PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—A drop of 20 cents a barrel in both bakers' and family flours was the most material change in the local market today. Descending wheat prices and large stocks of flour in storage were the main factors in the lower prices.
Butter and eggs were steady and unchanged at Friday's quotations. Cantaloupes and strawberries were becoming more plentiful every day with prices greatly decreased. Wholeberries were quoted Oregon berries at \$2 and \$2.25 per crate. Kennewick and white Salmon creek Clark seedlings were much higher.
Poultry and dressed meats were firm and unchanged.
