REIGH COUNT WINS CORONATION CUP

EPSOM, England, June 6.—Reigh Count, American winner of last year's Kentucky derby, finally won a race today in his invasion of England, romping off with the coronation cup.

With J. Childs astride the American colt instead of Chick Lang, who had the mount since he won the 1928 Kentucky derby, Reigh Count led Athford to the finish wire by a head. A length separated the second and third horses. Reigh Count was quoted at 10 to 1 to win.

U. S. GUNBOAT LUZON IS AGROUND NEAR SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, June 6.—The United States gunboat Luzon, 575 tons, was aground today at the breakwater of the Hwang Pu Klank, but was in no danger. It was expected to be refloated at high tide Friday.

The accident occurred where the Hwang Pu flows into the Yangtze River. The ship hitting the breakwater Wednesday.

The Luzon, which had been at the mouth of the Yangtze at target practice, was in the hands of a civilian pilot when the accident occurred. Officers of the fleet flagship, the Pittsburgh, said the pilot gave an incorrect order and as the Luzon was near the breakwater it crashed before the helmsman could correct it.

The Pittsburgh sent down two mine sweepers which were standing by. Lighters took off the boat's fuel oil to lighten its bow which has two punctures. It probably will have to go to dry dock at Shanghai for repairs. The crew remained aboard.

Newspapers are said to have taken their names from a compass which was printed in early editions. Later the letters N-E-W-S to denote north, east, west and south, were used in place of the compass giving birth to the name "newspaper."

A large tank has been erected near the city dock in town and the oil brought here on the steamer "Alvarado" will be stored in this tank for use on the road. The oil is being put on by a new process which will eliminate the damage to cars by the old process and not impair travel.

NORDICS CLAIM AMERICA NAMED FOR ERIK THE RED

MADISON, Wis., June 6.—It now develops that the Norwegians, not content with claiming that Leif Erickson should be hailed as the discoverer of America, contend that the continent was named for Erik the Red, Leif's father. This

discounts the belief that the name came from that of Amerigo Vespucci.

They argue thus: "Ami" in Norwegian means "land." Hence "land of Erik" and eventually "America." Also, the descendants of the Vikings, and there are many in Wisconsin, argue that Erik has as good a claim to the discovery of America as Columbus.

OLD AGE FORMULA

HILO, Hawaii.—Keoki P. K. Kalawainalua, 99-year-old Hawaiian farmer, shakes the meanest shimmy of anyone around these parts. He is classed as Hawaii's best vested native in the art of "animal bulas," which are danced in a sitting posture to the music of a moaning flute. He sets himself down on the bench, and with the aid of a nose flute, goes through sinuous motions that would throw Gilda Gray into spasms of envy.

IMPROVEMENTS ARE BEING MADE AT IDLEYLD PARK

Many improvements are being made at Idleyld park, 24 miles east of Roseburg on the North Umpqua highway, in anticipation of the best season the resort has known. Earl Vosburgh, the owner, and Phelix Winkler, manager, are particularly interested in providing recreational features for the women and children, so that they may be entertained while the men are engaged in fishing, the major sport at the park.

For the kiddies, the management is completing the construction of a merry-go-round swing, which will augment the equipment already provided in the playground. Young people will find plenty of amusement at the new tennis court, while the adults will be able to enjoy a large outdoor checkerboard. This is a large platform, marked off with large squares in the conventional manner, and the counters are moved by canes.

A new building is now under construction to house a screened dining room 20 by 35 feet in size, and a large veranda is being built in front of the recreational hall, and will be furnished with easy chairs and lounges for the comfort of the guests at the resort.

POLICE DENOUNCE U. S. AND CANADIAN "REDS"

ATLANTA, June 6.—Opposition to the activities of the communist parties in the United States and Canada, was expressed in a resolution adopted yesterday by the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

The resolution was inspired by a telegram from David Montgomery, chief of police of Phoenix, Ariz., which declared that "communists throughout the world are making a concerted attack on the police." The telegram said that many communists were alien subjects of deportation and that the secretary of labor "should take more drastic action against communist aliens."

Chief Inspector George Guthrie of Toronto, introduced the resolution and urged its adoption in a speech telling of the disturbance created by the communists during a "free speech campaign" they conducted in Toronto.

Minnesota "Lemon" Has Paid \$20,000,000

Discovery of Iron Ore Enriches State From Unwanted Tract Acquired by Exchange.

VIRGINIA, Minn., June 6.—Minnesota owes a debt of gratitude to a squatter who 38 years ago forced the state to take a "lemon" worth \$400,000,000 or more.

The squatter had settled on a 160-acre tract in southern Minnesota which was a part of the federal government's school land grant to the state. Officials told the state that it would have to take instead 160 acres near here, or nothing at all. It was denounced generally as a bad deal for the state.

Then, in 1891, iron ore was discovered on the alternative tract, the Missabe Mountain mine was launched, and the state treasury began reception of the largest flow of riches from any single source in the commonwealth.

An inventory just completed shows that the "lemon" has already paid more than \$20,000,000 in royalties and taxes, and is only half exhausted.

It was only necessary to go a little below the grass roots to get at the ore, and open pit mining is possible with rail tracks laid right into the 120-acre crater.

Down in southern Minnesota the tract the state thought it was being cheated out of is now worth less than \$20,000.
