Joseph, Mo.
A torrential rain, accompanied by hail as large as peach seeds, swept Kansas City last night. The downpour halted street car and motor traffic for nearly an hour.
Wyoming Floods
CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 3.—One woman was drowned and two irrigation dams were destroyed in a rash of water following a severe hail and rain storm here yesterday.

Railroad tracks were undermined, houses were inundated and five of six bridges over Crow creek, which was swollen to flood stage, were washed away.
Mrs. Saledad Rodriguez, 70, deaf and infirm, was unable to struggle to safety and was drowned. Her body was found in a room of her house, submerged.
Damage of \$200,000 at the Wyoming Hareford ranch was the greatest loss of the sudden flood, the worst this region has experienced since 1903 when Crow creek last went on a rampage.
Although several persons have not been accounted for, police expressed the belief that they had been drowned somewhere as a thorough search of the flooded area was made and no other bodies than that of the aged woman were found.

Coldest June in New York
NEW YORK, June 3.—Today was the coldest June day in the history of the New York weather bureau. The mercury dropped to 44 degrees at 3 a. m.
The previous low mark for June was 45 degrees on June 3, 1907.
The drop to 44 degrees today followed a hot spell the latter half of last week that reached its peak with a reading of 90 degrees on Friday.

Texas Flood Recedes
HOUSTON, Tex., June 3.—Flood waters in East Texas that took at least one life in Houston and caused property damage estimated at millions of dollars were rushing toward the Gulf coast lowlands today. Residents in that section have moved to the highlands.
Water of the Buffalo bayou that flooded Houston was within its banks again and the removal of flood wreckage has been started. City officials announced the central water plant would resume operation tomorrow.

The body of Arthur Araldona, 19-year-old passenger boy, was recovered in the basement of a downtown building yesterday. A search has been started for other possible victims.

