33 SPEED DEMONS READY FOR ANNUAL 500-MILE CONTEST

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29.—Thirty-three of the fastest automobiles in the world underwent their final overhauling today in preparation for the running tomorrow of the 17th annual 500-mile race. The cars will line up for the start at 10 o'clock tomorrow with Cliff Woodruff, Chicago in the pole position, and with Leon Druay, Los Angeles, beside him. Ralph Hepburn, another Los Angeles veteran will have the last place in the front row.

Trailing behind the leaders, three abreast will be Babe Stapp, Los Angeles; Peter De Paolo, Los Angeles; Ray Keech, Philadelphia; Ernest Triplett, Los Angeles; Billy Arnold, Chicago; Lou Meyer, Highgate, Cal.; Deacon Litz, Du Bois, Pa.; Fred Winal, Philadelphia; Russell Snowberger, Philadelphia; Tony Gullota, Kansas City; Bill Spence, Los Angeles; Lou Moore, Los Angeles; Fred Frame, Los Angeles; Philip J. Barde, Los Angeles; Louis Chiron, Paris, France; Jules Moriceau, Escanaba, Mich.; Peter Kreis, Knoxville, Tenn.; Phil (Red) Shaffer, Flint, Mich.; and Dallas, Texas; Bob McDonogh, San Francisco; Carl Marchese, Milwaukee; Frank Farmer, Philadelphia; Herman S. 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AVIATRIX RISES 24,000 FEET TO SET NEW ALTITUDE RECORD



MISS MARVEL CROSSON

MINES FIELD, Los Angeles, May 28.—Driving her trim cabin monoplane to an unofficial altitude of 24,000 feet, Miss Marvel Crosson, veteran San Diego woman flier, landed here today after a two-hour flight with the women's altitude record apparently broken.

Experts who examined the plane's instruments after the landing at 1:23 o'clock, estimated Miss Crosson had reached the 24,000-foot mark and possibly had climbed higher. The sealed barograph was removed and prepared for shipment to Washington where the official figure of her attempt can be determined only after calibration of the gauge.

Miss Crosson roared away from the airport at 11:17 a. m. and within ten minutes her speeding ship had soared out of sight.

When the plane next was seen, it was sailing earthward under perfect control and Miss Crosson made an excellent landing despite the numb condition of her limbs. "Gee, it was cold up there," she exclaimed as friends pulled her from the cabin with a gusto of cheering.

The temperature was estimated to have been about 15 degrees below zero at the highest point of her flight.

The highest previous record was 20,770 feet established by Miss Louise M. Thaden in December. Miss Crosson, who has flown for several years in Alaska, is a sister of Joe Crosson, a member of the Wilkins Antarctic expedition.
