## VOTE MONDAY

ON MONDAY, June 17th, next Monday, will be held the election for the purpose of electing three Roseburg school directors. Not voting easily becomes a habit and this habit is one of the worst that devil the citizens of this great country. Good government, and this applies to schools as well as other government functions, can only be secured by the intelligent voting of all qualified voters. Almost the reverse of good government is often the result of eager voting by a scheming few who have something to put over, and who are allowed to do so by the listlessness of non-voting citizens.

There are other and purely local and personal reasons why we should all vote Monday. It is important for the good of the community as a whole that the school board members take office with the full knowledge that they have the interest, confidence and personal support of the voters. Bring this subject to your own front door and look at it. Suppose that you were a candidate, and suppose only a sprinkling few votes were cast at the election. What would be your reaction? How would you feel toward a community that had so little interest in so important a function as city schools? Your own particular answer to that question is reason enough for your decision as to whether or not you will vote Monday.

## Do You Know Your Own State?

Excerpts from "Oregon Geographic Names" by McArthur, which explain the origin of names of geographic landmarks throughout the state.

## FORT KLAMATH

Fort Klamath, Klamath county—The Klamath Indian name for the locality of Fort Klamath was Klamath, meaning within, or in the midst, and referred to the location close to or between mountains. The fort was established with two companies of soldiers in 1852. It was an important post during the Modoc, Snake and Tule wars, and at that time and for some years later it was located at a point about a mile southeast of its present location. The troops were removed in 1882.

## FORT ROCK

Fort Rock, Lake county, is a rock landmark. The rock is an isolated mass, imperfectly conical shaped, nearly one-third of a mile across, and its highest point is about 425 feet

above the floor of the plain on which it stands. It has perpendicular cliffs 200 feet high in places. It is not surprising that it has been likened to a fort.

Mossmaker, acting health officer, who made the examinations, reports that he was very pleased with the results.

The health unit has scheduled their next pre-school clinic Wednesday, July 17, and it is hoped it will be equally successful.
