DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL AT DRAM CONCLUDED

(News-Review Douglas County Special) DRAM, June 13.—The two weeks' session of the Daily Vacation Bible school, in which the two local churches, the Methodist and Christian, joined, was concluded with a demonstration of the work done by the pupils at the Christian church on Sunday evening. The church auditorium was filled with interested observers to witness the work done by the instructor, Miss Goldie Smith, of Springfield, and all went away well pleased with what they had seen and heard. Miss Smith reported that about seventy-five children were registered for the session and the average attendance was sixty. The three grades, beginners, primary and junior were the ones receiving instruction.

Considerable hand work was done by the little folks in the way of making scrap books and cases, which will later be sent to the Doernbecker hospital in Portland, drawing maps and the making of electric maps was another feature, one each of the latter being for the use of the two local Bible schools. Considerable skill was displayed in all of this hand work. An excellent demonstration was also given in memory work, the children repeating several of the Psalms and also several verses of the Sermon on the Mount which included the Beatitudes. The little folks also made two two-sheet book cases on which to place imitation books of the Bible; one for each of the Bible schools, and they had also memorized the names of the books in rotation and they were also to classify them as to law, and prophecy showing remarkable aptitude considering the short session of school.

At the close of the demonstration the audience, including the children, voted almost unanimously to hold another session of the vacation Bible school next year.

LYSTUL LAWSON COMPANY ADDS NEW BOILER TO MILL

(News-Review Douglas County Special) GLENDALE, June 13.—Another large boiler which had recently been added to the equipment of the Lystul Lawson Lumber company of this city was placed in operation this week. The addition of this new boiler vastly increases the steam power available and this in turn will tend to increase the cutting capacity of the mill.

This sawmill is the oldest operating mill in this immediate vicinity having been built in 1906 by A. E. Shrin. The present management took over this mill in 1919 and has operated it since, specializing in cutting to order long dimension timbers.
