wilhelm of Germany. Facing our boys in the trenches he fought for Germany. After the war Chris came to the United States and has just received his first citizenship papers. A good citizen is Chris Voss and no one in Roseburg was so eager to buy a poppy. He was the first to leave the scaffold and his work to help the buddies and their families.

MAYOR'S SOS TO CITIZENS IS SOUNDED AGAIN

Hoover Issues Second Call for Citizens to Make Investigation Street Program.

Committee Requested to Meet Friday Afternoon at 2 o'Clock for Tour of Inspection.

Another attempt to secure public support for his fight against the city council's street repair and improvement program is being announced today by Mayor E. V. Hoover. The mayor recently appointed a committee of fifty taxpayers and asked for an inspection of the streets and the work proposed to be done by authority of the council. The committee was supposed to have met Monday, but only a few reported and, as the city engineer was absent from the city, the inspection was not made.

He is now asking the members of the committee, together with all citizens interested in the matter of street repair to meet at the city hall Friday afternoon of this week at 2 o'clock, at which time he proposes to make a thorough inspection.

"H. L. Epstein, city engineer, will be present and will show the citizens the condition of the streets, and will also escort them over the city so that they may, after a thorough investigation, make a report on the needs for street repairs," Mayor Hoover announced in a written statement issued this morning.

"A large number of citizens and taxpayers are remonstrating against the council's program," Mayor Hoover's statement said, "and I believe that this matter justifies careful investigation as it is of vital importance to the taxpayers of the city."

"The need for this second call is due to the fact that the city engineer was absent from the city Monday, and his presence is desired as he can inform the committee of the street conditions and the program outlined by himself and the council. It seems necessary, in order to preserve the ordinary and proper functions of the city government and silence the adverse criticism our city is receiving from outside publicity, to determine the merits of the controversy by referring the matter to a representative body of taxpayers."

ACTRESS, ALLEGED DRUNK, SUED FOR \$50,000 DAMAGES

LOS ANGELES, May 29.—Charges that an extreme state of intoxication on the part of Wanda Hawley necessitated the stopping of his show, "Illegitimate," today were staring the screen and stage actress in the face following the suit for \$50,000 damages filed yesterday by Hunter Keasey, author and producer.

Keasey charged in the complaint that it was necessary to forcibly eject the actress from the stage after the curtain had been rung down. He further stated that her "inebriation" made it impossible for her to appear in the balance of the performance of the show, which was staged April 24.

Mickey Powell and two unidentified co-defendants were named by the producer as having provided Miss Hawley with the liquor prior to her appearance on the stage.

GALLON OF BOOZE RETURNS BARCLAY TO McNEIL ISLAND

PORTLAND, May 29.—Liquor law violation cases figured prominently in federal court today. William Barclay, Klamath Indian, was sentenced to one year and a day at McNeil island and Mickey Powell, when he pleaded guilty to violating the Jones liquor law by transporting and possessing one gallon of liquor on the reservation last May 1.

The United States attorney told ord. He was sent to McNeil island in 1909 for manslaughter, the attorney said, for having killed a tribesman, and was released in 1915. Liquor also figured in that record. Sam Sugata, who with two other men was indicted on a charge of violating the Jones law by selling and possessing liquor, was acquitted by a federal court jury late yesterday.

Baker Must Pay \$2 For Saying 'Dough' to Cop

CHICAGO, May 29.—"I says to him," says Officer E. La Fontaine, "I says, 'You're speeding.' And then he says something about 'a lot of dough' and I says, 'You can't bribe me.' And so I runs him in, your honor."

Judge Herbert Immelhausen peered severely down upon the prisoner, one George Eales.

"What have you to say for yourself," the court asked. "I did say something about a lot of dough, sure," said Eales, "but it wasn't a bribe. When I mean money I say money. When I mean dough I say dough."

"And the two are not synonymous, then?" asked the court.

"Far be they from such," said the prisoner. "What I was trying to convey to this policeman was that I was in a hurry to get to work because there was a lot of dough riding, and if I didn't get there in time it would spoil."

"Then you are a—," began Judge Immelhausen.

