SAMPLES OF NEW CURRENCY SHOWN

GLENDALE, June 5.—Samples of Uncle Sam's new money—the new small size currency—are on display today at the Glendale State bank, Cashier G. J. Ward, who received one variety of the new \$1 silver certificates, and new \$2 U. S. notes, the new \$5.00 and \$10.00 federal reserve notes from the federal reserve bank at San Francisco, this morning, for display purposes only.

The initial issue of this new small size currency will be made to the public July 10, 1929, and this initial issue will be only in denominations of \$1.00 to \$10.00, although larger denominations are to be issued at some later date.

Neuro Voter Favored
RICHMOND, Va., June 5.—Judge Lawrence D. Groner, in United States district court here today, held the Virginia primary law contrary to the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the federal constitution.

Judge Groner's opinion, in the case of James O. West, negro, against A. C. Hillier and William Boltz, judges, and William Ricker, clerk of a Richmond voting precinct, declared that the state may not provide otherwise than for equal right of suffrage as well in the primary as in the general election.

"This the statute does," he said, "and if this was all there would be no ground for complaint, but it goes further and recognizes and enforces the right of a political party to prescribe qualifications forbidden under the fifteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States. This a state may not do."

Judge Groner's opinion went in to detail as to the constitutionality of the law, which has been construed as barring negro voters.

In his action West claimed nominal damages because precinct officials refused to permit him to vote in the last democratic primary.

To this plea the state, through Leon M. Davis, assistant attorney general, filed a demurrer. The demurrer was overruled today by Judge Groner.

Casey, democratic labor, as additional returns were tabulated from yesterday's special election in the 12th Pennsylvania congressional district to choose a successor to Mrs. Casey's late husband, Representative John J. Casey. She is the mother of eleven children, ten of whom are living.

33 TO 1 HORSE IS WINNER OF DERBY

EPSON DOWNS, England, June 5.—W. Barnett's Trigo, an outsider at 33 to 1, ran away from a picked field of 25 rivals to win the 149th running of the famous English derby here today.

Before an immense crowd estimated by one official at "nearly a million," this comparatively obscure horse romped home a winner by one and one-half lengths.

As the game colt tore down the slope of the straightaway to register one of the many upsets recorded in the long history of this famous classic, literally millions of dollars changed hands throughout the entire world where wagering and participation in the mammoth sweepstakes is believed to have totaled nearly \$100,000,000.

ARGENTINE IS ROCKED AGAIN BY EARTHQUAKES

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, June 5.—New earth shocks have been felt in the province of Mendoza, unconfirmed reports stating that many persons were killed and injured by a quake at El Nevado hill. The Nevado volcano is supposed to have entered activity, emitting a great quantity of smoke, lava and flame.

The region in San Rafael, recently shaken by a quake, continues to be shaken by further tremors and subterranean rumblings near Villa Atril, where a continuous eruption of boiling water.

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 5.—The administration building of the eastern Oregon normal school, just completed, was to be dedicated here today at 2 p. m. with corner-stone ceremonies and a program in the auditorium. Governor I. L. Patterson, A. T. Hill, president of the city committee of La Grande, and Dr. Stephen B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman college, were the main speakers. Dr. Penrose was to deliver the dedication address.

Educators were here today from practically all northwest points, as were state officials, members of the board of regents of normal schools, and representatives of eighteen eastern Oregon counties.

The corner stone laying was in charge of the grand lodge of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, with Frank J. Miller, past grand master and chairman of the building committee of the normal school regents, acting as grand master. He was assisted by Robert S. Eakin and George T. Cochran of La Grande, both past masters, and District Deputy Grand Master Weston G. Shields of Enterprise.

President H. E. Inlow included various documents in the metal box placed in the cornerstone, including copies of the Evening Observer which published for the first time campus plans of the school.

These plans provide for a library building, a practice school building to the south of the administration structure, separated by a wide mall, and a women's dormitory adjoining the gymnasium. The plans also outline three additional buildings and a power house, besides tennis courts, an ornamental lake, a street along the bottom of the hill on which the campus is situated, and football and baseball fields.

Tonight the Union county chamber of commerce was to be host at a banquet honoring the visitors, with informal talks by Governor Patterson and C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction.
