SUTHERLIN WILL HAVE EXCELLENT TOURIST CAMP

SUTHERLIN, June 7.—Walter W. Barbs, who came here recently from Washington and purchased the Charles Anderson estate of 201 acres in the south part of town, has a force of men engaged on construction work on what promises to be one of the largest automobile camps in Oregon. Two of the buildings embraced in the plans are now under construction and Mr. Barbs estimates that a year or more will be required to complete the work on buildings, roads and beautify the landscape at an approximate cost of \$30,000.

All the buildings including thirty cabins and the service station and storage warehouse, the latter two now under construction, will be of the log cabin type. These logs, which are being furnished by Joelson Brothers, well known mill men of Umpqua, are from small trees and slabs are removed from three sides at the mill, thus giving them all a uniform thickness. Before being placed in the wall the bark is removed, and later the smooth outside surface will be given a coat of heavy varnish. The ends of the timbers are smoothly rounded before being placed in the wall and they are fastened through the center and at the ends with 1 1/2 inch spikes, the heads of which are sunk two inches into drilled holes. The shank roofs will be supported by fir poles from which the bark has been removed, and their length provides for 12-foot eaves.

The two buildings now under construction have attracted considerable attention from tourists, many of whom have stopped in order to inspect them closely. They are being built on concrete foundations and are vastly different from any other type of buildings on the Pacific highway. The service station, which will be completed in about two weeks, is 29x32 feet in size and will have three gasoline pumps. The storage building, which is located about twenty feet from the milling station will probably be completed in about three weeks. It is 18x24 feet in size and will be used for the storage of oils, greases, tires, etc. and will be provided with hydraulic greasing equipment. These two buildings are being erected on lands formerly occupied as an orchard, and entrance to the service station will be provided for by a wide macadam road leading from the Pacific highway both on the south and east sides. Plans provide for a large lawn adjacent to the highway which is to be beautiful with shrubs and new bushes.

The timbered slope on the east side of the highway, on which thirty cabins with modern conveniences are to be erected, will be landscaped, the small trees trimmed and roads constructed through the timbered area. A swimming pool and other features may be added. An abundance of pure water is provided by several springs.
