theory of government and changed it for all time to come.

All Men Created Equal
The theory was simply, as Lincoln said, that all men were created equal. That the common ordinary man had the natural right to govern himself. That he was given this right by his Creator, and that every government, no matter what its form, derived all of its power from the people themselves. These fathers, that Lincoln referred to, went further than that. They declared that the common ordinary people who made up the population of the country had the natural right, if any particular form of government was not to their liking, either to change it or abolish it altogether. In this remarkable document they declared that the particular form of government under which they were living, the same form under which all peoples of the world were living, was opposed to man's natural right to be his own ruler, and in this document for the first time in the history of the world, these fathers declared the intention of setting up a new government whose business should be the welfare and the happiness and the prosperity, not of a privileged few but of all people.

"That a government based on a proposition of this kind could have been successfully established in that period of the world's history is one of the miracles and one of the seeming impossibilities. Every ruler, every ruling clan in the civilized world was opposed to the very idea of setting up such a government, and yet these fathers, who at that time numbered less than three million people, scattered along a thousand miles of Atlantic coast line, without a government, without a treasury, without arms and ammunition, except what they themselves could make, for this principle for the right to govern themselves, commenced and fostered the first political revolution in the history of the world.

"For eight long years they fought and starved and bled and died for that principle of free government, for the right to govern themselves, and in the end they won that right, and from that first revolution of the people there sprang the first free nation that God's sun ever shined upon, and they called that nation the United States of America.

Nation Stands Test
"This I think is the picture that rose before Lincoln's eyes, as he stood there upon the platform above the battlefield of Gettysburg looking down on the new made graves of thousands of men and boys who had been so recently slain. For the new nation that Lincoln spoke of was an experiment, and this is what he had in mind when he said that the war, that was then raging, would determine whether this nation or any nation founded upon the basic proposition

of the political equality of man, and man's unalienable right to govern himself, could endure. To his mind this struggle was to determine whether such a government containing within itself the germ of its own destruction was inherent and strong enough to survive the shock of a terrific civil war that had been prosecuted and waged for the purpose of destroying it.

"The new nation, that Lincoln spoke of at Gettysburg did survive this awful test, and it survived in spite of obstacles that were almost insurmountable, as were the obstacles that were put in the way of the establishment of the government. It survived the test in spite of the greed of those who sought to prolong the war for the sake of their own personal profit. It survived the test in spite of the army of politicians, prominent then, but seldom mentioned now, who welcomed the war for the purpose of perpetuating themselves in power. It survived the test in spite of the fact that billions of brave Americans in the south felt in their own hearts that they were fired by the same zeal that had inspired their revolutionary ancestors, and who were willing to give their last drop of blood to destroy the government their fathers had helped to establish. It survived the test by virtue of the millions of other Americans in the minority who offered their bodies as a breastwork for the nation in the hour of its greatest trouble.

Veterans Reverenced
"On this Memorial day, it has long been the custom of our people to honor and reverence the men who died to preserve for us the nation bequeathed to them by their fathers. Your fathers, men of the Grand Army, bequeathed the nation to you, so you have preserved it and handed it on to us, your children, unsullied and unstained."

The speaker continued his address by pointing out the satisfaction that the veterans of the Civil war must feel because of the important part they have had in preserving the nation as one great, undivided nation. They also, he stated, have that peculiar satisfaction of knowing that they are the objects of affection and reverence of all generations of Americans.

"You, however, are not the last of the race," he declared in conclusion, "for other crises have come, and you have the greatest sons and your daughters have defended that priceless heritage that you preserved for them by giving their own lives and their own devotion to meet these crises."

In this connection he paid tribute to the Spanish war veterans and to the World war veterans, and the women who have aided these men.

Mr. Mott, the speaker, is an attorney at Salem, and one of the state's best known orators. He was formerly a resident of Astoria and was a candidate for congressman at the last election. He spent several years as a member of the state legislature.

The address concluded an interesting and inspiring ceremony which began at 9:30 o'clock with parade halted at the Oak street bridge, where the ladies of the Relief Corps conducted services for the sailor dead, after which there were services at the grave of the unknown soldier at the Soldiers' Home cemetery, the salute being fired by a squad from the local national guard company.

The program held under the huge maple tree on the banks of the river adjoining the cemetery, was opened with the singing of "America," after which Clarence Miller, G. A. R. chaplain, gave the invocation.

J. V. Long, of the University of Oregon, son of Attorney John T. Long of this city, read General Logan's Orders of the Day, and also presented Lincoln's Gettysburg Speech, these readings being interrupted by a selection by the Roseburg municipal band. Mrs. Richard Busch gave a vocal solo, after which Mr. Mott presented his most excellent address. The program closed with a benediction by Rev. Charles A. Edwards, and the singing of the national anthem.
