being detained until his friends fix up a purse of \$20,000.

HEBURN, Ind., May 31.—The body of a young woman about 20 years old who had been slain was found lying in a swamp about four miles south of here yesterday. Her skull had been crushed, and the body then laid in several inches of crackling water and partly covered with reeds. Coroner C. H. Miller of Porter county said the woman had been dead about two weeks.

Donald McClain, 19, stumbled upon the gruesome discovery while on a wild flower expedition.

Mrs. Margaret Biggs, of Hammond, Ind., who was camping near here, inspected the woman's clothing and declared it somewhat resembled that worn by her sister, Miss Alice Seifrig, who disappeared two weeks ago from Calumet City, Ind., where she was employed as a maid. Because of the condition of the body, Mrs. Biggs was not allowed to see it, but she stated its measurements corresponded in a general way to those of Miss Seifrig.

A pin fastened to the victim's coat bore the word "Chicago." Porter county authorities, a quarter of Chicago officials to check their list of missing young women in an effort to identify the body.

Maid Slays Mistress

CLEVELAND, O., May 31.—Mrs. Dorothy Snyder, wife of Alonzo M. Snyder, prominent Cleveland attorney, was stabbed to death with a butcher knife at her home here today. Police said the stabbing was done by Anna Stepan, a maid, who had become angry in an argument over her salary.

Mrs. Snyder, before her marriage in April, 1921, was Miss Dorothy Marsh, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Luther S. Dickey, of Chicago. Her husband is a member of a prominent firm of attorneys here.

Heat Takes Toll

NEW YORK, May 31.—More than a score of deaths from heat and drownings marked one of the hottest Memorial days in the east. Thousands flocked from the sweltering beaches, while highways were jammed with automobiles adding to the toll many deaths and injuries from collisions.

In New York City the temperature rose to 83 degrees, while humidity of 92 per cent added to the discomfort. Four persons died from the heat, four others were prostrated and there were nine drownings.

It was 96 in Boston. In New England, five persons died from the heat and four were drowned.

At Corinth, near Glen Falls, N. Y., the temperature was 110 degrees. Three drownings occurred in upper New York state.

Three persons drowned in New Jersey and at Middletown, Pa., a Civil war veteran dropped dead after taking part in a parade.

Pittsburgh, Pa., reported a high temperature of 93 degrees, one death from heat and five from drownings.

The heat wave extended into Ontario, Canada, with a temperature of 91 degrees at Toronto. In the province there were two deaths from heat and two drownings.

Auto Race Fatal

NEW YORK, May 31.—Two spectators were killed and a driver and two others were injured at a Memorial day automobile race in the Bronx.

One of the dead was identified as Dumas McKenna, 48 years old, of Flushing, N. Y. The other was unidentified.

The injured were Bernice Katz, 25 years old, of Brooklyn, the driver, who suffered a fracture of the skull; Jacob Anselmi, 27 years old, of Elmhurst, fractured leg; and an unidentified boy about 14 years old, fractured skull.

The car was traveling about 80 miles an hour at one of the turns of the dirt track when it left the course and hurtled up a small embankment into a group of spectators before it turned over.

Katz lost police he lost control of the machine when he saw a boy run onto the track and swerved his car to avoid hitting him. Police believed the injured boy was the one Katz saw as he was found lying at the edge of the track after the accident.

Aeronaut Dies in Fall

SCRANTON, Pa., May 31.—A holiday crowd at the Ackley speedway auto races saw a parachute jumper fall 2,700 feet to his death when his parachute failed to open in a leap from an airplane.

Edgar P. (Red) Enoch, 22, jumped out to the left wing of the plane as it circled above the track and jumped off.

The parachute did not open, and Enoch's body landed in a pasture outside the track enclosure, tearing up the ground where it struck, his home was Mullica, N. J.

Quakes Toll 33

BUENOS AIRES, May 31.—Earthquakes yesterday in two Argentine provinces took a toll of 33 dead and more than 100 injured. Fifteen persons were killed and 50 injured at Villa Atuel while at Las Malvinas were killed and more than 40 injured.

More than half of Villa Atuel was destroyed, many houses burning and a bridge in the city collapsing.

A cold wave gripped the entire Argentine today. At Ciudad Mendoza the temperature was 25 degrees Fahrenheit, three persons dying of the cold. Snow and freezing temperatures were reported from other sections of the republic, the snow falling in some places interfering with railroad traffic.

Forest Fire Kills 100

TOKYO, May 31.—Japanese residents of Southern Siphallion island sought today for their lives and their homes against forest fires which were believed to have killed 100 persons and burned more than 1,000 houses.

Spare dispatches to newspapers are led to fear there had been a major disaster. Communications in the island were badly crippled with railways blocked, telegraph and telephone wires down, and only a few reports were obtainable.

A dispatch to the newspaper Ashu Shimbun, from Maokahama, a village near Exutor, said Maokahama had been wiped out and that there were 100 dead and 1,000 houses burned.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31.—All markets were quiet and unchanged following yesterday's holiday. The only material change was in asparagus, which advanced because of the dwindling supply. Lack of sunshine in the asparagus areas were said to be the cause of this shortage.

Strawberries were unchanged, although lower prices were expected next week. By that time more of the Oregon crop should be on the market. The California berries were about cleaned up.

Butter—steady. Portland dairy exchange net wholesale prices (cubes): extra, 44c; standard, 43c; prime firsts, 42c; firsts, 42c. Creamery prices: prints, 3c over cube standards.

Eggs, milk, poultry, onions, potatoes, wool, nuts, hay, cascara, bark and hops—steady and unchanged.

BOSTON, May 31.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "There has been a slackening in the buying movement in wool this week both in the eastern and western markets. Prices are hardly changed for the week."

Manufacturers report fair export business at the mills in men's wear and in certain lines of women's wear, notably the broadcloth section. Kilt goods manufacturers, also, have been getting more business of late on the lower basis of wool prices.

Foreign markets are generally quiet, although there are predictions of improved business in York share in the near future.
