

LOCAL NATIONAL GUARD COMPANY GOING TO CAMP

Machine Gun Unit Will
Entrain Tuesday for
Two Weeks of
Training.

Program of Military Drill
and Athletics to Be
Given at Camp
Clatsop.

Co. D, 162nd Infantry, is making
preparations for the annual sum-
mer encampment, which is to be
held at Camp Clatsop June 12 to
28. Monday evening, the regular
drill night for the local unit, the
company was put to work loading
cars with machine guns, ammuni-
tion, cooking utensils, extra
clothing and supplies, so that the
equipment is now ready for ship-
ment.

The company will leave Tuesday
evening, June 11, at 10:30 o'clock,
and will arrive at Portland the fol-
lowing morning at 6 o'clock, re-
maining there for an hour and a
half, and will then proceed to
Camp Clatsop, being scheduled to
arrive at noon.

Information has been received
that numerous improvements have
been made at the camp this year.
New roads have been built, shower
bath buildings constructed, ice
boxes remodeled and renovated
and the combat range overhauled.
Baseball diamonds have been pro-
vided at both ends of the camp. It
is stated, and an improvised stage
for entertainment purposes has
been built.

A most complete and extensive
program has been outlined for this
year's camp, according to Lieuten-
ant Gerritson, the main feature be-
ing a big combat demonstration,
which will be held Saturday, June
22. Over 20,000 people witnessed
the mock battle last year. It is in
the nature of an actual battle de-
monstration by artillery, infantry
and machine gun units, using the
most modern equipment in the way
of field guns, trench mortars, au-
tomatic rifles and machine guns.

In addition to the training work,
Lieutenant Gerritson reports, there
will be a big athletic program ar-
ranged for one afternoon of the
camp.

Due to business reasons, First
Lieutenant Alvin Knutson, who
has attended twelve previous
camps, has resigned his position,
as he will not be able to attend

UNNECESSARY SUIT ASSAILS PROPOSED TAX REFERENDUM

SALISBURY, Ore., June 5.—Notwith-
standing the fact that Secretary
of State Hoar had stated he would
not accept for filing the referen-
dum petitions against the excise
tax act, J. H. Smith and W. S.
U'ren of Portland Tuesday filed
in the circuit court here an in-
junction suit to prevent their be-
ing filed. Judge McMahon granted
a temporary writ and set the case
for 11 o'clock today.

Smith and U'ren allege that the
petitions were brought to Salem
24 hours too late and that they
are not signed by enough names.
Secretary Hoar said he could
not understand why the suit was
filed in view of the stand he al-
ready had taken. Hoar sent a let-
ter to E. H. Wood of Portland
yesterday explaining his stand.
Wood, in charge of the petitions,
insisted to Salem Monday night
with them, but arrived three min-
utes too late to file them within the
time provided by law.

T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic

VETERAN GAINS BRIDE IN SEVEN YEARS' EFFORT

NEW YORK, June 4.—The New
York Herald Tribune said today
that Miss Mary Culberson, only
daughter of the late U. S. Senator
Charles A. Culberson of Texas, has
been married to Alexander
E. Robertson, English World war
veteran, after a courtship of seven
years.

Mr. Robertson in 1922 charged
that private detectives were at-
tempting to drive him from this
country because of his affection for
Miss Culberson. He claimed the ar-
rest of one detective on a charge
of kidnapping but an indictment re-
turned in Newark, N. J., was dis-
missed when the court was informed
Robertson had refused to testify
in order to avoid publicity.

The courtship started when both
he and Miss Culberson were stu-
dents at the University of Texas at
Austin, Texas. Mr. Robertson had
come to this country in 1919 after
serving in France with England's
"first hundred thousand" to volun-
teer after the outbreak of war. He
was gassed and shell shocked.

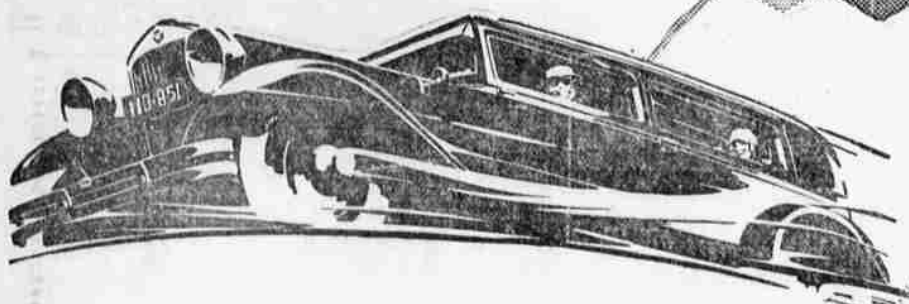

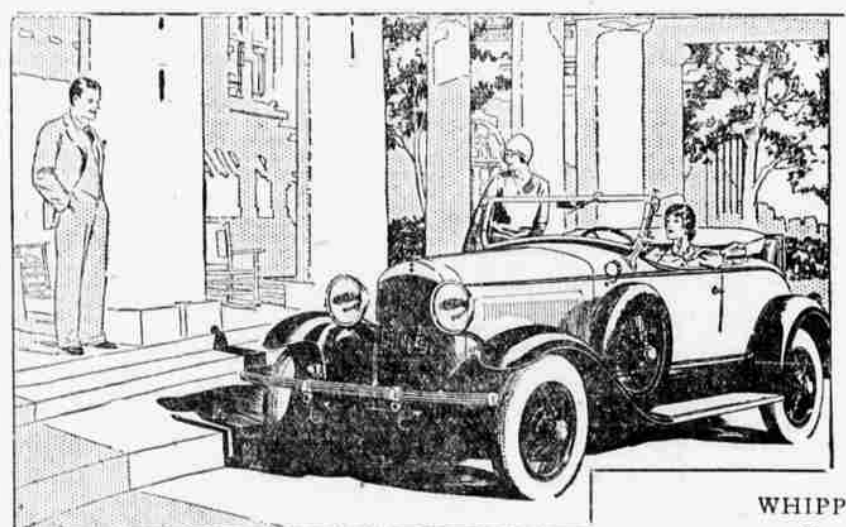
