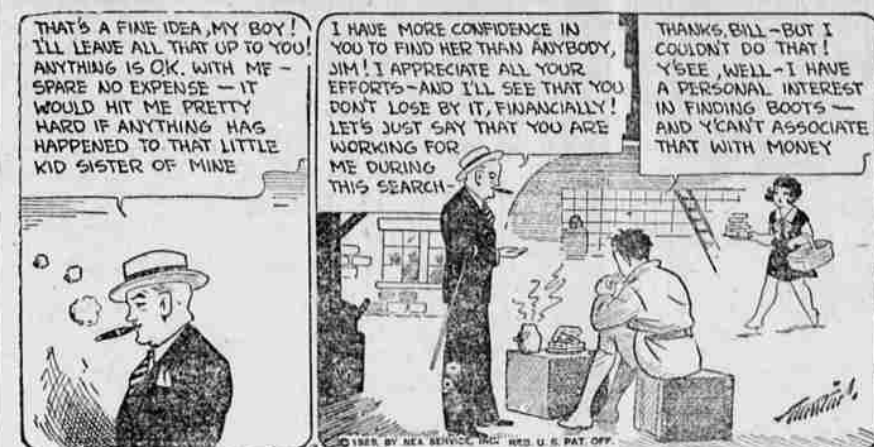

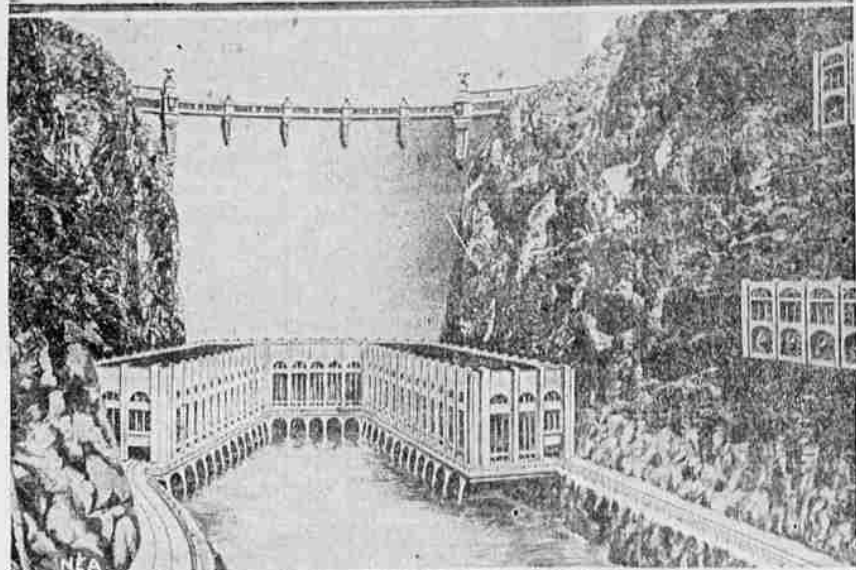

## DAMAGED PLANE MOTOR IS BEING OVERHAULED HERE

Work of repairing the nose motor of the West Coast Air Transport plane, which was forced down here a few days ago by engine trouble, is being undertaken here. The high compression caused the breakage of the top of one of the pistons, causing broken material to be ground up in the motor, resulting in considerable damage. The power plant was new, having been purchased less than a month ago, and had only a few hours of flying service.

A factory representative was in Roseburg yesterday to make an inspection on behalf of the makers of the engine, while Leo Devaney, superintendent of the West Coast company, and Gordon Burnett, chief mechanic, are also here.

Mr. Burnett, a former resident of Roseburg, who is now in charge of the company's mechanical department, flew to Roseburg, and then returned to the shops, procuring the necessary equipment for repairs, and drove back to this city to assist in overhauling the motor. Kenneth Householder, also of this city, mechanic and co-pilot of the plane, is doing the mechanical work. De-

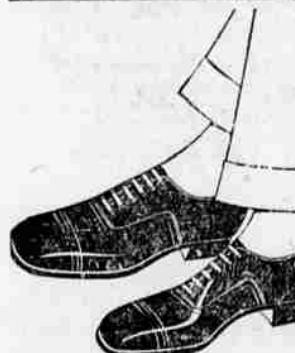