"Yes, sir," said Eales, "I am a baker, and when I say dough I mean dough. The dough was rising."

"Very well," said the court, "see if you can raise \$1 fine and \$1 costs."

WOMEN ORGANIZE TO CAMPAIGN FOR Milder DRY LAW

CHICAGO, May 29.—A national-wide organization of women, seeking temperance but opposing prohibition, is being formed under the leadership of Mrs. Charles H. Sabin, of New York, former republican national committeewoman.

Plans for the organization were discussed yesterday at a meeting of women from 26 states interested by Mrs. Sabin. Temporary headquarters will be opened in New York and state leaders will immediately launch membership campaigns.

Although the Women's Christian Temperance Union, which favors temperance through prohibition, was not mentioned by name, leaders of the new movement intimated their organization would oppose its program.

"This is the first time that women who favor temperance but oppose prohibition have been articulate," Mrs. Sabin said. "The organization is a result of the demand from women all over the country who realize the deplorable effects of the prohibition law upon their country and their children."

Mrs. Sabin made it plain that public officers who vote dry but drink wet will be exposed by the organization and vigorously opposed politically. She said the temperance society would "dabble a little in politics."

"We believe that the prohibition law violates the fundamental principle of our government," Mrs. Sabin said. "We will be prepared to present to the women of the country our reasons for opposing prohibition, believing that when the truth is made known existing conditions are more fully known among all women, they will unite in requiring such a change as will replace the present corruption and hypocrisy with sobriety and honesty. Every bit of spare time I have for the rest of my life will be devoted to this cause."

Mrs. Sabin was elected temporary chairman of the organization.

VALERIA JEAN McCLINTOCK DIES AT AGE 7 YEARS

Valeria Jean McClintock, the 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John McClintock of this city, died this morning after an illness of about two weeks. Mr. and Mrs. McClintock lost another of their daughters by death a few months ago. Valeria was born at Lebanon and came here about a year ago, when Mr. McClintock, who is employed as Standard Oil company manager for this district, was transferred back to Roseburg. The child suffered from a non-contagious type of meningitis. She is survived by her parents and two brothers, Leighton and Thomas. Mr. and Mrs. J. E. McClintock are grandparents, and Hon. O. P. C. show, of the Oregon supreme court, is also a grandfather of the child.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking Parlor. Rev. Frank B. Matthews, pastor of the local Baptist church, officiating and Rev. C. A. Edwards, of the Methodist Episcopal church, assisting. Interment will take place in the Masonic cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of M. E. Ritter.

PRUNE MEN TO SPEND \$150,000 FOR NEW DRIERS

Bumper Crop This Season Demands Increase in Facilities for Handling.

Salesmen Are Active in All Parts of County—Fred Bullock of Kellogg Signs Contract.

Douglas county prune growers, it is estimated, will spend approximately \$150,000 this spring and summer in construction of new prune driers in various sections of the county. Increased acreage, coupled with the fact that a number of driers have been destroyed by fire in the past few years, or have deteriorated so that they are no longer useful, makes it necessary that a large number of new plants be built.

The past few years has seen little activity in prune drier construction, the crop having been so small that additional facilities were not needed. In some cases the returns contemplated were not sufficient to justify the heavy expense of installation so that growers have delayed building until conditions improved sufficiently to enable them to make the improvements.

This year Douglas county is expected to have a bumper crop of prunes. In fact, from all appearances, the county will be in the same situation as it was a few years ago when it had the majority of the prunes in the Northwest, except that this year it will also top many of the California prune centers, for California, it is estimated, has less than a 50 per cent crop this year. In view of the fact that Douglas county will be the center of prune activities this year, growers are preparing to increase their drying facilities to meet the need.

At least 10 large driers are in contemplation, in addition to repairs and alterations. Manufacturing companies, finding little business in California, are flooding this district with salesmen in an effort to sell their equipment in this locality. Three large companies have men in the field, while local dealers are, of course, also working with the prune growers in efforts to secure the contracts.

