(Continued from page 1) hour known to have been maintained for the first 800 miles of the flight (a steamer sighted the plane at that distance), the Yellow Bird would have been 1,600 miles out at the time of the message from the Rochambeau. The wording of the message indicates that the decision had been made to take the northerly course and after proceeding along it for 600 miles necessarily had forced a veer to the south. The southerly course is 600 miles longer than the northerly, but there is less flying over water.

than the expected amount. **Stowaway Suspected.** PORTLAND, Maine, June 14.—Arthur Schreiber, 22, who won the toss of a coin with a friend named Clark, deciding which should become a stowaway for a trans-Atlantic flight, still was missing from his home here today. This strengthened the belief of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Schreiber, that he was hidden away in the Yellow Bird when it flew from Old Orchard yesterday for Paris, a note which he wrote, requesting another chance to deliver it to his father and mother three hours after the take-off, indicated his intention to make the attempt. They were anxiously awaiting word of the safe arrival of the monoplane.

An Anxious Bride. NEW YORK, June 14.—Mrs. Jean Assolant, bride of the Yellow Bird's French pilot, today waited anxiously in her hotel apartment, for news of the monoplane that took off yesterday from Old Orchard, Me., for Paris. Mrs. Assolant said that she had not slept at all last night because of her anxiety. "This is no time for sleep," she said. "As it grows later and later, I get more nervous and I must keep watch."

When told that the steamer Rochambeau reported that the Yellow Bird had changed its course to head for the Azores, she said, "It's wonderful to have any news of them at all. I have unbounded faith in Jean and I know he will come out somehow."

Mrs. Assolant, formerly a New York actress, married Assolant in

Maine early this week after a brief courtship. **Waiting and Watching.** LE BOURGET, France, June 14.—One thousand persons had assembled by mid-afternoon to await the Yellow Bird at the famous Le Bourget flying field where Col. Charles A. Lindbergh made his dramatic landing over two years ago on his epoch making New York-to-Paris hop. One hundred police reinforced the regular guards and cleared the field in anticipation of a great throng to greet the French fliers.

"All Well" Report. NEW YORK, June 14.—The French line steamer Niagara reported by wireless today that it was in communication with the trans-Atlantic monoplane Yellow Bird at 6 o'clock this morning, eastern daylight time, and that everything was reported well on board the plane. The position given by the Niagara is 300 to 400 miles northeast

of the Azores and on the line to Portugal the Yellow Bird's crew had planned.
