publican ranks."

Senator Charles, democrat, Virginia, a Smith supporter in the "malignancy" state went into the Hoover column, as one who sent his regrets, but, taking cognizance of the reports centering on similar action by other party leaders of the south, he made public a letter written to Mr. Smith in which he explained his inability to attend.

He had an engagement with his physician in Baltimore today, contracted ten days ago, he said, and an engagement made May 16 for an important Masonic function in Virginia tonight. He said he wished to express my personal affection for you and my great satisfaction at your selection to take charge of democratic headquarters in Washington, and regretted that "circumstances prevent me from being among those who, on this occasion, will attest their approval of your appointment and their complete confidence in your ability to administer the party's affairs."

Three Senators Decline.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina, who bolted the Smith-Raskob leadership in the last campaign, has been the most vigorous democratic commentator in opposition to the dinner, describing it as "an opportunity, while Senator Smith of South Carolina, another who will not attend, refused to make a statement in the interests of party harmony." Senators Blaise of South Carolina, and Harris of Georgia, were among those who had "other arrangements."

Invitations were extended only to prominent democrats living in Washington. Bowles Raskob and Shrouse, the speakers, whose words will be broadcast over a nationwide radio chain, will include representative Byrnes of Tennessee, chairman of the congressional campaign committee; Senator Tydings of Maryland, chairman of the senatorial campaign committee, and Mrs. J. Bordin Harrison, national committeewoman for the District of Columbia.

possible out of the hands of the naval experts and within the control of statesmen of the two countries.

It was not disclosed whether any definite approach had been made to Washington or whether the prime minister would await the arrival of General Charles G. Dawes, new ambassador to St. James.

Washington Approves.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—New hope for effecting the reduction of naval armaments which President Hoover desires was seen by observers here in the report that Prime Minister MacDonald may come to Washington to discuss Anglo-American relations with President Hoover.

Although comment from the White House was lacking, it was taken for granted that such a visit from the new labor head of the British government would be welcomed by the American cabinet executive. The suggestion, surprising though it was, gained immediate approval in circles familiar with Anglo-American affairs.

Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, who has been in correspondence with the English labor party chief for more than three years, expressed the opinion that "close cooperation between Mr. MacDonald and President Hoover would give exceptional assurance that progress would be made" toward solution of the great problem of lifting the burden of armament from the backs of men.

Neither Senator Borah nor other congressional and governmental leaders interested in Anglo-American affairs, however, were prepared for the suggestion that the prime minister might come to Washington, although they have been expecting him to make some move with respect to disarmament negotiations. The president's Memorial day address, emphasizing the administration's international armaments policy, was regarded as certain to interest Mr. MacDonald greatly, but it has been thought that he probably would await the arrival of the new American ambassador, former Vice-President Dawes, before reaching a decision.

CARDINALS, CUBS
CLIMB AS PIRATES
AND GIANTS LOSEYankees Ascend to Second
Place in American By
Hifst With Ruth
in Grandstand.

The weekend campaign in the major leagues found both the Giants and the Pirates arriving at the end of their sports, but giving their opponents no guarantee against an immediate resumption. Red Lucas pitched one of the best games he has flashed this season to shade the veteran Jack Scott and the Giants by 2 to 1 at Redland field yesterday as the Pirates crumpled before an eight-round assault at Ebbets field where the Indians took a 9 to 6 decision.

The defeat of both of the teams currently rated as the most dangerous in the National league enabled the Cardinals and the Cubs to improve their positions a bit. The Red Birds had some difficulty with Claude Willoughby, but bunched their hits in such a way as to win by 5 to 4. Jess Hahn was tight in the pinches, and had to be as the Phils outlit his support, 13 to 9.

Artie Nehf found young Ben Cantwell a tough opponent in Chicago, and the Cubs won by 2 to 1 only because Hack Wilson nicked Cantwell for a home run in the seventh with Hornsby on base. The Boston Braves had scored in their own half of the round on Maguire's double and Harper's single. The Cards climbed to within a game of the Pirates and remained one contest ahead of the third-place Braves.

Yanks in 2nd Place.

With Babe Ruth in the stands as a spectator, the Yankees stamped the Browns by 17 to 2 in the series opener yesterday. Lou Gehrig and Sammy Byrd led the early assault with home runs, Gehrig with two and Byrd with one, and after that the Yanks coasted, hitting everything that was served to them. The Victory sent the Yanks into second place, seven full games behind the leading Athletics.