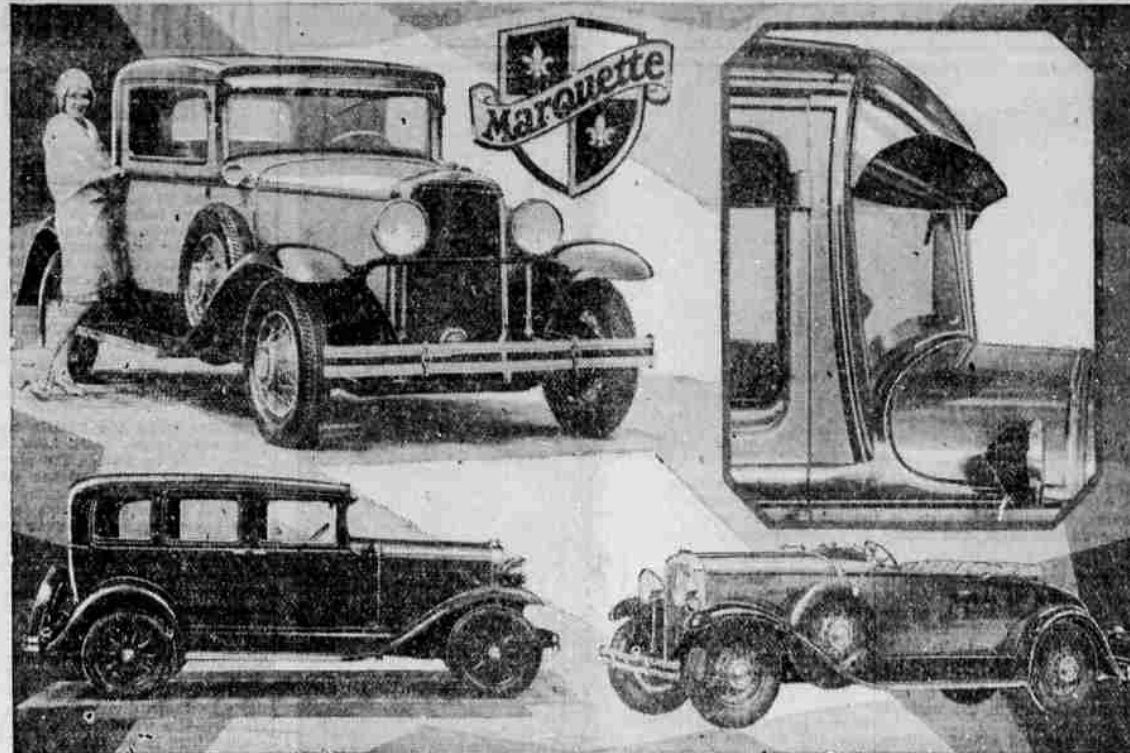

weapon has not been found.
Damaging Remarks
Truman Cassler told of going home last Monday night (the day Miss Souttar last was seen) and finding the place "strangely quiet, with the Missus and Edward acting funny."
"I asked her what was the matter," Cassler said, "and she said, 'Your sweetie was here today, but she won't be bothering any more. She won't be breaking up our family. She's gone away.'"
"I asked her where, and she only snickered. There were stains on the bathroom floor. The place had been all washed up, but there were still stains."
Cassler said his wife and son went out Tuesday in the car and did not return until late at night. The next day, he continued, Mrs. Cassler was "very nervous and sick."
Edward, who Mrs. Cassler says is her son but who, according to her husband, was adopted, said he had told his mother of Cassler's relations with "Camille," but that his mother "seemed to know all about it, anyway."

A wrist watch, similar to the one the dead woman wore at the time of her disappearance, was found last night in the Cassler flat.
Woman Once Condemned
Mrs. Cassler was convicted in May, 1927, of the murder of William Lindstrom, a cabinet maker. She was accused by two accomplices of having planned the killing, which they executed.
She was sentenced to death but won a new trial 24 hours before she was to have been hanged. When her case finally came up last April one witness had died and another refused to testify, the state being compelled to nolle prosequi the case.

VERDICT GIVEN
FOR DEFENSE IN
DAMAGE ACTION

The May term of circuit court was concluded late Saturday evening with a verdict in the case of the Oregon Stages, Inc., against J. L. Chambers, W. S. Smith and H. J. Gray. The suit was one in which the stage company was suing for damages claimed to be due as a result of a collision between the stage and a new Nash car, which the local dealer had just sold and which was being driven by Mr. Smith. The stage company held Mr. Smith to be at fault, while the defense claimed that the stage was occupying more than its share of the road. A non-suit was declared with regard to Mr. Chambers, when the judge ruled that the plaintiffs had not proven that he was owner of the car. The jury after hearing the evidence returned a verdict in favor of the defendant, Mr. Smith, denying the claim for damages and permitting the defendant to recover his costs.

Following the ending of this case a new grand jury was drawn, composed of Foster Butler, Ralph Newton, U. S. Barker, Wm. H. York, W. A. Smith, John Hunter and Arthur Marsh. The grand jury met and named Mr. Butler foreman and was then adjourned subject to call.

WORD RECEIVED
HERE TODAY DEATH
OF G. C. MORRIS

Word was received here this morning of the death of G. C. Morris, for many years a resident of this city, who died very suddenly at 11 a. m. today at his home in Portland. No details of the death were received. Mr. Morris was located in this city for a number of years as chief dispatcher for the Southern Pacific company and was transferred to Portland, where he was later made trainmaster, a position that he held until the time of his death.

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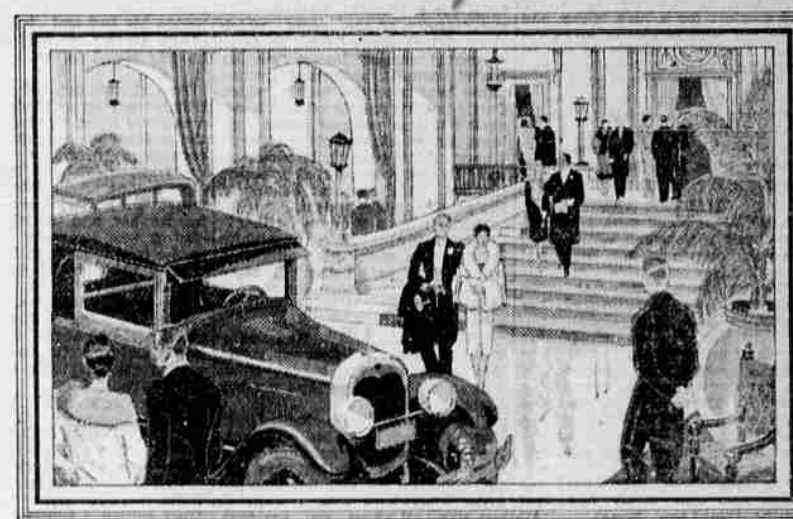

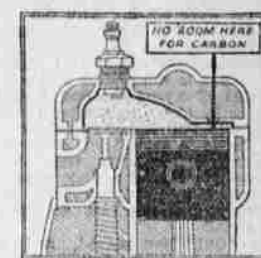
