SALMON FISHING ON UMPQUA OFFERS SOME REAL SPORT

Excellent Catches of Big Fish Reported During the Week Just Past.

Fly Fishing for Trout Will Start as Soon as Water Conditions Show

Fishing conditions on the Umpqua river are improving daily, some excellent catches having been reported during the past week. Due to the late extreme high water, the commercial fishermen have been unable to get as many of their nets in the river as usual, and as a result Chinook fishing has been far better than in any recent year. Trolling for salmon is in great vogue, and landing a big fish weighing 25 or 30 pounds, which is about the average weight, is sport enough to make a man forget all his troubles and ease care to the winds. Some of the salmon caught this year have weighed as much as 17 pounds, while others, of course, are small. On the whole, however, the fish have been larger and in better condition than usual, due, it is believed, to the fact that the water has been colder than in most years, thereby keeping the fish fat and in condition longer after they leave salt water.

The forks of the river have, of course, provided the most interesting fishing grounds, and scores of boats may be seen there daily as the sportsmen put forth their efforts to land one of the gamey Chinooks. Salmon fishing, however, is not confined to that locality, for trollers have reported good luck in practically all parts of the river.

There has been considerable success in trout fishing on the North Umpqua, but so far most of the catches have been made on salmon eggs. Fly fishing, to date, has not been very good, because the water is too high and slightly muddy. As the water clears, however, the fish are expected to rise to the fly, and indications point to good fly fishing within a few days, provided the weather remains warm.

The small streams, so far, have not furnished much fishing due to the same conditions of high and muddy water. The streams, however, are well stocked and should yield excellent sport as soon as the water becomes right.

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TEXAS WOOL SOLD AT 29 TO 33 CENTS

KERRVILLE, Tex., May 29.—An announcement was made today of the sale by the Schriener wool and mohair commission company of its entire spring clip of wool amounting to approximately 2,500,000 pounds. Of this amount 1,100,000 pounds was eight months clip and brought 29 to 31 cents per pound. The balance, 12 months clip, sold for 30 to 33 cents, it was stated. Bostan firms were the buyers.

Proceeds from this sale will amount to about \$890,000 while mohair previously sold, brought about \$700,000.

The North Umpqua road is open to Steamboat, and is in good condition. Maintenance crews have been at work getting the road in shape, and it is reported there are few rough or wet spots left.

The South Umpqua road is open to Deadman creek, but traffic is halted there by a fallen bridge. The Tiller-Trail road is in fairly good shape, and the Cow creek road is in fair condition, although somewhat rough, due to heavy travel during the recent wet weather.

THOUSANDS OF OIL AND GAS PERMITS ARE CANCELLED

(Associated Press Local Wire)
WASHINGTON, May 29.—Secretary Wilbur has announced that the general land office has cancelled 5,544 applications for permits to prospect for oil and gas and 2,696 permits heretofore issued have been revoked.

The total number of cases acted upon since President Hoover's oil conservation program was inaugurated on March 12 is 15,922, which includes 19,852 notices sent to holders of permits asking that they show cause why their permits should not be cancelled.

Dr. Wilbur said that in handling this large number of cases the department has endeavored to be "just and to meet every reasonable equity."
