NEW CHRISTIAN CHURCH AT GLIDE DEDICATED SUNDAY

Excellent Program Presented at All-Day Session With Sermon by Rev. Bond.

GLIDE, June 5.—The new Christian church building at Glide was dedicated Sunday, June 2nd, the beautiful temple being filled to overflowing with friends from all parts of the county. It was estimated that more than 300 attended the dedicatory services. There were 100 at the morning Bible school and about 150 at the morning preaching services.

Rev. Stanley Bond of Drain, who conducted the morning services, preached a clear and convincing sermon, taking as his text "The Church as a Superservice Station on the Highway of Life." Eight new members affiliated themselves with the church at this time.

A fine basket dinner was served in the basement of the new church at noon.

The dedicatory services in the afternoon were conducted by Rev. W. R. Baird of the Roseburg Christian church. Seated on the platform with him were Miss Leona Wright, evangelist at large, Rev. B. L. Hicks of the Oakland church, Rev. S. N. Bond of the Drain church, Mr. Miller of Roseburg and Mr. Jack French of Sutherlin. Mr. French conducted the song service. The soloists for the day were Mrs. Paul Caswell, Miss Lottie Rogers and Carl Hill, Jr., all of Glide. Mrs. Herman Miller of Yoncalla, Mrs. S. N. Bond of Drain and Mr. Jack French of Sutherlin. Rev. Baird delivered a very fine sermon on "The Victorious Church."

Following the Christian Endeavor meeting at seven, Rev. Bond preached on the subject "The Promises of Life" to a large congregation. Rev. Bond and Mrs. Bond are remaining at Glide for the rest of the week to hold revival meetings.

New High and Grade School Building To Be Built at Myrtle Creek to Replace The Structure Recently Razed By Fire



Plans have been completed by Architects Tourtellotte and Hummel of Portland, designers of the new court house now being finished in this city, for the new high and grade school to be erected at Myrtle Creek. This new structure, which will be erected at a cost of approximately \$38,000, replaces the school building destroyed by incendiary fire a few months ago.

The new building will be one story in height with exterior dimensions of 154 by 77 feet, and each room will have a ground exit, eliminating danger of children being trapped by fire. The exterior walls will be of concrete, faced with Con-tone. The interior will be of semi-fireproof construction.

The grade school will consist of four standard sized rooms, and the high school will have an assembly and study room, seating 114 persons, two recitation rooms, domestic science and arts laboratory, library, typewriter room, and separate room for faculty and office for the principal.

There will also be included in the building, coat rooms, lavatories, shower bath rooms, storage supply rooms and dressing rooms. The basement will contain the heating plant, fuel room, athletic room and shower baths.

The school board, which consists of Frank Horton, chairman, Henry Saitcliff and Art Dyer, directors, and O. A. Kirby, clerk, is very busy preparing the details preparatory to construction. The site of the old building is to be used, and has already been cleared, and bids are being called for.

Henry F. English, principal of the school last year, has been employed for the coming school year and will serve in the new building, which is to be completed in time for school next fall.
