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FIRST TURKEY FAIR WILL BE HELD AT OAKLAND IN FALL

Roseburg Withdraws Its Bid for Event Sponsored by County Breeder's Association.

Letter States That Other Communities Entitled to Consideration in Such Projects.

Roseburg has waived its claim for the first annual turkey show to be staged by the Douglas County Turkey Breeders' association, and the event will be presented at Oakland some time in December or January. Both Roseburg and Oakland presented bids for this fair and the matter was submitted to the directors of the association for a vote on the site, but before the vote was taken the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce decided to withdraw and allow the first show to be held in Oakland.

In a letter to County Agent J. C. Leedy the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce stated that "It is our intent and will be our constant effort to have the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce represent not only Roseburg but also every part of the Umpqua valley. We realize fully that other sections of this county are entitled to consideration and what furthers the interest of one town very naturally helps every single district. We feel that the poultry business in its various ramifications should be made the major industry of this entire valley. At any rate we are going on this assumption and are planning to this end.

"Will you please promise in the name of the Chamber of Commerce our most hearty cooperation with all turkey growers of the Umpqua valley in this movement, as we see it is the beginning of a big thing. Also please express to Oakland our promise to be of help to them in making this a pronounced success, and let them feel at liberty to call upon this organization at any and all times for the help that is within our power to give them."

The letter of withdrawal, together with the statement from the local Chamber of Commerce, was mailed to each of the directors before the ballots were cast, so that the election resulted in a unanimous choice for Oakland.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, however, declared that by withdrawing the bid for this year's fair, it did not desire to establish a precedent, for Roseburg will be ready to present the fair at any time, and will perhaps seek it in the future, but as Oakland desires to stage the event this year and as

turkey raising is one of the important industries in that locality, the local Chamber was willing that the first fair be held at that place without competition from Roseburg.

The turkey breeders are planning on a large fair at which choice birds will be displayed in an effort to stimulate the industry and to bring about a greater interest in high quality birds and to develop a new industry in the way of establishing a market for fine breeding birds, which offer a good opportunity for profit to the turkey growers, as the fancy birds bring a high price.

RAND JURY FOREMAN IS NEW LOS ANGELES MAYOR

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—John C. Porter, "dark horse" candidate for mayor of Los Angeles in yesterday's election, won by a majority of 45,199 votes over William C. Bonelli, the final official count today showed.

The mayor-elect, who rose to local fame as a member of the 1928 "clean up" grand jury, polled 151,710 votes to 106,511 for his opponent. Even more one-sided was the race for the office of city attorney, with Edwin P. Wernier polling 152,173 votes against \$2,463 for Pierson M. Hall.

SENATOR FESS' SON IS TARGET FOR BULLETS

HAMILTON, Ohio, June 5.—Mistaken identity was accepted today as the reason for the attempt near here last night to shoot C. Sumner Fess, of New York, son of Senator Simeon D. Fess, who was fired upon as he drove from Middletown to Hamilton, Fess was unhurt.

A theory that his automobile might have been mistaken for that of a gangster was considered by police, who said the shots probably were fired by bootleggers who mistook the Fess machine for that of a rival. Several persons have been killed recently in gang warfare.

Fess was alone at the time. Two shots were fired and the car then sped away, he declared.

SCIENCE BECOMING STRONGER IN WAR ON LAW VIOLATOR

Exhaustive Probing System Allows Criminals Slim Chance to Escape Detection.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The Sherlock Holmes of tomorrow will not be a detective solving baffling mysteries by his own cleverness, but a scientific expert relying upon standardization methods of precise identification.

This prediction was made by William Souder of the bureau of standards, in placing before the national conference of weights and measures the bureau's work with the problems of identification.

The cunning criminal, who masks his face and gloves his hands, the expert showed, will find himself pitted against the cold scrutiny of super-microscopes that will tear his identity from a type-written document, a pistol ball, a cartridge shell, or a signature.

