PLAN FOR CITY IMPROVEMENT IS LAUNCHED

plans may be worked. Weekly or fortnightly, at least, meetings should be called to get the reports of progress in the work of each committee; for example, those on paint up, alleys, parkways, lawns, buildings, billboards, public utility and window displays.

"Cooperation from stores handling goods, plants, paint and hardware is essential. It is a business proposition. Money is being spent by thousands to get tourists to come to Oregon for homes and vacations. This county should take advantage of the effort and get as many as possible to stay here for as long as possible. The only way is to make it attractive and be courteous to them—make it easy for the visitors to get the beauty they are in search of. People will spend more for beautiful things than almost anything else. Make the county look better, and you, yourselves, will like it better."

Visitors See County

Many of the smaller cities are eager to begin an improvement campaign, but they lack time to develop a method that is workable. Roseburg owes its existence to the farming community and smaller surrounding cities. Roseburg may well start and help its neighbors carry out the big project. It ought not be hard for such a campaign to be staged for the whole state of North Carolina, not very long ago. New York and Chicago have organized on a monthly scale, repeating year after year for, to be successful, the campaign must be continuous.

"Not long ago a man said to me when I stopped at his service station 'I am tired of directing people to the country around here because after they make the trip they go whizzing past and just wave their hands, or if they stop they tell me that the farms and towns are so run down that it must be hard to make a living here. This is not so, compared to most places,' said Maurice Newland."

"But it's hard to make visitors believe it for the evidence is not to be seen in the dwellings. However, the per capita wealth here is very high. It would be much higher if full advantage were taken of the county's resources and agricultural possibilities, and a systematic method of marketing were adopted to conserve duplicated sales effort."

Best Time to Start

"The time is ripe now. The weather would be dry and homes may be painted to the best advantage, in carrying out the campaign idea. New roots may be put on for next year. After that is done, home owners may look after their lawns so that they may be growing during the rainy season when water comes without need from nature. Shrubs may best be transplanted in the fall. Then, next year, Douglas county people need not feel apologetic for the condition of its cities and homes."

"From the tourist standpoint just estimate the value to come from a successful clean up and paint up campaign throughout the county," continued Mr. Newland. "The average tourist is reported to spend \$7 a day for gas, oil, tires, food, lodging and other necessities or luxuries. Many spend more and some less. This is the kind of county to attract those who spend more."

As many as 125,000 have been counted from out of the state as they crossed the creek bridge. Seven dollars a time, that many tourists in a season makes \$875,000 which is more than the county gets from any one crop, save prunes this year. Imagine the possibilities if Douglas county becomes so attractive that tourists stay here two, three, or four days, or maybe a week or so to look around. The greatest crop of all—tourists.

Natural Scenery Here

"California would rather part with any of her industries than her tourist. Tourists make California. California realizes the value of them and is going so far as to plant trees on her highway and water them at tremendous expense with trucks drawing trailers loaded with water. Here we have the natural scenery and romantic background. All it needs is playing up by attention and advertising. What a shame to mar it with dilapidated buildings."

Organization Can Help

In the outlying country there is considerable evidence of a desire for improvement. In many places new, fine homes have been erected where formerly stood just buildings that served for shelter. In a few places along the North Umpqua river, brush has been cleared away to allow a view of the river and wonderful mountain views. The Umpqua valley needs more of such dressing up.

"It's a big undertaking requiring lots of time and involving everybody," said Napoleon Rice, "Granges, churches, lodges, the Business and Professional Women's association, Parent Teachers associations, the Boy Scouts, the American Legion and the Auxiliary, the Umpqua Chiefs, the Garden club, the Rotary, Lions and Kiwanis clubs, and others can all contribute part to the campaign and keep it going through the year and time to come. In fact, the campaign cannot be successful without the cooperation of organizations."

Merchants Big Help

"Taking Roseburg as a starting place for the county-wide program, it could be divided into districts, a representative to be appointed for each district," suggested Mr. Rice. "The representatives from each of the organizations should be appointed to bring about wide contact and stimulate enthusiasm. There should be a central group to plan and coordinate through which the
