I am endeavoring to devote my efforts to keeping down city expenses, but if I cannot rule in the matter herein mentioned, believe me, I have no intention to ruin.

will permit the use of either oil or wood for fuel, and the entire construction will be fireproof. The local dealers are arranging for immediate shipment and construction will be started in the very near future.

Several other growers are preparing similar construction this year. One drier is to be built at the Curry estate, it is understood, while W. A. Durr is also planning on a large plant. Mr. Durr's orchard is a young one, but is now coming into full bearing, and he is expecting a very heavy yield this year, and is contemplating one of the largest driers in the county. Another big drier will probably be built this year by J. H. Booth, whose plant was destroyed by fire last year. Mr. Booth has one of the largest orchards in the county, and his drier requirements necessitate the installation of a plant of huge capacity. No contracts, however, have yet been made for construction work. A number of smaller driers are being contemplated.

SALEM WOMAN WINS FRENCH DISTINCTION

U. S. HIGH SCHOOL GROWTH MARVEL OF FREE EDUCATION

WASHINGTON, May 29.—One of the most striking phases of American life has been the phenomenal growth of the American high school.

It is the greatest gift which America has made to the social, economic, and religious life of the world. It embodies the idea of free public school opportunity for all children of the nation, until 16.

In 1880 there were 110,277 pupils enrolled in the free public high schools of the country. By 1890 the number had increased to 202,963; in 1900, to 519,251; in 1910, to 915,061; in 1920, to 2,100,389, and now more than 4,000,000 are enrolled. Thus in every decade since 1880 the enrollment has doubled.

What is the reason for the increase? The American high school is the refining and unifying force in our complex society and offers the elements of general culture to all normal children from 12 to 18 years old.

It provides preliminary vocational training and experience for the pupil early in his high school career and actual vocational training later if he wants it. This is an age of inventions and, as a result, the curriculum of the high school has been greatly broadened. It is no longer strictly college preparatory, but includes preparation for all phases of American life.

The realization of the part of the state that every child should have equal educational opportunity has brought about compulsory school laws. These laws require that all children remain in school until 14 and, in most cases, until 16.

Perhaps the most potent reason for the great increase has been the acceptance on the part of the people that the high school is "the college of the common people."

Only through its doors is the way opened into modern, complex civilization and every true parent has a desire for his child to have the very best educational opportunities possible.

ATHEISM, LIQUOR CHARGES STIR UP CHICO SCHOOL ROW

CHICO, Calif., May 29.—Paul A. Paulsen, head of the science department of Chico high school, center of a bitter controversy involving charges that his teaching was flavored with atheism, this morning broke up a meeting of the board of education by defying its members to oust him without a formal hearing.

Claiming the protection of the state teachers' tenure law, Paulsen told the directors that he would not resign, and demanded that charges they had named be filed in writing, and that he be allowed ten days in which to obtain defense counsel.

WOMAN PREFERENCES HOME

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Mrs. Pearl Peden Oldfield, representative from Arkansas, and the widow of William A. Oldfield, the former democratic whip, today declared that "under no circumstances" would she return to congress after her present term expires.

She has found active public life no antidote for her grief over the loss of her husband, she said, and although she will carry on for the remainder of her two-year term, which follows her election to fill the unexpired term of her late husband, she will do so "simply in the spirit of taking care of things," for her husband. Then she will gladly retire to the sphere in which she believes woman belongs—her home.

"I came back to the office to look after things before anyone was here to keep things going," she said, referring to her election to fill out her husband's term, "and I accepted the nomination believing I should serve only a few weeks. Before the special election I announced my old-fashioned belief about women and the home, and that belief I still hold."

TULSA, Okla., May 29.—A wrestling feud between two former heavyweight champions of the world was settled here last night, for a time at least, when Ed "Strangler" Lewis, defeated Joe Stecher of Dodge City, Neb., for the third time in two years.

Stecher took the first fall with a body scissors in 30 minutes. Lewis annexed the second with a body slam in 15 minutes and the third with a double arm lock in three minutes.

LOMSKI WINS 10 ROUND DECISION FROM YALE OKUN

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., light heavyweight, won a ten-round decision here last night over Yale Okun, New York, before a packed house at the auditorium. Lomski scored one knockdown in the fifth when he sunk a left hook deep to Okun's stomach followed by a right to the jaw. After a count of five, Okun got up and fought back vigorously. Lomski was said to have hurt his right hand in this round. Okun showed boxing skill and willingness to mix and took the aggressive in the early rounds but after the fifth it was Lomski's fight all the way.

Tony Talarico, Spokane heavyweight, and Earl Ritchie, Klamath Falls, furnished the liveliest fight of the night. It was featured by numerous knockdowns. After being knocked down four times in the first three rounds Talarico came back to knock Ritchie out in the fourth.

Another fast mix was the four round match between Roy Crest, San Francisco, and Billy Robbins, Portland. Robbins had Crest out-boxed and apparently beaten early in the fourth, but the blond youth suddenly snuffed a volley of punches to nose out the decision. Frankie Burnell, Albina, and Jess Hottinger, Oakland, went six rounds to a draw and Jack Sweeney, Victoria, B. C., outclassed Leroy Wharton, Portland, in the curtain raiser.

FIELDING H. YOST QUITS AS COACH

ANN ARBOR, Mich., May 29.—Fielding H. Yost, director of athletics at the University of Michigan, who on several occasions has been asked to accept the position of national coach only to take up leadership with the opening of the gridiron season, has permanently retired, he said today.

"I will never coach again under any condition; I have permanently retired," he said.

The statement was made after Yost had admitted that Elton E. (Tad) Wieman would not be a member of the football coaching staff next fall.

Asked who would coach the team Yost said: "Our coaching plans for football have not been completed; I expect to complete them soon."

He volunteered no comment when the name of Dr. John W. Wilce, retired football coach of Ohio State, was mentioned.
