SHRINERS START FOR HOMES AFTER BRILLIANT FETE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 7.—Fairland was re-created to the echoing cheers of 80,000 persons in Los Angeles' huge coliseum last night as the city bade farewell to the ancient Arable order. Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. The fifty-fifth annual convective came to an end under a many hued blaze of lights as the million dollar electrical pageant wended its spectacular way around the great bowl.

Following the flickering rainbow fingers of a man-made aurora borealis, new worlds whirled through space, yawning caverns belched rosy fire, desert caravans were etched in silver and bronze, and gardens of fragile flowers shed incandescent gleams. The spectacle sent departing Shriners to their waiting trains in a bewildering shower of electric magic. Early today the massed special trains began moving out of the city's railway stations. Theodus was to continue with little reduction in volume until tomorrow. Wheeled cities in the railway yards, in which thousands of the Shrine visitors had made their homes during the convention were cut loose and rolled east, north and south. The nine special trains of Medinah temple, Chicago, were the first to leave. Many of the delegations were routed via other Pacific coast points to the north and south, with various stopovers arranged.

As the Shriners departed, selection of the 1930 convention city had not been made. New Orleans, Atlantic City and Toronto, Canada, were the chief bidders at yesterday's imperial council session. Decision was deferred pending a survey of hotel facilities and other requirements. No applications for new temples were presented during the convective.

The fact that life hangs in the balance and crime has been committed cannot take from the courtroom onlookers the appreciation of a ridiculous or embarrassed person placed on the stand as a witness, nor can the sternest judge bring immediate order to the scene.

NEW ALTITUDE MARK FOR SEAPLANE SET BY LIEUT. SOUCEK

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Establishment of a new world's seaplane altitude record by Lieutenant Apollo Soucek of the navy in his attempt Tuesday was announced today by the National Aeronautic association after a check of his barograph by the bureau of standards. Soucek exceeded by 560 feet the record of 37,895 made by Lieut. C. C. Chamption of the navy in the same Wright Apache plane two years ago. Soucek recently set a new altitude record for land planes, attaining a height of 35,144 feet but the honor was short lived as a few days later a German flyer, Willy Neuhoffer, pushed his plane upward to a new world record of 42,123 feet. The naval flier set the new world record for seaplanes on June 4, taking off at the naval air station here.

FORMER DOUGLAS COUNTY MAN MAY GET LIFE TERM

Harvey Elee, a former resident of Douglas county, who is now under arrest at Eugene on a charge of larceny is being cited under the habitual criminal act, and may receive a life term in the penitentiary, according to word received from Eugene. A person convicted four times for larceny is subject to this act, according to the Oregon law, and can be sentenced to a life term. Elee, it is charged, has been convicted seven times in 25 years, his first term having been imposed

at the age of 14 years, when he was sent to the reform school from Douglas county. He is now 42 years of age and has never been out of the penitentiary or some other penal institution for more than one year at a time. The seven convictions which the state will present against Elee are as follows: January 22, 1904, convicted by the circuit court of Douglas county, Oregon, of the crime of grand larceny; December 22, convicted by the superior court for Adams county, Washington, of the crime of larceny of a horse; July 23, 1913, in the circuit court of Lane county, for burglary not in a dwelling house; January 17, 1917, in the circuit court of Malheur county for the crime of burglary not in a dwelling; May 31, 1922, in the circuit court of Lane county for the crime of larceny; April 8, 1925, in the circuit court of Chouteau county, Montana, for the crime of grand larceny; June 4, 1929 in the circuit court of Lane county, for the crime of burglary not in a Ford coupe, 1925 model, about six weeks old, for sale by Hansen Chevrolet for about \$125 less than cost price.
