FARM BILL VOTE

measure, inserted that provision. The house refused to accept it, and its conferees who met with the senate conferees steadfastly held out against any measure which contained such a provision.

Senator Shipstead, farmer-labor of Minnesota, left a sick bed to come to the chamber today for the first time this session and vote against the measure.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—With the Hoover forces striving to win the balance in the closely divided senate on the administration farm bill vote today, Senator Johnson, republican, California, opened a bitter denunciation of the measure and loosed an attack against the "crack of the party lash."

The president had conferred with some of the doubtful republicans at the White House early today and as the debate got under way Senator Johnson began from the senate floor an attack upon what he called the "ruthless power to drive" members of the senate.

"I'd rather be a frog living on a dungheap mound," shouted the Californian, "I'd rather be a dog baying at the moon than bending to a larder. I'll stand by the president when I believe him to be right but I will not stand by him when I believe him to be wrong, realizing full well what the consequences may be."

Senator Johnson was the second republican in as many days to assail the administration measure. With a vote to be taken at 1 o'clock, word came from both sides that a tie result or a margin of about one vote would decide the issue.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—An intensive drive for votes was under way today in the senate as a decision was neared in the controversy over the debenture plan in the farm relief bill and on the bill itself and three republican senators, reported in the doubtful columns, were called to the White House. It was indicated afterwards their positions were still in doubt.

President Hoover has expressed himself in opposition to the debenture plan and his position has been upheld by the house.

The senate has been so closely divided that many believe that a single vote may decide the outcome of the balloting which will begin at 4 p. m.

WAR DEBT ACCORD MEANS

BUSINESS BOOM—KELLOGG

CHICAGO, June 11.—Frank B. Kellogg, secretary of state in the Coolidge cabinet, foresees a business boom for America as a result of settlement of the German reparations problem.

"The entire world, and this country in particular, will profit through the signing of the pact," said the former secretary.

Another result of the settlement, he said, will be a better feeling toward America and Americans in many foreign countries.

Information received by Umpqua Post No. 16, American Legion of officials is to the effect that an alien veteran shall, if residing in the U. S., be entitled to naturalization upon the same conditions which would have been given him had he petitioned before the armistice; except, however, he must file petition in person and take prescribed oath of allegiance in open court. An alien previously naturalized

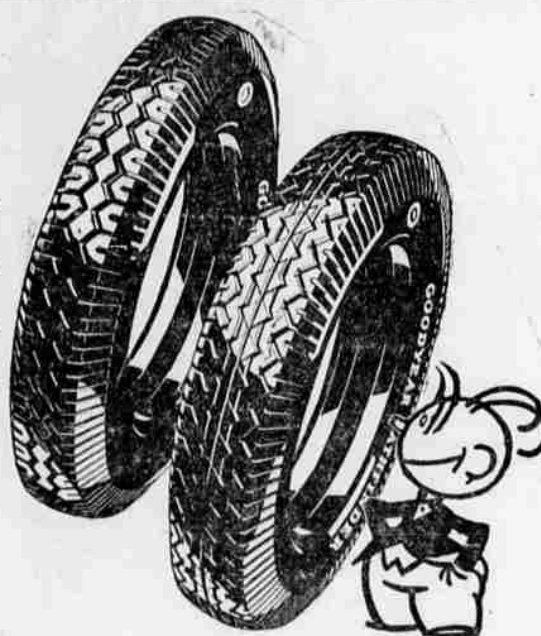