Experts who make identifications in a logical, precise manner will replace "the so-called experts who

recognize no limitations, no standards, and no equipment as essential in their field," Mr. Souder said. In an effort to establish standards for this class of work, it was explained, the bureau has taken up the problems of identifications of written and typewritten documents, signatures, guns, and bullets.

No Detail too Small.
The slightest defects and variations that distinguish one type-writer from another are susceptible, it was found, to precision measurements which, when analyzed by an expert, are sufficient to establish the identity of a machine.

Attempts to destroy "these beacon lights of evidence," Mr. Souder said, "are seldom successful and would require on the part of the one who seeks to mask them a perfect analysis of every defect with equipment not readily available."

Ballistic identifications, which have as their purpose the determination of the gun from which a certain bullet was fired, may be made by measurements and comparisons.

Marks left on a ball by the grooves of a pistol barrel, the imprint of a firing pin and breech markings on a shell, rust spots and injuries to the inner surface of a barrel, he said, are all measurable traces.

CALIFORNIA WILL GET PRISONER AT MEDFORD

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—Extradition of Clarence Frick, under arrest at Medford, was authorized by the office of Governor Patterson yesterday on a requisition from California. He is wanted for a statutory offense alleged to have been committed at Stockton.

MAY REPORT OF STATE CHAMBER SHOWS BIG GAIN

The steady stream of new people into Oregon is revealed by the May report of the State Chamber of Commerce which shows 75 new families who located in all sections of the state. These new people purchased 4154 acres of land and invested a total of \$260,900 in property. During the month the state chamber received letters from 89 families who stated they had received Oregon literature and had decided to come to this state and locate. These prospective families will have \$204,700 to invest.

Other interesting figures of the May report are: 1486 letters were received from people interested in Oregon; 103 families signed the chamber's questionnaire giving facts about what they were seeking in Oregon; 5429 letters were mailed to prospective families and 2865 pieces of Oregon literature were mailed; 352 people called at the Portland office.

The state chamber report for the first five months of this year likewise shows a very substantial increase in new families, acres of land purchased and investments made. New families for the first five months of 1928 were 122, com-

pared with 232 for 1928; acres of land purchased in 1928 were 8250, compared with 12544 this year, and investments made by new families rose from \$420,676 in 1928 to \$506,225 in the first five months of 1929.

DERN'S AIRPLANE SPIN BEATS KRUSE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Ira Dorn, Salt Lake, heavyweight wrestler, took two out of three falls from Bob Kruse, Oswego, here last night. Dorn won the first fall in 32 minutes, 41 seconds on a flying chancery. Kruse took the second fall in 5 minutes 9 seconds with a succession of standing wristlocks. Dorn took the final fall in 2 minutes when he hoisted Kruse in the air, threw him over his shoulder and smashed him to the mat. Dorn weighed 195, Kruse 196.

In the preliminary Ray Jeffries, Portland, and Joe Reynolds, Los Angeles, wrestled to a draw, each winning a fall.

Temporary benches will be placed at the large open air dance pavilion to provide for the convenience of the audience at the program and address which be-

gins at 1:30 p. m. This will be followed by dancing, afternoon and evening, a splendid program of athletic events, sports, and comedy stunts, assuring a full afternoon of enjoyment. Good music has been arranged for the dancing.

The celebration is to be open to the public and the management is extending a general invitation to all residents of the county and tourists to attend.

REPORTED BLAZE ON VESSEL HOAX

LONDON, June 6.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Tokyo today said the Japanese steamer Ugo Maru had arrived at Kamchatka, Siberia. Authorities were said to be investigating previous reports the vessel had burned and its crew of 43 and 700 passengers lost.

The ship was under charter by the soviet fish trust and was bound for Kamchatka from Vladivostok. Soviet authorities in denying the mishap charged the reports were spread to make it difficult to recruit other fishing crews.
