Bridge between Beaumont and Orange would give way and 20,000 handbills were on hand for an emergency. The Orange-Port Arthur ferry was operated continuously to accommodate traffic unable to get over the highways.

The towns of Lynchburg, Katy, Clodine and Gaston were lakes. Residents who had not moved to dry land were using boats. At Clodine the bayou was said to be ten miles wide.

Heat's Toll Mounts NEW YORK, June 1.—Deaths from the extreme heat which has blistered the north Atlantic states four days nearer the half hundred mark today.

Nineteen persons died from the heat yesterday and three were drowned. With the temperature in the New York City area reaching a maximum of 90 degrees, the highest thus far this season, nine persons succumbed and 18 were prostrated.

A New York Central railroad fireman died while working near Auburn, N. Y. A boy was drowned at Newark, N. J., the third drowning in Wayne county within 24 hours.

One death was attributed to the heat at Patterson, N. J., and an 11-year-old girl was drowned at Chews Landing, N. J., while swimming.

Boston, one of the centers to suffer most from the torrid spell, was the first to feel relief. A thermometer reading of 84 degrees at 8 a. m., yesterday made it the hottest place in the country at that hour, but by noon the temperature had fallen to 71. Five deaths occurred, however, before the heat wave broke.

Other deaths were reported at Malden, Mass., and Lawrence, Mass. A 12-year-old boy was drowned at Providence, R. I.

The break in the heat wave over New England brought a drop of 33

degrees at Manchester, New Hampshire, and a 10 degree drop at Burlington, Vt.

One death occurred at Philadelphia, where a temperature of 92 degrees was recorded. At Gettysburg, Pa., a farm hand was killed by lightning.

Fire Perils Jap Town TOKYO, June 1.—The village of Tomiai on the east coast of the Ise of Saghalien was surrounded today by the forest fire which has raged for the last week there. Its 1,000 houses were isolated and conditions in the town were not known here.

Elsewhere the forest fires have died down and danger was considered past with villagers meeting to consider reconstruction. In Eaurtor alone damage was estimated at 6,000,000 yen (about \$2,750,000).

The railway ministry offered free transportation of relief supplies during June and a 50 per cent reduction in fares on freights and building materials during June and July to aid from the island.

The emperor, aboard the yacht Nagato, kept in touch with news from the stricken area by means of wireless and ordered grant of a privy purse to the sufferers.

DOUGLAS COUNTY GETS STATE MONEY FOR FAIR

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SALEM, Ore., June 1.—A total sum of \$56,116.61 in county funds has been apportioned among the counties of the state by the secretary of state, it was announced today.

This is a levy of one-twentieth mill on a total taxable property valuation in the state of \$1,122,332,189.43 with \$94.81 additional due to the legal provision that Multnomah county shall not receive over \$16,500 from the levy. The Multnomah county excess of \$109.49 for each county is required by law to be used for road purposes. Among the apportionments is \$1670.14 for Douglas county.

There will be little use for a roller on the field. To have the funds to complete the project as originally proposed will necessitate the floating of a new bond issue. In my mind the method to be adopted at the airport should be to let the work by contract to the lowest responsible bidder.

"I cannot see where the city of Roseburg has any business attempting to build roads or the city council to buy a road roller when there are three or four rollers in the vicinity that can be rented for \$2.50 per day, or a man furnished to run the roller for \$10 per day, to run the roller, etc., to be paid by the owner. What little street rolling that will be required in this connection with repair work makes it seem frivolous expenditure to spend such a large amount for a new roller.

Methods Criticized "Another point I wish to make is that it has been the policy or procedure for the city to allow the streets and sidewalks to be torn up without requiring the parties who were responsible to replace them in as good shape as they found them and with materials of the same kind. Neither have they been required to keep them in condition as long as the adjacent street stays in good repair, and thereby additional work and expense has been placed upon the city. In replacing sidewalks the sections should extend to the joints, and not give the walk the appearance of patch work, leaving it in an unrepresentable condition.

"I have not familiarized myself as to the provisions of the city charter regarding the repairing of large sections of the city's streets, but it appears to me that outside of taking care of pot holes and ordinary repair work the expense of replacing streets should be up to the adjacent property owners. If the streets are to be rebuilt, it should be done in the same manner as new work.

"When it comes to streets of heavy traffic they should be kept in good repair, but in the remote and residential districts, I don't see the necessity to be particular if not in a dangerous condition.

New Committee Named

"I want to appoint a committee to make a thorough investigation of this matter and will name John Hunter, James Schaeffer, L. W. Engles, Al Creason, J. L. Chambers, A. C. Marsters, A. Salzman, S. J. Jones, Henrie Andrie, I. Kohlhaugen, S. K. Sykes, J. W. Dillard and F. W. Patterson. I ask that this committee go over the situation with the city engineer, or similar by electing a president and secretary, and submit a written report as soon as possible. The city engineer is here to show you a list of the streets which it is proposed to repair.

"I also want to call your attention to the city's bonded indebtedness. January 1, 1929 the aggregate bonded indebtedness against the city was \$324,666.19. This is a mortgage upon every foot of property with the corporate limits, whether the property is directly benefited or not. This is an item that you should take into consideration before placing any additional expense upon the city. The first \$40,000 in bonds voted by the city upwards of 40 years ago, has not yet been paid."

Following the reading of the mayor's statement, there was a brief discussion and it was decided

to make an inspection of the streets next Monday morning, and prepare a report to submit at the next meeting of the council.

CHICAGO IRON WORKERS STRIKE FOR \$13 PER DAY

CHICAGO, June 1.—Bridge and structural iron workers were ordered last night by the executive board of their union to strike today for higher wages. The strike was expected to tie up \$200,000,000 in new construction work and to affect 2,200 workers.

The strike order was issued after several month's negotiations between the union and the iron workers, representing contractors, had failed. The union wanted an increase from \$12 to \$14 a day, but agreed to compromise upon \$13. The league offered 12.50. The old wage agreement of 12 expired last night.

Union officials said workers would be allowed to continue with contractors who agreed to pay the \$13 wage scale, and warned that if the strike continues the ornamental iron workers might also strike. They are seeking the same wage scale as the structural iron workers.