The first grower to complete negotiations and make announcement of arrangements to build is Fred Bullock of Kellogg, who has contracted with Leake and Beyers, local implement dealers for a modern Miller dehydrator which is to be installed in his orchard. Mr. Bullock has a large orchard at Kellogg and is expecting to take care of a big crop this year. The drier will cost approximately \$10,000 and will be of the latest, improved circulating type, giving the most efficient results in dehydration. The burner is of a type that (Continued on page 8)

The father's approval was gained when the bride, Silvia Adelaide Kress, announced her determination to live on her husband's income after her graduation June 4 from a select girls' school at Ossining. Ahy meanwhile will room with a former schoolmate in Brooklyn.

NEGRO YOUTH, 19, LYNCHED IN TEXAS

ALAMO, Tex., May 29.—A mob of about 100 men early today entered the Crockett county jail here, removed Joe Boxley, 19-year-old negro accused of attacking the wife of a justice of the peace, and hanged him on a tree four miles from town.

The negro was taken from the jail about 4 o'clock this morning and his body was found shortly afterwards. On the tree with the body was a cardboard on which was written "let this nigger hang here until 4 p. m., Thursday."

BILL REPEALING WISCONSIN DRY LAW IS SIGNED

MADISON, Wis., May 29.—Governor Wm. J. Kohler today signed the bill repealing the state's prohibition enforcement act.

The governor, by signing the bill, obeyed the mandate of the people who in an election this spring voted by a majority of nearly 150,000 for repeal. The bill was passed by the assembly a month ago and two weeks ago by the senate. Attempts to block passage failed in both houses.

The governor announced he had signed the bill "in fulfillment of the mandate of the people, overwhelmingly expressed in the recent referendum."

Governor Kohler's signature of the bill, which leaves the entire enforcement of dry laws in Wisconsin to federal agents, was followed by a statement that the 18th amendment provided that "the congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

The governor believed "this imposed no obligation upon the states, but leaves it optional with them as to whether or not they will exercise their concurrent powers."

Governor Kohler warned that the legislature's passage and his signature of the repealer "should not mislead any of our citizens in the belief that traffic in intoxicating liquor heretofore prohibited by the state has become lawful or that the saloon will return. He cited federal regulations against manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors."

All Law Peril
President Hoover told the commission that "the American people are deeply concerned over the alarming disobedience of law, the abuses in law enforcement and the growth of organized crime, which has spread to every field of evil doing and in every part of our country."

The problem, he said, is not confined to the enforcement and obedience of one law or the laws of the federal and state governments separately, but "is partly the attitude toward all law."

The Day in Congress
WASHINGTON, May 29.—After a call at the White House, Senator Jones, of Washington, the assistant republican leader, declared that an all summer recess of congress was "contrary to the desire" of President Hoover.

Tariff Hearings Set
Chairman Smoot announced today the senate finance committee would start hearing on the home tariff bill about June 10, and that it would receive testimony of senators and representatives and persons who did not appear before the house ways and means committee on the measure.

The Utah senator, pilot of many tariff and tax measures, said he was willing that the democratic members of the committee participate in the hearings.

The general assembly instructed the Rev. J. E. Snyder of North Bend, Ore., to convene the two Presbyteries for the purpose of organization.

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NATIONAL LAW COMMISSION IS OUTLINING TASK

Prohibition Merely Single Angle of Agenda, Says Geo. W. Wickersham, the Chairman.

Growth of Organized Crime Deeply Concerns People of U. S., Hoover Says at Conference.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Called upon by President Hoover to perform "one of the greatest services to our generation," the national law enforcement commission today stood at the threshold of its tremendous task of finding out the facts and causes of public disobedience of law in general and formulating recommendations looking to improvement.

Insisting that "prohibition is only one angle of our work," Chairman George W. Wickersham asserted after the initial meeting of the commission yesterday that "we will not avoid anything" and that if it found any federal law enforceable it would so report.

The members of the commission—ten jurists and lawyers and one union educator—plan to continue their sessions for the remainder of the week to lay the foundation for their undertaking. They devoted their time yesterday to receiving their mandate from President Hoover, getting acquainted and exchanging views to bring to various angles of their task in which the various members were particularly interested.

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