Gehrig's two homers sent him to the lead in his own league and sending him into a tie with Klein of the Phillies and Hefey of the Cardinals in the interleague race.

With the Athletics and the White Sox idle, awaiting the anticipated feat of the Mackmen this week, action along the rest of the American league front was confined to Boston and Washington. George Uhle, who won nine games before losing one, met his second defeat of the season when he weakened toward the finish at Braves' field, permitting the Red Sox to score six times in the last two innings to gain a 7 to 6 margin. Ed Morris went the route for Boston.

Ad Liska, the promising recruit from the American association pitched up to his best advance notices in turning back the Indians by 6 to 2 at Washington. The Senators clubbed John Miller for four runs in the third, and Liska coasted in with only one bad inning—the fourth, which saw both the Cleveland runs scored.

RUTH SAYS HE'LL
BE BACK TO HELP
DOWN ATHLETICS

NEW YORK, June 10.—Babe Ruth may be too ill to play base-

ball these days but he can't keep away from the game that made him famous.

With his wife, the former Claire Hodgson, the Babe was a spectator at yesterday's game between the Yankees and the Browns. The famous slugger didn't go near the Yankee bench but sat in a box along the right field stands.

He stood up and cheered when his friendly rival, Lou Gehrig, hit his 15th home run and was dislodged only with difficulty from tossing away his expensive hat when "Columbia" Lou shot his 14th into the right field bleachers later.

Still a bit weak from a severe cold, Ruth was able, nevertheless, to talk a good game of baseball. "I hope they keep up this hitting against the Browns and the Tigers," he said. "I'll be back to help them against the Athletics—the only team we have to beat."

FRISCO CROWDING
MISSIONS; DUCKS
LOSE TWO IN DAY

With Pacific Coast league teams fast approaching midseason form, the league leading clubs were closely grouped in the standings after yesterday's doubleheaders.

The second place San Francisco Seals, champions of last year's race, continued to creep up on the San Francisco Missions, leaders of the pack, by twice drubbing the Hollywood Stars at Recreation park here. The morning game was won 8 to 7 after an uphill fight, and the afternoon score was taken by 9 to 7. Sacramento took both ends of the program from the Seattle Indians, and made it six out of seven for the week, in the California capital. The morning game at Stockton was a two-inning battle which the Seals won 5 to 4. In the afternoon the Seals ran away from the tribe 8 to 1.

Los Angeles and the Missions split even, the Reds winning the opener 10 to 7, and the Angels capturing the seven-inning evening game 5 to 2 to take the old game of the series, played in the southern city. The Angels now maintain third place in the standings.

Oakland took both ends of the double bill with the Portland Ducks. The first game score was 1 to 0, and the second 5 to 5. The Oaks thus won six out of seven for the week. The Oaks gained on the third place Angels by their double win. Pete Baglia was the star of the day, and just missed pitching the first no-hit, no-run game of his career. Art Jahn scored the only run of the game in the ninth inning.

VENEZUELAN RAID
AND MURDER AT
DUTCH BARRACKS

(Associated Press Special Wire)

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, June 10.—The Dutch authorities moved promptly today to deal with the situation created at Willemstad, Curacao, Saturday night when a force of 500 men, described as Venezuelans, overcame the military police and seized the store of arms in the police barracks.

The Dutch destroyer Kortenaar was ordered to leave for Curacao, while the battleship Herzo Hendrik also was ordered to prepare for her prompt departure to West Indian waters.

During the attack at Willemstad three members of the military police were killed and several wounded. The governor of the island and the commander of the police were kidnapped and carried off in a seized vessel, but subsequently were permitted to return to Curacao.

While the reasons for the attack were somewhat obscure, the Dutch colonial office was of the opinion that the raid and the seizure of the police arms were part of a movement by the attackers to be launched against the government of Venezuela.

The 500 "bandits" as the government report described them, sailed for Venezuela and have since dropped from sight.

Willemstad, capital of the island of Curacao, is approximately 40 miles from the Venezuelan mainland, and has often been used as a

place of refuge by political exiles from Venezuela.

Venezuela has a new president in the person of Dr. Juan Bautista Perez, who recently succeeded General Gomez. In the latter years of General Gomez' long tenure there were repeated reports of movements against his government.
