

LOS ANGELES TAKES NO CHANCES WITH FRUIT OF FLORIDA

(Associated Press Special Wire)
 LOS ANGELES, June 6.—Citrus fruits from the area infested by the Mediterranean fruit fly in Florida have been seized here and ordered destroyed.
 The seizures have been confined to oranges and grapefruit brought in on dining cars and Pullmans of trans-continental trains. While examination of the fruit has not revealed any infection from the fruit fly, added precaution will be taken to keep eastern shipments out of California.
 To bring citrus fruit into California is in violation of quarantine laws established in 1914, a measure passed to protect the industry in the state against citrus canker, a disease which totally destroys the trees.
 Retained officials have been ordered to advise all employers to see that citrus fruits from other states are destroyed before the fruits cross the California border.

ALASKA BECOMES VITAL FACTOR IN AERIAL INDUSTRY

 PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—Confident that Portland and Seattle are the natural gateways to the United States for air traffic with Siberia and the far East, Ernest Walker Sawyer, executive assistant to the secretary of interior, arrived in Portland today from San Francisco enroute to Alaska.
 The German Graf Zeppelin, he said, will operate from Fairbanks, Alaska, next April on voyages of exploration over the north pole, and supplies must be taken north over the Alaskan railroad operated by the interior department.
 Reindeer farming has increased from 2,000 head to an annual production of 350,000 head, he said, and reindeer farming is practically controlled by the interior department. In the past year sixty new airplane landing fields were established in Alaska and the department is taking a keen interest in them, Sawyer said.

WOOL MARKET NOT LIVELY IN EAST

 BOSTON, June 6.—The Commercial Bulletin today will say: "The movement of wool in the eastern seaboard markets has not been keen this week, although medium wools appear to be rather better stabilized than fine wools, even best fine French combing wools bring 95 cents, clean, with difficulty."
 "In the west, the marketing of the new crop has been irregular, although the movement has been a little more keen towards the end of the week and prices show little change compared with a week ago."
 "Foreign markets are generally quiet. Liverpool reports little change in prices at the East India sales from last series' closing rates."
 "The manufacturing position evidently is without material change. Repeat business appears a little less eager."
 "Mohair is steady here with moderate movement. Prices in Turkey are reported slightly easier."

EASTERN OREGON WOOL MEN REFUSE BIDS AT CONDON

 CONDON, Ore., June 7.—More than half of the one million pounds of wool offered at the wool auction here yesterday was withdrawn by owners when spirited bidding failed to develop and, strong prices failed to materialize.
 It was said, however, that Andrew Little, reputed to hold the largest individual clip in the United States, sold all of his 100,000 pound clip on a bid to Emmett, Idaho.
 Little declined to make public the price he received, although he did say he received eight cents less than he obtained for his 1928 wool. Last year his clip brought 32 cents.
 Prices here ranged from 23c to 28c a pound.

COMPENSATION ACT APPLIES IN DEATH FROM BAD WATER

 SALEM, Ore., June 7.—Although the husband of Alberta Blair died of typhoid fever and not by accident, she is entitled to state compensation under the workman's compensation act, according to a jury verdict in the circuit court here yesterday. Blair died from drinking the water of Rogge river while working for the state highway department. The plaintiff contended that the highway commission was negligent in allowing the water to be used. The defense declared the workmen had been warned not to drink it. The case was first tried last fall but the jury disagreed.
 Janitors who enter into contracts with their employers come within the scope of the workmen's compensation act, for they are still employees, according to an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle. The opinion was in reply to an inquiry by the state industrial accident commission, and pertained to janitors in the Portland public schools who have entered into contracts with the school board.
