QUEST FOR OIL CIVILIZING FORCE

Army of Prospectors, Scientists and Engineers Sent To All Parts of World by Standard Company—Adverse Physical Conditions and Disease Conquered.

NEW YORK, June 11.—Under pressure of world-wide competition the great oil companies of American and England have developed a race of modern Drakes, Magellans and Pizarros.

The Standard Oil company of New Jersey, whose field of operations has come to include the whole planet, has an army of prospectors, scientists and engineers trained to fight the company's battles against climate, adverse physical conditions and disease in remote sections.

These men have inherited all the pioneering, hardship-ignoring traditions of the sixteenth century conquistadores.

The world's quest for oil has scattered hundreds of little patches of civilization in tropical jungles, inaccessible mountain areas and sandy deserts. A record of the difficulties of road building, construction and sanitation overcome by American oil companies could be duplicated by big concerns of every nation.

Standard Oil's Growth
Parent of the Standard Oil group, the New Jersey company was formed in 1911 when the old Standard Oil trust was dissolved by court action under the Sherman anti-trust law. Its affiliated concerns in 15 countries now number 45 companies engaged in the production and distribution of oil and products derived from oil.

Its chief domestic producing subsidiaries are the Humble Oil & Refining Co., operating in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas; extensive holdings in mid-continent and units operating in other parts of the country, particularly Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio.

It controls the Imperial Oil company, Ltd., of Canada and through that organization controls the International Petroleum company.
