BRITISH LABOR GAINS HEAVILY IN PARLIAMENT
(Continued from page 1)
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Lloyd George also came through from his own constituency of Carnarvon, Wales, by a wide margin, the vote being as follows: Lloyd George 16,647; J. Bowen Davlek, conservative, 7,515, and Thomas A. Rhys, labor, 4,524.
Premier Baldwin's son, Oliver Baldwin, and Lloyd George's daughter, Megan, also will be in the next house of commons with their parents.
Oliver Baldwin, who returned from Dudley, Worcestershire, the same county as his father, is a laborite and for some years has been opposed to policies of his father's party.
Megan Lloyd George on the other hand is a liberal. The same as her father. She was returned with a strong plurality.
Malcolm MacDonald, son of the labor leader, also was returned to commons, turning the tables on his old rival, Sir Ellis Hume Williams, who defeated him last year.
Jack Jones, the fiery labor leader, was successful at West Ham.
Winston Churchill, the outstanding personality of the conservative party and chancellor of the exchequer in the Baldwin ministry, was re-elected in his Epping constituency in the agricultural county of Essex.
All three male members of the Henderson family triumphed for labor. Arthur Henderson himself was yesterday re-elected in Burnley, while Arthur Henderson, Jr., today captured the South Cardiff seat from the conservatives. Another son of the former labor home secretary was also elected yesterday.

Women Gain Seats
There were eight women in the recently dissolved parliament, but already today at least ten were in the new parliament, of whom six were elected on the labor ticket.

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Navy Expense Decried
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The secretary's statement was made in commenting upon the speech of President Hoover at Arlington National cemetery, Mr. Stimson declaring that he wishes to "call attention to another aspect" of naval disarmament.

What World Faces
Emphasizing that the \$1,170,800,000 involved the construction program of only one nation—the United States—the secretary said that if this country proceeded other nations would be impelled to "follow suit" and "the burden of unproductive expenditure which will be imposed on the economic world during the next 15 years can be to a certain extent realized."

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
