SLAYS BROTHER'S WIFE AND HIMSELF

MT. VERNON, Ky., June 10.—M. J. Betherum, 45, shot and fatally wounded his brother's wife near here yesterday and then killed himself. According to Deputy Sheriff N. J. Tivon, no cause for the act has been discovered.

Charles Betherum, husband of the dead woman, heard shots and rushed from the house to find his wife dead. His brother shot himself before he could stop him.

M. J. Betherum was a lawyer and a brother of the late Judge Lethrum, prominent in state politics. A coroner's jury returned a verdict that Betherum killed the woman and himself while insane.

NATIONAL GUARD UNIT MOBILIZED FOR ENCAMPMENT

Militiamen Assemble at the Armory This Morning and Receive Their Equipment.

Special Train Will Leave City at 10:30 This Evening; Fine Program.

The Roseburg national guard unit, Co. D, 162nd infantry, mobilized at the armory this morning and made preparations for the two weeks' summer encampment at Camp Clatsop. The company will entrain tonight at 10:30 o'clock and will reach Portland in time for breakfast tomorrow morning. It is planned to be in camp at noon.

The boys were issued their camp equipment today and, after a "show - down" inspection rolled their packs and belongings ready to entrain.

The program for this year's camp includes some very interesting military instruction, and will provide actual battle practice, concluding with a sham battle in which all of the modern implements of warfare will be used. This battle is expected to draw an immense crowd of spectators from Portland, Astoria and other nearby cities. In addition to the military instruction, there is a fine program of athletics and recreation.

Camp Clatsop is located about 9 miles from Astoria and overlooks the ocean, so that the guardsmen will have an opportunity to enjoy beach sports during recreation hours.

52 OIL COMPANIES GUILTY OF TRUST LAW VIOLATIONS

CHICAGO, June 11.—The Standard Oil company of Indiana and 51 associate and subsidiary concerns were convicted in United States district court today on charges of violating the Sherman anti-trust law. The charges concerned what is known as the peeling of oil cracking process patents. The court ruled, in a two to one decision, that the government was entitled to an injunction restraining the oil firms from further violation.
